NORTH Coast Road, Point Turton, has missed out on grant funding despite being ranked a higher priority than other projects.

Yorke Peninsula Council applied for \$1.141 million over two years through the Local

Government Special Local Roads Program 2021-22

Council applied to seal four kilometres extending from the existing bituminised area and the application, submitted on May 27, was ranked fifth by the end of the initial review process by the Legatus Group.

Accountability

Grant impacts

THE news that North Coast Road, Point Turton, is worthy of being upgraded won't be surprising to residents.

But the fact it missed out, despite being considered more worthy than other projects by initial assessors, is disappointing.

Yorke Peninsula Council staff put plenty of time and effort into applying for the Local Government Special Local Roads Program 2021-22, and timely responded to calls for additional information.

The \$1.141 million over two years council would have received for the project would allow the sealing of an extra four kilometres of road.

This would have been hugely beneficial for residents and visitors alike.

The question needs to be asked - what is the point of having independent assessments and panels to determine the worth of applications if they aren't the recipients?

That's not to say other projects weren't worthy.

The YPC application did rank fifth in the Legatus Group's initial review process, but in its summary of Road Proposals, Legatus acknowledged those likely to be funded were recommendations one through five.

Questions around grant processes, particularly on a federal government level, have been around for the past few years.

Recently, an Australian National Audit Office analysis found more than half of federally funded regional development grants awarded went to postcodes classified as major city areas since 2018.

Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce has been reported as saying many of the projects that received funding in cities benefited rural people, and that programs included in regional development for reporting purposes aren't always aimed exclusively at regional communities.

Grants are important avenues of funding for local government — it allows projects to get off the ground sooner, as opposed to raising rates to cover costs – but more transparency is needed around the allocation of money.

Race on as roadmap released

SOUTH Australia's roadmap to easing COVID-19 restrictions was announced today (Tuesday, October 26).

Eighty per cent of South Australians aged 16 and over are expected to be fully vaccinated by Tuesday, November 23.

As of this date, border restrictions will be removed for people who are double vaccinated, international arrivals (who are double vaccinated) will only have to quarantine for seven days and home gathering caps will go from 20 people to 30.

Premier Steven Marshall said South Australians had worked extremely hard over the past 19 months and continued to work hard to get things back to normal.

"There has to be some reward for South Australians doing the right thing," Mr Marshall said.

"When the state reaches 90 per cent of double vaccinations, 12 years and over, we can then remove quarantine arrangements and look at removing the vast majority of restrictions in SA.

"We need to keep some controls in place but we will remove most when we reach that 90 per cent (double vaccinated) — I do believe we can reach that number by Christmas this year.

"The race is on in SA, we need as many people vaccinated as quickly as possible to enjoy as normal a Christmas as we can.

"Thank you to South Australians for their extraordinary efforts — we can't keep the Delta variant out forever but we do need to make sure we are COVID-ready for when the border restrictions do ease."

The news comes as masks were no longer made compulsory at high schools as of yesterday (Monday, October 25).

There are no new cases of COVID-19 today and a total of 918 cases have been notified in South Australia — the state currently has three active cases.

Coast Road misses out on funding

North

DISAPOINTED... Yorke Peninsula Council mayor Darren Braund has expressed his concerns about North Coast Road, Point Turton, being passed over for grant funding despite being listed as a higher priority than other projects approved.

RESIDENTS have been fed up with the state of North Coast Road, Point Turton, for years.

Dust often coats properties and creates a health hazard as well as an environmental hazard with the dust settling on a nearby reef and seabed.

Yorke Peninsula Council was left off the final list of successful applicants after a subsequent review by the Local Government Transport Advisory Panel. Light Regional Council, whose application was initially ranked seventh, leapfrogged the application as well as Copper Coast Council's Roach Street, Kadina, application which was ranked sixth.

YPC mayor Darren Braund has expressed his concerns about the process with the Local Government Association, and called for North Coast Road to be awarded funding.

"We are incredibly disap-

pointed to have missed out on this funding and with the assessment process after being passed over for projects the initial assessor, Legatus Group, felt were not as worthy," Mr Braund said. "Why did these lower-

ranked projects gain funding, and why was it Yorke Peninsula Council that missed out?

"The residents of North Coast Road, and the many locals and visitors who use North Coast Road, deserve answers." Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis MP said he will also question why the project was refused funding and replaced by lower priority projects.

"Extraordinarily the Local Government Transport Advisory Panel, instead of merely signing off on the locally recommended projects, have forsaken the incredibly important North Coast Road project in favour of one down the list a bit that was in Light Regional Council," Mr Ellis said.

"(This is) the same Light Regional Council which has benefitted from approximately 40 per cent of the total funding over the past four years despite the fact there are some 15 member councils.

"I will now be calling on the state government to fully fund North Coast Road sealing — there is no longer any excuse not to do so."





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Fisherman Bay locals closer to freeholding

REPORT BY THE first stage of freehold titles will be issued to Eisberman Bay resi-

be issued to Fisherman Bay residents in coming weeks. Settlement on the sites is expect-

ed to be completed in November.

Since 2017, Fisherman's Bay Management has had development approval to divide land it currently owns and operates into freehold allotments, on the condition it invests in infrastructure to enhance the area.

An agreement was reached earlier this year which will allow Barunga West Council to act as an enabler and secure funds through the sales of allotments from FBM.

The news comes as FBM has

announced Bardavcol as the successful contractor for most of the more than \$20 million infrastructure upgrades in the township.

Bardavcol will deliver most of the planned infrastructure, including a wastewater collection system, upgraded roads, a new stormwater system and coastal protection measures.

Alano Water, Baker Civil and H2H Plumbing will take on the \$3m Community Wastewater Management System upgrade and expansion.

The first stage of the CWMS works will run concurrently with the freehold process and are expected to begin this month.

"We are immensely grateful to the residents of Fisherman Bay for their patience as we worked to find the best possible solution for the community, made possible by the Council's willingness to collaborate and innovate," Fisherman's Bay Management chair David Hosking said.

"Importantly, this milestone will see us deliver on our promise to invest in the future of Fisherman Bay and provide residents with ownership of their own piece of this beautiful corner of the world.

"We look forward to seeing our community thrive as a result of this new infrastructure."

BWC CEO Maree Wauchope said it was exciting to be at the starting line of construction on this project.

"It will see more than \$20m

worth of private investment, and another \$3m of state government grant money, spent in our region which will allow Fisherman Bay residents to finally obtain freehold title over their land," she said.

"Council is proudly acting as the enabler for a solution that represents a genuine and effective collaboration between local government and the private sector.

"An investment of this scale in Fisherman Bay is an investment in the future of our region, and one that will generate widespread economic, environmental and health benefits for the entire Barunga West community."

The Fisherman Bay infrastructure upgrades have been scheduled for completion by mid 2022.

More ambulances needed

WALLAROO needs a 24/7 paramedic ambulance, according to a new report by the Ambulance Employees Association.

The AEA SA has delivered a report with 20 recommendations to the state government to address capacity and safety issues across South Australia.

An additional 370 more staff across the entire SA Ambulance Service is needed, including 17 extra regional crews.

"These numbers are in addition to the 74 paramedics promised to be recruited by March next year under the current government," AEA SA secretary Leah Watkins said.

"Those 74 staff will only create three additional ambulances for all of metropolitan Adelaide and do not provide any additional ambulance resources for our regional communities.

"This promise falls far short of what is needed to safely service the community of South Australia."

The report calls for a 24/7 paramedic ambulance to be allocated to Wallaroo and one community paramedic for the region.

At present, Wallaroo only has one paramedic-staffed ambulance, a Regional Medical Transfer Service.

"I am deeply concerned for the safety of South Australians and for our members," Ms Watkins said.

"This document highlights what measures are urgently needed to ensure a safe and sustainable ambulance service.

"I urge the government to adopt the measures outlined in this document."

The move comes as the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation (SA Branch) has welcomed commitments by the state opposition to legislate for mandated staffing ratios and implement a hospital occupancy target over the term of government.

"(The commitments) are a huge step forward to reducing the crushing strain on our over-burdened health system," ANMF (SA Branch) CEO/Secretary Adj Associate Professor Elizabeth Dabars AM said.

"Nurse/patient ratios will enhance the safety of both nurses and patients by reducing nurse stress and fatigue and the danger of reduced or missed care for patients.

"The 90 per cent occupancy target will also help reduce waiting times for treatment and improve patient flow through the hospital system.

"It is a win not just for nurses but for the health and wellbeing of the community at large."

THE number of electric vehicles on our roads could start to accelerate.

A recent RAA survey of 550 motorists revealed a whopping 78 per cent would be considering an electric vehicle for their next purchase.

"These vehicles are at the forefront of discussions being had around reducing greenhouse gas emissions, so it's no surprise motorists are weighing them up," RAA spokesperson Kerry Bowles said. "Governments around the world are also setting deadlines for the sale of new fossil fuelled vehicles in coming years, and with more EV models being produced it's no wonder drivers are considering their buying options going forward."

Local councils and businesses are already thinking about how to meet the anticipated demand and the infrastructure needed.

There are currently 11 community charging stations between Port Broughton and Marion Bay but none in Port Wakefield or Port Pirie. Barley Stacks Wines, near Maitland, was one of the first locations on Yorke Peninsula with an EV charging facility.

Barley Stacks cellar door manager Brooklyn Sims said the station has been a win-win.

"The benefit for us is that they (EV users) may come here for our charging station but more often than not, will come in for a look," she said.

Yorke Peninsula Council CEO Andrew Cameron said he was pleased the region had several electric vehicle charging stations already on offer, having installed eight Tesla Destination Chargers in 2018.

"We understand electric vehicle usage continues to grow and this is a service we can provide for locals and visitors," Mr Cameron said.

"We have free-to-use chargers in Ardrossan, Minlaton, Port Vincent and Yorketown.


"We also have four more in our Yorke Peninsula Council holiday parks — two in the Point Turton Caravan Park, one in the Port Vincent Foreshore Caravan Park, and one in Marion Bay Caravan Park.

"This was a deliberate strategy,

allowing us to attract visitors who have electric cars and are looking for holiday spots that can accommodate their charging requirements."

Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate said council had submitted 12 locations as part of a proposal sought by the Department of Energy and Mining.

"We want to be prepared for the increase in locals and tourists moving to environmentally sustainable transportation as we want the Copper Coast to be accessible, inclusive and support sustainability," he said.

Fishers caught with illegal crab catches

MORE than \$11,000 worth of fines for illegal crab catches were issued during the October long weekend.

Fisheries officers seized more than 400 crabs on just one night across Gulf St Vincent.

The fines were mostly issued for undersized blue swimmer crab catches, with 10 cautions also issued.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said some of the fines issued were for exceeding the daily bag limit as well.

⁶Despite recreational fishing rules and regulations being available across a variety of channels, it is very disappointing to find such high levels of non-compliance," Mr Basham said.

"What is really concerning is that all fishers who were inspected during Saturday night's patrol were aware of the regulations for blue swimmer crabs, carried appropriate measuring devices and still chose to break the rules.

"The state government takes the sustainability of our fish stocks seriously, which is why in March we introduced a significant increase in recreational fishing fines.

"Now those caught can face

fines ranging from \$217 to \$717, depending on the nature of the offence.

"My message to those who think it is acceptable to take undersize crabs and exceed bag limits, is that you are damaging the fishery for everyone."

The daily bag limit for blue swimmer crabs in Gulf St Vincent is 20 per person, and the minimum size limit is 11 centimetres in width, when measured across the carapace from the base of the largest spines.

It is also illegal to take female crabs with eggs these must be returned to the water straight away without harm.

Anyone can report illegal fishing activity through 24-hour Fishwatch on 1800 065 522.

White Ribbon Day approaches

WHITE Ribbon Australia has challenged Australian men to understand their role in enabling the safety of women and children from men's violence.

While launching this year's event (Friday, November 19) WR executive director Brad Chilcott said turning this national tragedy around would require a long-term social transformation.

"It's no longer good enough just to be aware of the problem — we need men to choose to be part of the solution by addressing attitudes, expectations and behaviours," Mr Chilcott said.

"We need men who have the tools to bring about change — first in ourselves, then in our communities.

"We need every person, community, school, workplace, sports club and government body to commit to to end all forms of men's violence against women."

Mr Chilcott said the focus of this year's WR Day campaign was the question How Can Men Make Change? and call on communities to Learn, Give, Take Action.

"On average, more than one woman is killed every week in Australia, as a result of intimate partner violence," he said.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has made the situation worse, with lockdowns creating a spike in violence and limiting the ability of victims to seek help."

Australian of the Year Rosie Batty and former South Australian Premier and CEO of Thrive by Five Jay Weatherill said WR Day 2021 was an opportunity to shift the narrative around gendered violence.

"It's more than just talking the talk, holding a morning tea, or wearing a white ribbon," Ms Batty said.

"We need to change the attitudes and social norms that condone disrespect, sexual harassment and abuse.

"Gender inequality and learned behaviours are at the heart of this

problem, so it's essential that men are part of the solution."

. Mr Weatherill said the women's safety agenda has never been more prominent.

"The women who have bravely called for change have provided us with a great opportunity to create a future where women are free from all forms of men's violence.

"There's never been a more important time for men to challenge cultural norms that are the foundation of controlling behaviours."

BWC community grants awarded

BARUNGA West Council has supported 10 community groups through its community grants scheme.

About \$40,000 was shared by organisations in Bute, Port Broughton, Tickera, Mundoora and Kulpara.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said, while not all grant applications were successful, council was pleased with the standard of submissions.

"On behalf of council I would like to thank all the applicants for taking the time to apply for these grants," Mrs Kerley said

"It is never easy for council to decide who is successful or not, but we have limited funds and we

have tried to allocate the funds fairly across the district."

Bute Community Gym Inc. received \$5000 for new gym equipment to provide members with a wider range of options to assist with their exercising and rehabilitation.

Secretary Imenka Gill said the gym started operating in 2014 with mostly second-hand and donated equipment.

"Today, we have about 50 financial members and all our equipment is now commercial grade," she said.

"To receive this funding is so beneficial to our community gym and with the money we will be able to purchase a stair climber machine which is a huge addition people will really appreciate.

"It is so important to us to keep the equipment up to date, as well as having a variety of different equipment for people to use.

"Our gym is such a success story and we are so delighted we can keep improving the facility for our community."

Port Broughton RSL subbranch received \$5000 for fencing to secure the carpark.

President George Blair-Nicholas said most of the western side of the fence is in very bad condition and needs replacing.

"It's great we can acquire these grants with a big help from BWC and their grants officer Bridget Johns — we thank them for their wonderful support," he said.

Year 12 students near crunch time

FINAL preparations are underway for year 12 end-of-year exams.

The exams will be held across the state from Monday to Monday, November 1 to 15.

Local students will sit mathematics, history and biology tests in the first week before chemistry, psychology and physics the following week.

Harvest Christian College, Kadina, student Bianca Derrington will be kept busy with English literature and general math exams scheduled for next Tuesday and Wednesday.

Bianca said key to her preparation has been taking the time to study thoroughly.

"(I'm making sure to) have regular breaks, drink plenty of water and look after myself," she said.

At Moonta Area School, senior captain Will Drogemuller has been revising for chemistry, biology, math methods and modern history exams.

Will said he has taken online seminars in preparation which have helped reinforce his knowledge throughout the year.

"I am confident I will go well in the exams; however, there are many topics which need to be remembered, particularly with chemistry," he said.

"My family has been practically supportive (in the lead up) — they know the workload I have and are constantly ask me about my schoolwork to keep me moving forward."

Practice and support

MAS student Savannah Shields said her teachers have been of great benefit ahead of her math exam.

"Practice exams have been helpful in preparing me for what it is like and have helped me retain my knowledge of each topic," she said.

"My peers have been supporting each other with assessments and study — this is a stressful time and we often lose motivation, so we continue to push each other through."

Minlaton District School year 12 student Lachlan Coombe has set himself for exams in general math and economics, which he has studied

Handy revision tips for year 12s

UNIVERSITY of South Australia's Dr Tim Patston has three useful tips for year 12 students preparing for exams:

- Ask your peers for their most successful notetaking and study techniques, and then be creative by trying something new — it may surprise you how effective it is
- Use a different note summary technique for each subject, it makes recalling information easier
- Write exam questions for your friends and ask them to write exam questions for you learning from your peers is the most powerful learning strategy

through Open Access College this year.

"My exam preparation has been very productive and effective — I've gone to various study seminars in the term 3 holidays, as well gradually revising all topics," he said.

"At the start of the year, some accounting topics were quite difficult for me, but as the terms have gone by, I have better grasped various concepts." Lachlan said his teachers have had the desire to assist him in any way possible.

"Group activities are prepared by the teachers, which has helped me understand topics and questions in a different but more effective way," he said.

"I always try to have a very positive mindset and attitude before any test, which has significantly helped me (this year)."

Boat launching made easier

SINGLE-launch boat permits can now be purchased electronically across most of the peninsula.

Yorke Peninsula Council moved at its October meeting to offer boat ramp users the ability to purchase permits via mobile phone app EasyPark, in addition to ticket machines.

Information circulating on social media suggested there would be hidden charges associated with the application; however, council staff verified with EasyPark this is not the case.

Copper Coast Council adopted the payment method, which has proved a successful alternative to ticket machines, about 16 months ago.

"We've had discussions with Yorke Peninsula Council regarding the implementation of the EasyPark system and it's pleasing to see them follow the same path," CCC director development services Muller Mentz said.

"Those launching their boat now only need the one app across the two councils, not only making it more efficient but introducing a modern means to pay.

"There are no hidden costs, this was a cost-effective method to introducing app payments as the service was free for council to introduce.

"However, EasyPark does receive a percentage of each transaction."

Copper Coast Council adopted the electronic method after Councillor Brent Walker asked CEO Russell Peate to investigate the possibility of raising fees.

"The whole intention of increasing the fees was because we are the second busiest launching ramp in South Australia and we charged about the lowest," Mr Walker said.

"It was \$5 at the time which was absolutely laughable and the best was to increase it was electronic payment.

"The electronic system seemed like the best and easiest way for everybody."

The new system, for Yorke Peninsula Council, won't affect those who purchase monthly or annual permits, and will complement the coin-only ticket machines already in place.

Thinking pink for tourism

YORKE Peninsula's Salt Lake Trail is adding another flavour to Yorke Peninsula's tourism offerings.

The trail starts in Yorketown and visitors have the option of four selfdrive options, from short and sweet to the full 48 kilometre, 90 minute trail. Yorketown's salt lakes would have once been the scene for about 600 itinerant workers who scraped for salt — a stark contrast to today's use.

Yorketown farming brothers Peter and Alan Twartz began the ball rolling, with Peter writing a letter to the Yorke Peninsula Council and Alan getting into the ear of Councillor Adam Meyer.

Cr Meyer said Alan was persistent in getting the project off the ground and a working group was established. YPC's Gabrielle Gutsche said the

trail offered something for everyone. "If people just want a 30 minute drive with minimal dirt roads we have the short drive or we have the old schools (ruins) and cemeteries and the lakes are picturesque," she said.

"This is just the initial stage, we've got picnic tables, more signage and paths planned as well as restoration work and we'd like to name all the lakes."

Burst water main in Kadina

KADINA residents were left without mains water for several hours on Tuesday, October 12.

A break in the mains was reported near the intersection of Lyon Street and East Terrace in the morning, affecting about 100 residents.

"The incident was reported on Tuesday morning (October 12), with an SA Water field technician arriving on site at around 8.40am to begin turning off mains supply," an SA Water spokesperson said.

"Pipe repairs were completed at around 2pm on Tuesday with water restored shortly after.

"We thank our impacted customers for their patience while we undertook this work as quickly and safely as possible."

Dunes restored at North Beach

THE North Beach dune system received a little extra assistance earlier this month.

Crews have been working to restore the dune system under the guidance of experts Succession Ecology and the Coast Protection Board following a winter with some moderate storm events.

Residents along the front of Otago Road received a letter explaining that, while the damage was a setback to the establishment process, the outcomes were not unexpected.

"It also demonstrates the enormous benefit of the reinstated dune system in relation to the protection of properties located directly behind the dunes," Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate wrote.

Layers of sand and seaweed are being placed over fencing to fast-track dune development, improve structural integrity and plant growth.

"The sand will be harvested from the beach, particularly from along the marina wall where it has built up," Mr Peate wrote.

"Deposited seaweed will be combined with the sand to improve the sand's consistency.

"Once completed, the dune is to be capped with additional seaweed to improve moisture holding capacity for planting in 2022."

\$120,000 for Marion Bay playground

MARION Bay Progress Association has received nearly \$120,000 to install new playground equipment and shade structures.

The \$118,633 was awarded as part of round five of the federal government's Building Better Regions Fund.

Playground subcommittee member Caroline Bonnett said she was thrilled to get the funding.

"I'm over the moon about getting this grant, I can't quite believe it because it's a large amount of money," Ms Bonnett said.

"From a community perspective this is very welcome.

"We receive a lot of tourists so it's not only for them to benefit but also the people who live here which is great."

Ms Bonnett said the playground project had been more than a decade in the making.

"I moved to Marion Bay in 2000, we had our first child in 2005 and when he was about 2, we had a playgroup going," Ms Bonnett said.

"Some of the mothers decided to raise money to improve the playground.

"We ended up with a \$5000 community grant which we added another \$2000 through funding to complete the first stage.

"This included preparing an area and getting some equipment put in and a year later we did more fundraising and received another \$5000 grant through council."

Ms Bonnett said a further grant allowed for the construction of a barbecue and shelter shed

FORMER Yorke Peninsula resident Karina Natt will contest the seat of Adelaide at the 2022 state election.

Ms Natt, who grew up in Edithburgh, has been a political advisor for the past six years and has been endorsed as the Greens candidate for the electorate.

"At the beginning of this year there was a moment for me where I realised instead of just saying we need more women in parliament I had to put my hand up," Ms Natt said.

"Brittany Higgins kicked off a reckoning when she spoke up about abuse and the toxic culture in parliament.

"The way to change that is to have more women elected, leading and making laws and policies that

drive the reforms we need society wide."

Ms Natt said she also recognised the critical need to address climate change and keeping warming below 1.5 degrees.

"As a country girl, I've experienced the climate emergency firsthand through drought and bushfires," she said.

"It's hard to believe Edithburgh, the town I grew up in, had to evacuate to the jetty during the Yorketown fires in 2019 yet more intense fires are a consequence of the climate crisis.

"I don't want any of us to have to keep going through these catastrophic weather events and if politicians don't act now, the damage will be irreversible."

Ms Natt said politics has been a good way to combine her background in law and journalism with

her passion for social equality and the environment.

"The Greens value the same things I do — protecting our environment, beautiful beaches and coastline and wildlife, as well as addressing inequality and ensuring everyone has a roof over their heads and access to free, quality education and healthcare," Ms Natt said.

"The Greens don't take corporate donations so we are running a grassroots, people-powered election campaign to try to achieve balance of power in the Upper House which means lots of doorknocking, community events and conversations."

Ms Natt is a former Yorke Peninsula Country Times journalist and is currently chief of staff for Senator Sarah Hanson-Young.

"The specialists there were finally able to diagnose his condition as myocarditis/cardiomyopathy.

thy. "The decision was made to fit James with a 'Berlin Heart' that is pumping for his left ventricle."

Sally said the Berlin Heart will relieve some pressure and allow the muscle to repair itself.

"If that does not work, the Berlin Heart provides a bridge to a heart transplant," she said.

"This beautiful little boy and his loving family have a long and challenging road ahead and have temporarily relocated to Melbourne to access the leading paediatric cardiology care in Australia.

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Poverty game will be toughest test

THE Salvation Army Copper Coast Corps has come up with an interactive way of expressing the difficulties of life for those living in impoverished conditions.

Anti-Poverty Week was held from Sunday to Saturday, October 17 to 23, with a group set to explore the issue more deeply in the "poverty game" tonight (Tuesday, October 26).

Participants will be challenged to face the pressures forced upon the underprivileged as they need to resource materials for an art collage on a limited budget.

Despite being a fictitious scenario in this case, participants will get an understanding of how difficult unfavourable conditions can make life.

The Salvation Army's theme for this year's event has been about encouraging people not to be afraid to speak up for financial freedom.

"This year we wanted to do something different from what we'd usually do, and the poverty game is a fun way of spreading awareness," Captain Karen Armstrong said.

"It's been business as usual for the rest of the week, we've been seeing all our usual clients, but our focus for the event is the poverty game.

"There could be about 30 of us here, which is a good number."

The Salvos are involved in many community initiatives, but also manage a busy thrift shop as well as regular clients.

Captain Armstrong said the issue of poverty on Yorke Peninsula is growing, and needs to be addressed.

"We know we've got a housing crisis

up here," she said.

"There's a lot of things which have impacted that and not only does it push out lower class people, but it actually pushes out the middle class people too.

"When people first come to us they'll say, 'I need food', but we know the issues run far deeper."

In Australia today, 2.65 million people are struggling to survive on income payments that are below the poverty line.

Mrs Armstrong said she wants people to know the organisation exists to support them. "Our main role here is to advocate for the people who think they don't have a voice," she said.

"Everyone who comes into The Salvation Army for assistance, will always go away with something.

"We will never knock someone back."

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Makers of the RAAF: Stanley James Goble (1891-1948)

SIR Richard Williams (1890 – 1980) is generally regarded as the "father" of the Royal Australian Air Force but others made significant contributions to its establishment.

One such person was Air Vice Marshal Stanley James "Jimmy" Goble, CBE, DSO, DSC.

Early life and World War I

Goble was born at Croydon, Victoria, on August 21, 1891, and one of four brothers.

He had little schooling and began his working life as a clerk, then stationmaster, with the Victorian Railways, while also playing football for Brunswick.

Goble tried to enlist in the Australian Imperial Force at the outbreak of the Great War but was twice rejected on medical grounds.

Undeterred, he travelled to England at his own expense and enlisted in the Royal Naval Air Service in 1915; he became a test pilot, and flew antisubmarine patrols and fighters on the Western Front.

Such was his daring that, although shot down twice, he had the reputation as a flying ace with 10 victories in aerial combat by the end of the war.

His conspicuous bravery and skill earned him the Distinguished Service Order in 1917 and, later, the Distinguished Service Cross and the French Croix De Guerre.

He returned to Australia in November 1918 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

In October 1921, he was posted to Britain for a short naval co-operation course and there met and married Kathleen Wodehouse in London on Anzac Day 1922.

Establishment of RAAF and Chief of Air Staff

Goble and Williams' solid reputations as aviators meant that, in November 1920, both were assigned to the Australian Air Board to investigate the feasibility of an Australian Air Force.

Both recommended the creation of the AAF as an independent branch of the armed services and it was established on March 31, 1921, and the Royal prefix was granted five months later.

Goble and Williams were subsequently nominated for the role of Chief of the Air Staff, with the prime position going to Williams and Goble appointed as Second Air Member and Director of Personnel and Training.

The pair each served as CAS three times between 1922 and 1940 in alternating terms of office.

Inevitably, professional rivalry developed between the two and this was exacerbated by differences in personality and management style, Goble's cheerful and affable disposition contrasting sharply with Williams' more fastidious and autocratic character.

It was Williams and his superior political skills, however, that dominated the AAB.

Circumnavigation of Australia

Like many returned aviators, Goble longed for adventure.

To that end, he and fellow RAAF pilot Ivor McIntyre became the first men to circumnavigate Australia by air in a single-engined Fairey 3D floatplane, McIntyre as lead pilot and Goble as commander and navigator.

Officially, the flight was to survey the northern coastline

of Australia for defence planning, but for Goble and McIntyre it was also about what aviators called "exploits": daring and perilous journeys that tested men and machines to their limit.

Taking off from Point Cook, Victoria, on April 6, 1924, they flew in an anticlockwise direction along the Australian coast in dangerous conditions.

Illness, tropical storms, midair engine trouble and fuel leaks were common.

At one point, they realised the pilot's compass was faulty so, across the Gulf of Carpentaria, Goble had to pull strings tied to McIntyre's arms in order to guide him.

The journey was 8450 miles (13,600km) over 44 days; a silent news reel of the circumnavigation can be viewed at: https://aso.gov.au/titles/newsreels/australasian-gazette-seaplane/clip1/.

On their return, they alighted at St Kilda Beach to the rapturous welcome of 10,000 spectators.

Sir Robert Menzies, Australian Prime Minister between 1949 and 1966, called the flight "one of the most wonderful accomplishments in the history of aviation".

The flight won the prestigious Britannia Trophy for 1924 and both Goble and McIntyre were granted CBEs. Goble then resumed his RAAF career; McIntyre died in 1928 from injuries sustained in a Tiger Moth crash at Parafield, South Australia.

The 1930s and World War II

With the onset of WWII, Goble's career experienced highs and lows.

In February 1937, he became a temporary Air Vice Marshal. In February 1939 he succeeded Williams as CAS for the third and last time when the latter

was dismissed from his position in the aftermath of a report that was critical of RAAF training and air safety standards.

Things went awry for Goble in 1939-40; his plans to expand and decentralise the RAAF with an autonomous Air Expeditionary Force found no support in the government.

His opposition to the federal policy of training RAAF pilots for transfer into the British Royal Air Force during the war — he believed it would be detrimental to local defence — irked the government. He also came into conflict with his own deputy.

Faced with a career impasse, Goble resigned as RAAF chief executive in January 1940, though he kept his commission in the organisation.

He was persuaded by PM Menzies to take on the role of Australian Air Liaison Officer to Canada where he stayed for the duration of the war.

He was the RAAF's representative at the Ottawa Conference in May-June 1942 that negotiated the Joint Commonwealth Air Training Plan.

Death and legacy

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Goble retired in February 1946.

He died of hypertensive cerebrovascular disease on July 24, 1948, in the Repatriation General Hospital, Heidelberg, Victoria, and was survived by his wife and three sons.

Goble Street, Hughes, Australian Capital Territory, is named after him.




"She has also co-produced a documentary called The Greatest Air Race and The Heroes the World Forgot, with astronaut Andy Thomas presenting and narrating.

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

Novel imaging to head off glaucoma

Glaucoma Australia's 2021 Quinlivan Research Grant has been awarded to Professor Ewa Goldys from the University of New South Wales' Graduate School of Biomedical Engineering.

Governor-General of Australia, His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd), Glaucoma Australia patron, announced the award on World Sight Day, October 14.

The grant will support Prof Goldys' work to further develop novel imaging technology fluorescent hyperspectral imaging (fHSI) for the early detection and monitoring of glaucoma.

Obtaining information about the health status of the retina and optic nerve, it is hoped fHSI will enable the start of treatment before permanent damage, causing irreversible blindness, is done. FHSI enables real-time monitoring of dynamic disease status by non-invasively obtaining information about retinal energy metabolism.

A world-leading biomedical engineer, Professor Goldys, and medical and data scientists with complementary skillsets, will work together with internationally recognised glaucoma clinician-scientists Professor Andrew White and Professor Robert Casson to lead the project from lab to clinic.

FHSI has the potential to produce a paradigm shift similar to how optical coherence tomography has become a commonplace tool in glaucoma management, Professor Goldy said.



"In the first 10 minutes he moved up into sixth position and was told to push a little harder into corners and hold more speed," he said.


"By mid race he had moved up into third and was sitting there quite comfortably."

Expectations tempered for harvest

LOCAL farmers have tempered their expectations for this year's grain harvest.

Long range rainfall predictions suggested South Australia was in for a wetter than average couple of months.

While soaking rains didn't eventuate for most of the region, disappointment has been tempered by cooler and mild weather.

farmer Ben Maitland Wundersitz said the season was full of promise early.

"I suppose for us, June was amazing, we had double our average rainfall with 100mm for June and it probably set us up in a pretty good space and we thought we could be in for a bin buster," he said.

"Then August was half of the average which didn't matter too much but September, for a lot of areas on YP, was the driest for 111 years.

"That was a record breaker for all the wrong reasons and probably the only thing that will get the crop home is we've had pretty mild conditions."

Mr Wundersitz said he was hoping to get a near average return but was expecting some variability.

Kadina farmer Mark Schilling said he thought it would be an average or below

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Priorities listed for building resilience

HUNDREDS of South Australian primary producers, industry representatives and regional community members helped determine priorities for building resilience to future droughts.

The South Australian Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hub held a number of workshops across the state last month, with more than 260 people attending in person or online.

SA Drought Hub Interim Director University of Adelaide Professor Chris Preston said the interactive workshops were an important exercise in identifying the practices, technologies and activities the SA Drought Hub should be delivering for the next three years to support regional communities.

"It was heartening to have so many people from such diverse sectors, backgrounds and interests willingly contributing their ideas about what they believe needs to be done to increase drought resilience," Prof Preston said.

"The workshops were extremely positive and have set a strong foundation for the SA Drought Hub's program of activities and undertakings going forward.

"There was robust discussion at each workshop about what has helped primary producers and their communities during past droughts and what is needed to better prepare for future droughts."

All priorities and activities will go back to the regional communities to ensure they still agree with the plans.

Activities will be codesigned with regional input to facilitate adoption of drought resilience practices in farming systems through peer-to-peer learning, onfarm demonstrations and training workshops.

The regional priorities will form the basis of the SA Drought Hub's activity plan, to be submitted to the federal government in November.





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

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Simmons stains Aussie basketball

MELBOURNE-born NBA star Ben Simmons has decided to sit on the sidelines until further notice after being unable to force his way out of Philadelphia 76ers in the offseason.

After bombing out of last season's conference semifinals, the skillset of Simmons was clearly exposed - his jump shot wasn't only broken but he was scared to shoot layups with fear of getting fouled and shooting free throws.

Still having four years left on his \$170 million contract, what does he do? Tries to force a trade and find a new scenery instead of sticking with the franchise which has built their entire roster around him.

Since debuting in 2017, Simmons' average stats have decreased by two points, one assist and one rebound per game - he hasn't actually improved and still relies on his size and athleticism more than any current All-Star.

Following his miserable 2021 Playoffs, the trade value of Simmons bottomed out, which is evident in the number of teams making a move for him.

He was basically forced to rock up for the Sixers training camp after being fined millions of dollars



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
