SNAP BACK

New bans spark snapper push

NARUNGGA MP Fraser Ellis and a Yorke Peninsula charter boat operator have called for the snapper fishing ban to be lifted, following the announcement of new fishing restrictions along the region's coasts.

Premier Peter Malinauskas announced the restrictions for Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf on Thursday, October 23. They will apply to both recreational and commercial fishing from Saturday, November 1, through to June 30, 2026, subject to scientific review.

The measures are aimed at supporting fish stock recovery in areas impacted by the ongoing algal bloom.

Among the restrictions is an extension of the statewide snapper fishing ban (excluding the South East zone) until June 2027. The ban was introduced in November 2019.

Mr Ellis said the South Australian Government must immediately reopen the snapper fishery to recreational fishers, possibly with limitations, to counterbalance the fallout from the "disastrous" restrictions.

"The algal bloom has had the biggest impact on our electorate, and this looks set to continue," he said.

"I often hear from fishers how many snapper they see out there and the frustrations they have in not being able to target them. "The fact that this closure was announced mere weeks before the next (fish) stock assessment was scheduled to be delivered in November highlights the farce of this (snapper) closure being extended into the eighth year."

Mr Ellis said, while there had been few fish caught in Gulf St Vincent recently, its closure to commercial fishing would have been a tremendous blow to the industry.

"More offensive is the allocation of half a million dollars for a 'license surrender study' — that is money that could immediately go toward buying quota off fishers who want to sell it, not to consultants sitting around a table.

Fishing for a solution

IT'S hard to think of another topic affecting our region that will make so many people so hot under the collar other than fisheries management.

Whether you're a mad keen boatie, an occasional angler or professional fisher, everyone has an opinion about how our precious marine resources should be shared, even in the best of times, let alone now when we are facing the horrific damage wrought by the harmful algal

So, when Premier Peter Malinauskas announced major cuts to recreational and commercial fishing in Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf zones last week, it was bound to provoke a reaction.

While many of those interviewed for our coverage of the issue in today's edition take a measured and longterm approach, there are some in the recreational sector calling for the complete shutdown of commercial fishing in both gulf zones and a buy-back of all licences.

That would mean the only people who can access fresh, local fish are either those who have the ability to fish themselves or are lucky enough to know someone who

It would also affect the people who work on boats, in processing and those who sell wholesale or retail seafood or source it to serve diners and take away customers.

There are also claims that recreational fishing has reached unsustainable limits but the lack of information about any aspects of the recreational catch — other than the odd voluntary survey — means it's hard to argue the case either way.

One thing that most people can agree on is that the impact of the algal bloom is devastating for the environment, harmful for our regional economy and a tragedy for everyone who loves the ocean.

Maree reflects on past five years at BWC

DEPARTING Barunga West Council chief executive Maree Wauchope says, in the past five years, more than \$40 million in public investment has been achieved in the council area — the largest in its history.

The figure is part of her exit report to be tabled at tonight's special council meeting, and includes the \$23M freeholding and upgrading of Fisherman Bay, and the \$4.5M upgrade of the Port Broughton and Bute community wastewater management systems.

Other components include the redevelopment of Civic Square in Port Broughton, residential land developments in Port Broughton and Bute, and the sand replenishment and coastal protection program at Port Broughton.

Ms Wauchope resigned in mid-September to take up an executive role with the South Australian Housing Trust; her last day at the council is this Friday, October 31.

Ms Wauchope, 48, returned to work in August after 10 months of medical leave for melanoma treatment.

Speaking to the YP Country Times, she said she was pleased with what she had achieved since she started at the council in April 2020.

"I think five years is the minimum any chief executive should stay in a position of local government because it enables you not only to deliver some short-term outcomes, but also some mid-to-long-term outcomes," she said.

"I think I achieved what I wanted to achieve in that five years."

Ms Wauchope worked in infrastructure and property development for the former Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure and Renewal SA before joining the council.

"I was engaged (by council) to look at the Fisherman Bay freeholding project and I think that was the only reason why council took a risk on employing somebody with no local government experience, because I had the infrastructure experience," she said.

The project enabled householders at the bay to freehold their properties, which they had previously leased from Fisherman Bay Management on 12month agreement.

The project also delivered seawalls, roads, stormwater and modern wastewater infrastructure to the settlement.

"I'm really proud of how we worked with (civil construction company) Bardavcol and FBM to get that job finished," Ms Wauchope said.

"It was really quite a difficult job putting the infrastructure around existing housing.

"When I first started, we thought there was probably about 15 to 20 per cent of people living down there full-time.

"Now, our community wastewater management lagoons indicate that about 85 per cent of people are now living there permanently."

In her report, Ms Wauchope said council's rate revenue had increased by 40 per cent during her tenure, rising from \$4.9M to \$7.02M.

Its asset base had increased from \$53M to \$81.7M while capital investment had risen from \$1M a year to

Among her other achievements, Ms Wauchope listed the development of the Top of the Yorke tourism brand. annual events such as the Show 'N' Shine and ANZAC Day poppy display, and initiatives such as the Community Pantry and Dementia Friendly Community.

She also highlighted council's advocacy to the state and federal governments, with \$7.7M secured from both during her tenure to fund projects such as the upgrade of the Upper Yorke Road between Bute and Port Broughton, the Civic Square upgrades, the Fisherman Bay project and expansion of the Rural Care Program in Bute.

Ms Wauchope said she was leaving the role at BWC with mixed emotions.

"The elected members have been absolutely brilliant in allowing us as an administration to deliver what we saw was essential or needed in the community over the past five years," she said.

"I'm going to miss the community and the staff, definitely, and the elected members.

"There's still so much to do within the Barunga West Council area."

Special meeting tonight

BARUNGA West Council will hold a special meeting tonight, Tuesday, October 28, as chief executive Maree Wauchope prepares to finish at the council on Friday, October 31.

Ms Wauchope resigned in September, with long-serving BWC staff member Tamara Harrison appointed interim chief executive while council recruits a replacement.

The meeting agenda will focus on proposed changes to the Annual Business Plan and Long-Term Financial Plan.

These were initially developed under acting chief executive Paul Simpson during Ms Wauchope's 10-month medical leave, which ended in August.

Ms Wauchope said the updated plans reflected council's recent decisions regarding the reinstatement of the Community Grants Scheme, road maintenance, and the return to a sustainable fleet and equipment replacement program.

"These changes ensure the budget and Long Term Financial Plan accurately reflect what is actually happening, providing the incoming chief executive with an accurate picture.

"Additionally, we've identified significant savings on capital projects, which has helped reduce our debt position."

Swimming jetty design released for Wallaroo

DRAFT plans for the long-awaited Wallaroo aquatic park have been released.

The Copper Coast Council website shows the swimming jetty's design with close-up views of three platforms within the play area, sectioned off by shark exclusion netting.

"Since March 2025, council's contract design team have been undertaking the necessary investigation, engineering, and detailed design of the Wallaroo aquatic facility," the website says.

The draft plans ... mean that the project can progress to the procurement phase.

"Through a formal tender process, council will seek a preferred contractor to finalise the remaining final design, construction plans and, subject to all necessary consents, will commence building the facility in 2026."

The website said construction was set to begin in February 2026 and be completed by December.

The project was announced in May 2024, with \$2.12 million in grant funding from the federal government's Growing Regions program announced, supported by a \$3M council contribution.

The park was set to include a swimming jetty, shark barrier, pontoons, play equipment and shelters.

Wallaroo's previous swimming jetty was destroyed in a 2016 storm and replaced with a failed swimming enclosure in 2017, which has resulted in ongoing legal proceedings between council and contractor SeaSlip.

Price change for YPCT online

Free discs for pets after death of Patrick

DOG and cat owners in the Barunga West Council area will be entitled to free identification discs when registering their pets.

At its monthly meeting on October 14, councillors supported a motion without notice from Mayor Leonie Kerley to provide the discs on request.

The discs can be attached to pet collars and engraved with contact details; each household will be eligible for up to two discs for cats and two for dogs.

The decision follows the death of Port Broughton cat Patrick, who was euthanised in July after being seized by a council officer.

No microchip was detected at the time by the officer or contracted veterinarian.

It was later confirmed that Patrick had been microchipped and registered, and was the muchloved pet of local police officer Drew Shepherd and his family.

The incident occurred while Barunga West Council chief executive Maree Wauchope was on medical leave.

Council has since apologised to the Shepherd family, issued almost \$4000 in compensation, and introduced changes to its cat management policy.

Mayor Kerley said she hoped the discs would help keep pets safe.

"We're all aware that ... many cats freely roam and unfortunately can become lost or say to be injured in a road accident or are trapped," she said.

"(A disc) will allow an animal to be quickly identified prior to scanning (for a microchip) and returned to its owner before the situation escalates to having a council employee collect the animal for

owner assessment."

Blank discs for cats or dogs would cost about \$3 each and pet owners would need to pay for the engraving.

"If every owner accepted a \$3 disc, the cost to council would be \$2643, not a massive cost to keep our treasured animals safer," Mrs Kerley said.

Valued at more than \$3000, Patrick, 3, was a Bengal, a hybrid created from crossing an Asian leopard cat with domestic cats.

Patrick was a kitten when he was given as a gift to Mr Shepherd by his wife Emma and their four

"While nothing can bring Patrick

back, I'm heartened by the positive changes the council has made," Mr Shepherd said.

"They've implemented a more compassionate approach, prioritising reuniting trapped cats with their owners and exploring rehoming options before euthanasia.

"This shift in policy has been a glimmer of hope in a difficult situation.

"I'd like to see similar changes implemented statewide, ensuring that no other cat or family has to go through what we've endured.

"It's a testament to the power of advocacy and the importance of working towards creating a more compassionate community for all animals."

Changes to cat policy

Barunga West Council has revised its community engagement plan on cat management.

At its October 14 meeting, council had resolved to consult the community on two approaches: a curfew or full containment.

However, legal advice from Norman Waterhouse received since that meeting confirmed that council's Cats By-law 2025 mandates full containment unless a cat is under effective control.

The advice is included in a report from Ms Wauchope for a special council meeting tonight, Tuesday, October 28.

Councillors will be asked to endorse a revised approach to community engagement, focused on education and awareness of the existing full containment rule.

The engagement will also seek feedback on how the rule is working in practice and identify ways to improve education and enforcement.

At the October 14 meeting, Ms Wauchope said the engagement proposal followed an incident involving a pet cat named Patrick in Port Broughton earlier this year (see story this page).

After this, immediate changes were made to cat management practices, and council provided compensation to the owner, while acknowledging that no payment could replace the loss of a family pet.

"We've continued to grapple with longstanding cat issues in Bute, where, despite numerous expiations and notices, compliance remains a challenge," Ms Wauchope noted in her report.

"These incidents highlight the need for a clear policy framework and stronger by-law provisions to restore community confidence and support effective enforcement."

SACOSS urges adoption of YP health priorities

THE peak body for South Australia's non-government community, social and health sectors has urged the SA Government to adopt the urgent priorities identified in the parliamentary inquiry into health services on Yorke Peninsula.

SA Council of Social Service chief executive Dr Catherine Earl said the report was a vital step towards improving health outcomes for people in the region, particularly those experiencing poverty or disadvantage.

She was commenting on the Inquiry into Delivery of Health Services on the Yorke Peninsula report, tabled by the Economic and Finance Committee in the SA Parliament on Wednesday, September 17.

The inquiry's recommendations include upgrading services at Wallaroo Hospital, developing emergency departments at Yorketown and Maitland, expanding volunteer ambulance crews, introducing community-based mental health practitioners, and providing hospital support for emergency department presentations.

Proposals also include improving the Patient Assisted Transport Scheme and introducing measures to attract and retain health professionals.

SACOSS and its project, the People's Health Voice, both made submissions to the inquiry.

Dr Earl said the PHV submission drew on input from 80 YP residents about the health issues most affecting them.

"YP residents communicated

clearly that timely access to primary and emergency care, affordable transport, digital inclusion in healthcare, and perinatal supports are urgent priorities," she said.

"While the inquiry gave patients and communities a voice, SACOSS and the PHV urge that this listening must now be matched with meaningful investment and action.

"SACOSS also continues to advocate for greater investment in public housing and childcare infrastructure to address barriers to responsive healthcare in the region."

Dr Earl said SACOSS and the PHV welcomed several of the inquiry's recommendations, including the call for a dedicated Child, Adolescent and Family Health Services presence in the Yorke Peninsula Council area to fill a longstanding gap.

PHV received an \$800,000 grant in February 2023 to provide an independent patient advocacy service following the closure of the Health Consumers' Alliance of SA in 2020.

Dr Earl said the recommendations highlighted the need for sustained PHV funding to ensure rural voices continued to shape health policy and reform.

As reported in YP Country Times on October 21, the Health Minister Chris Picton has committed to responding to the report "within the next few months".

Consultation is also underway to help the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network develop its Yorke Peninsula Plan 2026-2031.

Big win for progress association

MARION Bay Progress Association is celebrating a win after years of lobbying for the speed limit past the General Store on Yorke Highway to be reduced from 80km/h to 60 km/h.

The road has no footpaths, causing foot traffic to share the road with vehicles.

Association secretary Tiffany Falzon said it was a great outcome. "It's been years in the making,"

Ms Falzon said.

"I got the call in the morning (October 23) and was told it would take a few months, but when I drove back home the next day, the signs were up."

Ms Falzon took up the fight three years ago, facing repeated rejections along the way.

'The reason behind it was that

there weren't enough businesses and no fatalities," she said.

"You've got cars and caravans parking on the side of the road and the school bus that stops along there. It was an accident waiting to happen."

She said Dianah Walter from Regions Matter, along with letters of support from the Yorke Peninsula Council and Narungga MP Fraser Ellis, helped get the issue over the line.

"It's crazy it took this long and had that many rejections.

"You don't want a fatality be the cause of the change to happen."

The speed limit along this section of the Yorke Highway was once 100 km/h before being reduced to 80 km/h, thanks to advocacy by the progress association.

There is still more to do but at least it's a bit safer now," Ms Falzon said.

"WE are in for an extremely difficult summer with our hospitality and tourism businesses looking at a smaller visiting cohort," Narungga MP Fraser Ellis said.

"We need to ensure that none of our valued businesses slip through the cracks on the government support that is offered."

Ryan Valente, from Reef Encounters at Marion Bay, who is president of the Charter Boat Association of South Australia, said there was a "clear gap" between what the available science was showing for snapper numbers and the evidence seen in the field.

"The bycatch of snapper is at an all-time high, of all sizes, and the problem is widespread in our industry despite our constant effort to avoid them," Mr Valente said.

"We believe the stock can be sustainably accessed by the charter industry with the implementation of strict regulations.

"This will help turn the key to tourism and support the government's agenda to maintain visitation to coastal towns."

Mr Valente said, since the snapper ban began, the fishing pressure had moved onto nannygai as an alternative species.

That pressure was set to increase when the bag and boat reductions for whiting took effect on November

He said the fact that snapper were a predatory species meant they could have an impact on stocks of other species if their numbers continued to grow unchecked, and it did not make sense to shut commercial fishing down in Gulf St Vincent and leave it unchanged in Spencer Gulf.

"Spencer Gulf is just as fragile as Gulf St Vincent — I can't understand why it is staying open to commercial fishing," he said.

Seafood Industry SA executive officer Kyri Toumazos said the industry was facing its hardest journey in the history of commercial fishing in the state, but he congratulated the SA Government on introducing restrictions.

"The decision to look after fish stocks in a trajectory of rebuilding over the next period is the right decision which we fully support," he said.

New fishing restrictions

Premier Peter Malinauskas has announced that all commercial fishing will be banned in the Gulf St Vincent zone, while 50 per cent reductions will apply to bag and boat limits for recreational and charter

In the Spencer Gulf zone, where fishing effort is expected to increase, a 50 per cent reduction in bag and boat limits for recreational and charter boat fishing will apply to calamari, garfish, blue crab and King George whiting.


Commercial fishing in Spencer Gulf will remain unaffected, as will the state's commercial sardine, abalone and rock lobster fisheries.

Prawn fisheries will operate as normal, with a temporary November-December spawning closure in parts of northern Gulf St Vincent.

Existing fishing restrictions on snapper will be extended until June

Mr Malinauskas said stock assessments in both gulfs had shown declines in some species, including calamari, garfish and King George whiting, particularly in Gulf St Vincent, where other species including blue crab and abalone had also been impacted.

Recreational fishers were strongly encouraged to assist the scientific effort by reporting their catches via the SA Fishing App.



Algal bloom recovery plan

A RANGE of measures to help the long-term recovery of fish stocks was announced by Premier Peter Malinauskas last week, as part of the South Australian Government's Algal Bloom Summer Plan.

The measures are in addition to new fishing restrictions in the Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf zones (see story opposite).

They include:

- Affected fishing licence holders can access fee relief, as well as grants of up to \$375,000 for business support, employee retention and diversification. Fee relief will be automatically applied for the remainder of 2025-26, while the closure date for the Fisheries and Aquaculture Assistance Grant and Small Business Support Grant will be extended to July 31, 2026.
- A third round of Small Business Support grants will be introduced and the value of grants under the second and third round increased to \$20,000. An eligible small business may be entitled to up to \$50,000 in support until mid-2026.
- \$500,000 for a voluntary Marine Scalefish Fishery

- licence surrender study to examine the long-term sustainability of the fishery, including buyback analysis
- Establishment of an industry recovery framework
- A 50 per cent discount on boat and boat trailer registration for 12 months., starting December 1
- The SA Government will work with councils to provide free boat launch facilities across SA for 12 months
- Free vehicle access to national and conservation parks in affected coastal regions during and up until
- \$3 million for a targeted breeding, conservation and fish stocking program for vulnerable and threatened species impacted by the algal bloom.
- \$4M to establish a restocking program with a focus on target species including snapper and King George whiting
- \$1M for native freshwater fish stocking
- \$5.79M for additional fisheries officers and marine park rangers and intensified monitoring and assessment of fish stocks until June 2027
- An additional \$300,000 to expand offshore recreational fishing reefs
- An additional \$1.1M to support the recreational fishing community and tackle stores through events, competitions, programs and public campaigns

WALLAROO fisher Kane Kaiser says halving bag and boat limits in Spencer Gulf is the right thing to do.

Otherwise, he said, the gulf's fish stocks would have been put under too much pressure from displaced fishing effort in response to recreational limits in the Gulf St Vincent zone, which covers all of the Adelaide metropolitan coastline.

"It's good that they have halved the limits so it protects the stock on our side," he said.

"It gives a chance for others to come here and still give everyone a share (of fish).

"Everyone deserves to go out and catch a feed of fish."

Mr Kaiser and his children Azaria and Ryker are keen fishers and he said he was still catching bag limits a couple of times a week.

"The snapper are absolutely everywhere and taking over the whiting holes," he said.

Andrew and Ann Cundy, of Greenock in the Barossa Valley, have a caravan in Wallaroo and have been visiting regularly for fishing about once every six weeks for the past 20 years.

However, they say the new fishing restrictions mean they would probably not visit as often.

"We would certainly have to think about our time and make sure the weather is right," Mr Cundy said.

"If it's as bad as what they say, I can't see it (impacts of the algal bloom) being fixed in such a short time, it will take quite a few years."

Mr Cundy said the restrictions would limit how often recreational fishers travelled to coastal areas, along with their spending.

Commercial fisher Russell Boord, who has called for a ban on fishing in Gulf St Vincent (YPCT 21-10-25) welcomed the shutdown of commercial fishing in the gulf but said it should have been extended to all recreational fishing.



Mr Boord said, while the SA Government had a wealth of data on catches by commercial fishers, it had "no idea" how many fish of various species were being caught by recreational fishers.

"I can guarantee you that the recreational sector catches more than what we catch," he said.

"We have got about 300,000 recreational fishers in this state, so if even one per cent of them are doing the wrong thing, that's

Mr Boord said there was a lot of illegal poaching of fish for sale, but PIRSA had insufficient fisheries officers to combat the problem.

Yorke Peninsula **Council not** consulted on new fishing restrictions

YORKE Peninsula Council says it was not consulted about the newly announced fishing restrictions — despite its chief executive Andrew Cameron being a member of the South Australian Government's Algal Bloom Taskforce Reference Group.

"The idea of reducing recreational fishing limits was not discussed at that level, or directly with council," Deputy Mayor Richard Carruthers said.

"We know that recreational fishing is a major drawcard for our region with almost one third of tourists visiting specifically to fish.

"Council has put in a lot of work to support our businesses and wider community through the ongoing algal bloom and that will continue.

"This work includes direct business assistance, advocacy, marketing and other efforts to drive tourism and economic activity such as hosting and supporting local events."

A Copper Coast Council spokesperson said council was unaware the SA Government had been considering free access to boat ramps under its recovery program but welcomed further support for communities affected by the

CCC was seeking additional information on the implementation of the announced measures.

"The Copper Coast's coastline remains largely unaffected by the algal bloom, and council looks forward to a prosperous peak-tourist season for our tourism operators and broader business sector," the spokesperson said.

"Our population triples over summer with tourist and seasonal visitors.

"At such a key time of year, it is important that any intervention measure installed by a government considers our booming tourism sector and encourages visitation."

A spokesperson for the Barunga West Council said council had not been directly consulted regarding the temporary fishing restrictions, as local waters had not been severely affected by the algal bloom.

"While we understand these measures are based on scientific advice to support fish stock recovery, particularly in Gulf St Vincent and around Kangaroo Island, we recognise there may be some impact on local businesses and tourism," they said.

BWC encouraged affected businesses and residents to contact the office of Narungga MP Fraser Ellis, as he was collecting feedback on the impact of the restrictions, the spokesperson said.

"People need to know what they will do when a bad fire day approaches - including where they will go, when they will leave, and what they

Fire season dates are set in consultation with relevant Bushfire Management Committees and confirmed by CFS Chief Officer Brett Loughlin AFSM. A permit is required for most burning activities during the Fire Danger Season or on days where a Total Fire Ban is declared.

Permits may be issued under the Fire and Emergency Services Act 2005 by an authorised officer of a local council. \$250k program to lift spirits

A \$250,000 PROGRAM to help South Australian distilleries expand locally and into export markets has been launched by the state government.

The Spirits Expansion Program, to be delivered in partnership with peak body Distillers South Australia, will aim to build on the sector's growth.

Trade and Investment Minister Joe Szakacs said exports were worth \$32.9 million a year and had increased by 24 per cent over the past 12 months.

"The two-year program will build export capability, drive consumer demand, and unlock commercial outcomes for the state's world-class spirits sector," he said.

"It will also leverage Brand SA's 'Buy SA. For SA' campaign and activities to drive consumer awareness and showcase local distillers.

"Premium South Australian spirits play a central role in promoting one of South Australia's most recognised attributes globally — premium and unique food,

wine and beverage production.

"The incredible growth of the sector, and its projected future growth, is testament to the quality of our top-shelf producers."

Mr Szakacs said since 2013, the number of distillers across the state had grown rapidly from around 10 to more than 100, with many located in regional

Among them is the Bond Store, Wallaroo, a distillery, microbrewery and restaurant which produces seven flavours of gin, a limoncello and liqueurs.

Owners Andrea Iannucci and Elisa D'Amico welcomed the program as an opportunity to shine a light on smaller producers in regional areas.

"For us at the Bond Store, it's not just about putting Wallaroo on the map — it's about showing that regional SA has a thriving craft scene that can stand alongside the best," Ms D'Amico said.

"Many visitors are genuinely surprised when they walk through our doors.

"They don't expect to find a fully operational microbrewery and distillery offering award-winning gins, craft beers, and house-made liqueurs right here in Wallaroo.

"We definitely see ourselves as part of the region's evolving tourism story - offering something unique for visitors to experience."

Ms D'Amico said Bond Store gins were sold at a number of Adelaide bottle shops and would soon be available at a local store.

"We're incredibly proud to call Wallaroo home and to be part of such a supportive community," Ms D'Amico said.

"Our goal has always been to create something that locals can be proud of — a space that showcases the best of regional craft and hospitality."



Bute Rest Centre lease extended

BARUNGA West Council has extended the lease of the former Bute Rest Centre to the Bute 2000 Onwards Progress Association for a further two years.

The new lease will begin on July 1, 2026, following the association's successful delivery of its initial lease commitments and increased community use of the facility.

Mayor Leonie Kerley said the extension reflected council's confidence in the association's management of the site and the positive contribution it continued to make to the Bute commu-

"Council is pleased to see this facility once again being used actively and maintained through community effort," she said.

"The Bute 2000 Onwards Progress Association has shown real initiative in reactivating the rest centre, attracting new activities, and ensuring the building remains a valued space for everyone in the local community."

The Bute Rest Centre was built in the 1950s and is owned by council.

Outback walk raises over \$10k for RFDS

HARDWICKE Bay resident Sue Leverton has raised more than \$10,000 for the Royal Flying Doctor Service by taking part in the 2025 Oceans to Outback Walk during October.

As of Sunday evening, Sue had surpassed the significant fundraising milestone for a cause she holds close to her heart.

"I set my target at \$5000, so to raise as much as I have is an amazing feeling and it is all going to a fantastic cause," Ms Leverton said.

"I was a remote area nurse, so I had daily contact with the RFDS, and I have great respect for all the work they do."

Ms Leverton walked nearly 400 kilometres over 21 days, starting at Port Clinton and finishing near Corny Point.

Ms Leverton said she came

across several acts of generosity on her journey, including places that offered accommodation.

"People came up to me and heard what I was doing and wanted to help — I picked up \$650 in donations along my walk, which was amazing that people did that for me," she said.

"Some places offered me discounted accommodation too, which really helped and gave to the cause.

"Butlers Beach had all their beach pods booked out the day I arrived, so they put me in their homestead for the evening, which was very generous of them."

Ms Leverton's walk took her

down the bottom end of the Yorke Peninsula, which meant she had to carry extra supplies.

On past hikes, she had carried a bag weighing around 10 kilograms, but this time she had to carry upwards of 14kg while walking.

"I had to have at least three litres of water, and I had a little stove that I used to make food when I was down the bottom

Upon returning home, she was presented with a certificate of thanks from the RFDS on Friday evening, October 24, at the Hardwicke Bay community club, recognising her efforts.

"I'm grateful for the support I've received over the years,"



VET courses more popular than ever in SA schools

NEW data from the National Centre for Vocational Education Research shows a rise in enrolments and participation in vocational education and training (VET) across South Australian schools in 2024.

The figures, released earlier this month, highlight increased uptake of VET programs among secondary students.

Ardrossan Area School VET coordinator Jason Clifford said student numbers in 2025 have increased slightly compared to recent years.

"In the past, we have accessed the Certificate II in Construction which was hosted by Yorketown Area School and the Cert. III Early Childhood courses in Kadina," Mr Clifford said.

"More recently, we have the resources course in Ardrossan, the electro-tech course in Maitland and IT course in Moonta.

"For our school, we're ex-

pecting an increase in VET enrolments in 2026."

The growth of the VET program has led to new course offerings for students, including a Certificate II in Resources and Infrastructure introduced at Ardrossan this year.

"Partnerships with companies such as Rex Minerals, SIMEC, Bunge, Cheetham Salt and T-Ports are creating great interest in this course and the opportunities that come with it," Mr Clifford said.

The Yorke Peninsula Secondary Alliance has played a key role in delivering VET courses to students across the region, allowing students to access training locally, without needing to travel to larger centres such as Adelaide or Port Pirie.

"Traditionally, travel has been a huge barrier for YP students accessing courses which has somewhat been negated through the collaboration of the YP schools to provide the opportunities locally," Mr Clifford said.

"VET courses can provide

an advantage to students when they are applying for jobs in that they can show the potential employers that they have a keen interest in this area.

"It can often set them apart from other applicants as they already have many of the skills that the employer will be looking for."

Industry, Innovation and Science Minister Joe Szakacs said VET courses played a vital role in shaping the futures of South Australian students by helping them build career pathways while completing their SACE.

"VET programs are critical to providing a skilled workforce in support of the major, multi-generational projects on the horizon in South Australia including AUKUS, major infrastructure projects and 3-year-old preschool," he said.

"VET is now known as a rewarding, future-focused choice for school students, backed by government investment and aligned with real-world opportunities."

SA Water's Morgan Water Treatment Plant has been crowned South Australia's best tasting tap water in the 2025 IXOM Water Taste Test

The plant, located in the Riverland, supplies safe, clean drinking water to around 130,000 homes and businesses across regional South Australia.

Water from Morgan is piped hundreds of kilometres – including to Yorke Peninsula, the Mid North and Eyre Peninsula.

On average, the plant produces 31 billion litres of

water a year, accounting for around 40 per cent of SA Water's regional water supply.

SA Water senior manager of production and treatment Paul Bendotti said the win was a credit to the local operators who work hard every day to maintain high water quality.

"Morgan has taken out the state title for best tasting water for the third time - previously winning in 2016 and 2017 — and we're thrilled to be recognised again," Mr Bendotti said.

Water samples were judged by the Water Industry Operations Association of Australia on colour, clarity, odour and taste. Morgan beat out 16 other entries to take the top spot and will now represent South Australia in the national final, to be held in Queensland in December.

A national win would see Morgan water represent Australia in the international water tasting competition held in the United States next vear.

Featured poet Nigel Ford, who is an open mic poetry finalist for South Australia, rocked the house with his passionate words — a powerful character indeed.


The event received positive feedback, and the group is looking toward its next event on November 19.

Just Mates has been performing across Peninsula since early 2020.





Mother Nature spreads rain across Yorke Peninsula

YORKE Peninsula and beyond had a refreshing soak last week as storms swept across parts of South Australia.

For some, the rainfall came at just the right time — aiding the final stages of crop growth. But, for others, it came too late to have a positive impact.

Independent agronomist and Crop Consulting Services director Craig Davis described the outcome as a "mixed bag",

with results varying depending on crop timing and location.

'It's too late for some with harvest just about to start. For others it could have a significant impact, assisting with most crops," he said. "It's quite limited."

Bureau of Meteorology data collected from Tuesday to Monday, October 21-27 shows varied rainfall totals across the region.

Bute recorded 28.5mm, Wallaroo had 39.8mm, Kadina received 47.8mm, Paskeville had 28mm, Moonta recorded 31.6mm, Price received 20.2mm, Maitland had 36.8mm, Minlaton recorded 22.2mm and Port Vincent received 26mm.

Stansbury recorded 19mm, while Yorketown and Edithburgh recorded 9.8mm and 10mm respectively.

Port Broughton also received 20mm, and Snowtown recorded 23.4mm over the week.

Mr Davis said properties around Maitland and Arthurton as well as areas in the southern Yorke Peninsula and the Mid North could benefit from the rain.

For the Lower North, it looked to be too late, he said.

"If the rain came around four weeks ago, we'd probably be fine," he said.

"Issues are the potential downgrades in the quality of the crop and summer weeds."

Mr Davis emphasised the potential impact of the recent rain on hay that had already been cut but not baled.

"It could turn into poor-quality hay, and then farmers would have to market weatherdamaged hay," he said.



Waterwise project to strengthen drought resilience

Landscape Board has secured a grant from the South Australian Government's Landscape Priorities Fund, which will fund a project to help primary producers prepare for and adapt to dry times.

The Waterwise Farming project will support primary producers to improve on-farm water security and storage and make informed water use decisions through the development of a farm-based water audit

This online calculator will be tailored to help address specific water issues and support primary producers to explore opportunities to better utilise and capture more rainfall.

"This has come at a great time for our region, especially off the back of the 2024 season, which gave us some of the driest months on record," NYLB sustainable agriculture facilitator Brianna Guidera

"For many, the 2024 season was just another devastating blow on top of past dry seasons, so it's safe to say water storage has been at the forefront of many primary producers' minds."

Demonstration sites and trials will be delivered to investigate practical water security and efficiency solutions, as well as weather stations and soil

A field day is also set to go ahead early next year, giving those impacted by drought an opportunity to see new technologies and equipment firsthand that will help future-proof their properties.

"We are really excited to use this project to explore new ideas," Ms Guidera said.

"We'll also look at regions like ours to see how they are tackling the issues we have in Northern and Yorke.

"It's great to make water storage and security a priority, now, more than ever."

The Waterwise Farming project is one of eight sub-projects within the Climate Resilient Landscapes project, which was awarded \$1.6 million through LPF to improve landscapes and natural ecosystems in regional

The plan outlines how grain growers can capitalise on the rising global demand for renewable fuels by adopting a 'feedstock first' approach and positioning themselves at the forefront of the emerging LCLF market.

GRDC managing director Nigel Hart said the roadmap provides a clear vision for how the grains sector can seize new opportunities in this rapidly growing industry.

The next oil boom will be on the farm, not under it," Mr Hart said.

"This roadmap shows how Australian grain growers, supported by worldclass research and innovation, can lead the way in supplying sustainable feedstocks for low carbon liquid fuels."

He said coordinated investment across crop innovation, agronomy and supply chains would unlock new markets, boost farm profitability and support the decarbonisation goals of both the grains and fuel sectors.

The roadmap identifies three development horizons: expanding oilseed cropping, intensifying oil production, and innovating with advanced biomass.

With decarbonisation policies driving global demand — especially in hard-to-electrify sectors like aviation, marine and heavy transport — Mr Hart said Australian growers have a unique opportunity to supply both export and future domestic markets.

"Growers are already producing high-quality, sustainable grain to feed the world.

"By embracing the LCLF opportunity, they can diversify incomes, strengthen regional economies and enhance fuel security."

Mr Hart said GRDC will work with research, commercial and investment partners to help deliver the innovation and scale required for long-term industry success.

The roadmap's release follows the Australian Government's recent announcement of a \$1.1 billion, 10-year Cleaner Fuels Program to support the development of low carbon liquid fuels.

Growers call for 'right to repair' for agricultural machinery

GRAINGROWERS Australia has renewed calls for the federal government to introduce a legislated Right to Repair framework for agricultural machinery.

The group is arguing for targeted amendments to the Competition and Consumer Act to ensure farmers have the same protections granted to the light vehicle sector.

Speaking at the 2025 Australian Repair Summit in Canberra, GrainGrowers advocacy and rural affairs manager Sean Cole said farmers deserved the freedom to choose how and where their machinery is repaired.

He said existing laws locked farmers into restrictive servicing arrangements, limiting access to affordable, timely repairs and undermining productivity across the sector.

Under current Australian Consumer Law, most agricultural machinery is excluded from consumer guarantee protections - including third-party repair rights because the law applies only to goods under \$100,000.

With the cost of tractors, harvesters and other essential machinery routinely exceeding that threshold, farmers were effectively left without legal safeguards that apply elsewhere.

Cole pointed to the Productivity Commission's 2021 Right to Repair report, which recommended a mandatory repair supplies obligation on agricultural machinery manufactur-

Implementing this recommendation, he said, would require updating the Competition and Consumer Act 2010 to ensure manufacturers provide access to repair information, parts and diagnostic tools - including software and security protocols on fair and reasonable terms.

He also cited findings from the ACCC's 2021 Agricultural Machinery Market Study, which found that farmers faced limited servicing options due to manufacturer control over repair information.

The report noted that software locks and contractual restrictions often prevented independent technicians from carrying out even basic

Assistant Minister for Competition, Dr Andrew Leigh, acknowledged the issue during a 2024 address to the ABARES conference, stating that farmers had limited choice when buying machinery, but even less when it came to servicing it.

Leigh confirmed the Productivity Commission had recommended government action to introduce a repair supplies obligation.

Cole warned that, without reform, farmers would continue to bear the costs of monopolised servicing arrangements that reduced competition, delayed repairs and threatened the resilience of regional economies.

"This is a no-brainer for a government looking for productivity wins, strengthening regional resilience and food security," he said.

"The framework already exists in the light vehicle sector.

"Extending it to agriculture is a matter of fairness and economic

Adelaide researchers help uncover gene linked to multi-ovary wheat



AN international research team, including scientists from the University of Adelaide, has discovered the gene responsible for a rare form of wheat that produces three ovaries per flower instead of one.

This unique trait, found in a spontaneous mutant of common bread wheat, has the potential to boost grain yields and improve hybrid seed production efficiency.

While the trait was known, the genetic changes behind it had remained unclear, until now.

The team, led by researchers from the University of Maryland and University of Adelaide, and involving collaborators from the

United States, Australia, Canada, the United Kingdom and New Zealand, created a highly detailed DNA map of the multi-ovary wheat and compared it with standard wheat varieties.

They found a complex genome rearrangement had triggered the activation of the usually dormant WUSCHEL-D1 (WUS-D1) gene.

When switched on early in flower development, this gene causes flower-building tissues to enlarge, enabling the formation of additional female reproductive

"Pinpointing the genetic basis of this trait offers a path for breeders to incorporate it into new wheat varieties, potentially increasing the number of grains per spike and overall yield," said University of Maryland Associate Professor of Plant Sciences and co-senior report author Vijay Tiwari.

"By employing a gene editing toolkit, we can now focus on further improving this trait for enhancing wheat yield and improving breeding technologies to develop cost-effective hybrid wheat."

The study, published in PNAS, also reveals new insights into the biology of yield-related traits in wheat.

"Identifying WUS-D1 as a regulator of ovary formation in wheat reveals new opportunities to improve yield by increasing the number of cells in the developing floral structures," University of Adelaide Associate Professor Scott Boden said.

"These findings also demonstrate exciting links between floral development in wheat and other major cereals, such as maize, rice and barley."

The research team hopes their finding could lead to new wheat varieties that grow more grains per plant, contributing to the huge increases in food supply required at the global scale for the world's growing population.

HOT FISHING TIPS

This week's report should start with a mention of the changes to recreational and commercial fishing rules as at November 1, 2025. Here's the recreational fishing link: https://tinyurl.com/4is92fe3.

Recipe, seafood burger: Ingredients fish pieces, crabmeat, prawns, white onion, lettuce, bread rolls, chopped pickled onions, olive oil, chopped green chilli, bread crumbs, wasabi paste. Preparation – gently blend the seafood and mix with some oil, wasabi/chilli, breadcrumbs and caramelised onions. Make burgers, brush with oil and cook on medium hot plate for 3-4 mins. Plate with lettuce, pickled onions and wasabi paste.

Wallaroo: Last week's marine weather featured very high tides (over 3 metres) as boat crews made the most of early calm conditions to target garfish, blue crabs, King George whiting and trumpeters. The jetty was popular, with anglers landing the odd flathead, and big bream have been seen inside the marina. The rocky shore north of the old Point Riley shacks is producing quality gar in offshore breezes. The upcoming ban on commercial fishing in Gulf St Vincent is set to make the coming months particularly interesting.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: A local angler

has returned to Steamer Channel and the West Light grounds after a long break, catching whiting, squid, small kingfish and blue crabs. Small squid are active around local jetties at dusk, and garfish have been spotted in Moonta Bay. During last Wednesday's high tides, flathead were found close to shore along local sandy beaches.

Port Victoria: Boat crews fishing off Wardang Island last week reported whiting catches up to 39cm. Slightly smaller fish were taken from the grounds near the Songvaar wreck. The jetty is producing a few blue crabs and garfish.

Point Turton: Fishing quota cuts have also been applied to charter boat passengers, which will affect businesses operating on the Spencer Gulf side of the Yorke Peninsula. Time will tell how significant the impact will be. Recreational boat fishers reported catches of whiting, garfish and squid, while a few garfish were also taken from the jetty.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Tommy ruff (Australian herring) made a welcome return to the Stenhouse Bay jetty last week, with a steady afternoon bite. Shore-based anglers targeted mullet, flathead and salmon trout from local beaches and the Pondalowie Bay rock ledge. Meanwhile, boat crews launching from Marion Bay reported catches of red nannygai, sweep, small kingfish and flathead.
