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

Holiday traffic flows

VISITORS to and from Yorke Peninsula enjoyed a smoother journey via Port Wakefield across the long weekend.

All four lanes through Port Wakefield were opened for the first time on Friday, September 30, producing a smoother journey for many drivers.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said the overpass and highway had already

make in just one weekend.

"Holidaymakers got their first taste of the improved roadway with two lanes open to traffic in both directions through Port Wakefield over the weekend, as thousands of drivers headed to getaway spots on the Yorke Peninsula and in the state's north," he said.

"The \$124.5 million federal/statefunded project has improved traffic flow and reduced congestion for all road users, and improved safety by removing the dangerous inter-

Copper Coast Highway and Augusta Highway."

Mr Koutsantonis said it had also improved safety and freight productivity along the National Land Transport Network.

"Port Wakefield Highway typically carries 8800 vehicles per day; however, this can almost double during holiday peak periods and on long weekends," he said.

"Motorists are reminded roadworks further north of Port Wakefield are continuing as part of the Augusta

Port Wakefield and Lochiel, which may impact traffic flow.

"Minor work around the Port Wakefield township continues, with the full Port Wakefield Highway project expected to be completed weather permitting — later this year."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said it was wonderful to see the next step taken toward the conclusion of the works.

"While the new configuration will take getting used to, I am sure it will result in improvement in traffic flow

"Perhaps the best sign of its working was the nightly news focusing on traffic jams to the south of the city this long weekend, and not on the customary kilometres of near-stationary vehicles near Port Wakefield.

"For all who regularly travel to and from Yorke Peninsula, the overpass and lane duplication project now nearing completion is cause for real celebration.

"Thanks especially to the residents and businesses of Port Wakefield for their patience while these works have

Support unpaid carers

THIS year's International Day of Older Persons (Saturday, October 1) focused on the resilience and contributions of older women, and it was sorely needed.

With workforce shortages causing chaos nationally, ageism continues to exclude older workers from employment, with older women more exposed to ageist discrimination than men.

At a time in life when many workers are at their professional peak and saving superannuation to support their retirement, many older women are losing earning time and superannuation potential.

This puts women at higher risk of poverty, welfare dependency and homelessness in older age. National Seniors Australia research suggests there is a strong gender disparity among those providing care to an ageing parent.

In a recent survey of more than 4000 Australians aged 50-plus, 69 per cent of the care for ageing parents was provided by women.

This work can be debilitating in terms of time, health and financial costs.

Given the projected shift in Australia from caring for older people in residential facilities to caring for them in their own homes, we know this situation will get worse not better.

Home care packages can lighten some of the load, but it's not 24/7 care.

At National Seniors Australia, older Australians tell us family members still have to fill the gaps in home-based care, and those gaps can be very wide.

Older people don't care only for parents.

They care for children too, which goes largely unrecognised by government and is often taken for granted in families.

National Seniors Australia's research also identified gender differences in grandparenting care. Among our sample women and men provided grandparent care about equally, with 27 per cent of women and 26 per cent of men actively grandparenting.

However, almost all the men who grandparent — a significant 93 per cent of our sample — had a partner, suggesting they share the burden of the labour as a couple.

This is not true of the women, among whom only 57 per cent had partners while 43 per cent were single, providing grandparent care on their own.

This suggests the financial, time and health costs of grandparenting may be higher for women than men on average, since many more women are doing it alone.

At the very least there should be public recognition and support for those doing it tough.

Older people who provide unpaid care for others are contributing labour to the Australian economy without recompense, and often at great personal and professional cost.

Many are not eligible for the carer payment because of its strict criteria.

Others are eligible but lose it if they continue in some paid work and earn over the allowable threshold.

The government's proposal to allow workers to take extended unpaid carer leave will not solve the problem of lost earning potential either.

And while workers can sometimes use personal leave to care for others, this disadvantages carers compared to non-carers because they have less paid leave available when they themselves fall sick.

Our research and that of others shows caring is associated with poorer mental and physical health, so carers need all the sick leave they can get or they magnify their risks.

To redress this inequity, National Seniors Australia recently proposed to the Senate Select Committee on Work and Care paid leave entitlements for carers be increased by instituting paid carer leave separate from personal leave.

Like Parental Leave, this would be a type of leave that some people will never need and others will, depending on life circumstances.

By expecting our carers to keep giving despite poverty and ill health, we are doing a disservice to older Australians who work, older Australians who care, and the older Australians for whom they care.

The resilience and contributions of older women and other older people deserve recognition, and in a form that pays the bills.

IT was a refreshing change to not see huge lines of traffic through Port Wakefield this long weekend.

For all the criticism of the highway duplication and overpass by some, the project seems to have at least eased some of the congestion.

I drove through Friday evening, on my way to watch an historic Showdown victory, and was hit by two thoughts.

The first was the number of vehicles heading north from Adelaide, with caravans and campers attached, and the second was how easily the traffic was moving.

I kid you not, it would have been a consistent stream of traffic without many breaks from Kulpara all the way to Port Wakefield.

But, by all reports, the traffic flowed freely and there were no real delays.

Tourism numbers in the region have remained high — imagine how many more people could visit the region if they didn't have to spend an extra couple of hours in the car during these peak holiday periods.

Most importantly, the works make the drive a little safer and this can only be a good thing.

George Street reopened for school holidays

GEORGE Street, Moonta, has reopened to vehicle traffic following an underground stormwater upgrade.

The road had been partially closed for more than a month while contractor M.A. Skinner installed the majority of 500 metres of stormwater drainage between Ellen and Henry Streets.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said a new underground central pipe along George Street would link into the existing stormwater system. "Conflicting services in the intersection of Henry and George Streets required a design change; on-site adjustments were necessary to suit and keep the project on schedule," Mr Neumann said.

"This included constructing an in-situ junction box and modifications to new side entry pits and junction boxes.

"These upgrades will stop consistent flooding on the street, which (previously) occurred almost anytime there was significant rain.

"Works started later than we anticipated due to supply delays, but credit to M.A. Skinner for finishing the project on schedule and getting the road open for the long weekend (Saturday to Monday, October 1-3)."

Mr Neumann said council had since turned its attention to phases 3 and 4 of the development.

"The next stage will involve further works from Cafe Capella's to Ellen Street, but this has halted for the school holidays (until Monday, October 17)," he said.

"Contractor and council staff will continue to liaise with business owners to keep them updated of the progress and inconveniences."

Community opposes boundary shift

LOCALS were given a chance to provide feedback on the proposed Tickera town boundary change last week.

Representatives from the South Australian Local Government Boundaries Commission visited the township to listen to submissions from the public.

Resident Dale Morphett is leading the proposal to move the boundary moved from a fenceline south of Tickera to along Black Rock and Kinnear Roads.

The land would shift from Copper Coast Council to Barunga West Council.

The commission has received 16 submissions about the proposal, with 81 per cent opposed to the change; its findings will be delivered in a report to Minister of Local Government Geoff Brock by Christmas.

Concerns raised by the community about a potential shift into Barunga West Council can be categorised into four main areas community interest, land use planning, boundary history and road maintenance.

Public submissions found residents of Tickera predominantly used the services provided by the Copper Coast Council in Wallaroo and Kadina, while there were also apprehensions around the possibility of land within the affected area being rezoned and developed.

The current boundary has also been in place for more than 100

years, with some residents questioning the need for a shift now.

CCC CEO Russell Peate said the proposed changes were solely motivated by an individual and did not involve the township itself.

"The proposal primarily involves Mr Morphett's land but also some shacks," he said.

Copper Coast Council proposal.

"The proposal involves changing a longstanding local government administrative boundary which has stood the test of time for more than 100 years of boundary reviews through many amalgamations of councils."

BWC CEO Maree Wauchope "It is not a Barunga West nor a said council staff met with the

commission and were happy to answer their questions.

"It was great to see the commission in Tickera asking key stakeholders and members of the community what they thought about the boundary change proposal," she said.

"Council respects this is a matter for the commission and a decision for the minister."

Grant gets golf course going

PORT Victoria Golf Club will have a brand new nine hole, par three golf course for people to try this summer, thanks in part to a Yorke Peninsula Council community grant.

The club, which is usually closed throughout the warmer months, has worked hard to get the course up and running.

Club vice-captain Vivienne Lambert said the innovative course was all about enticing new and younger people to come and have a hit.

"Golf Australia did some research about why numbers are falling in amateur golf clubs... what they found was people were less keen on playing 18 holes because there's a certain skill level required and it takes four hours," she said.

"People just want to get out and have a hit, that's what our par three is about introducing people to golf, but also allowing families to come out."

President Les Rochester said the course is open now but it's in the process of being bedded down, and will be officially launched on Friday, November 11.

He said the improvements will provide a pioneering golfing option on central Yorke.

"We thought about the idea on the back of a community push and came up with the concept and so the nine holes are actually integrated within our 18-hole course," he said.

"We have done it basically to provide the community with something to do during the six months from October to April, which is when this course is usually closed, as most are on Yorke Peninsula.

"Our membership has been fantastic in the way they've come out and put their time into the project, I think we're up to close to 50 hours in volunteering which is amazing.

"We've built four new tee-boxes, installed two new sand scrapes and the whole course covers 903 metres in length, which makes it easy for mums and dads with kids."


The course will feature a hole-inone jackpot on hole five for those who enter on Friday competition nights.

Mr Rochester said the support offered by YPC was absolutely vital for the project.

"It's been fantastic from our point of view council has got on board with the grant, which has been of great assistance to get this up, because we're a small little club," he said.

"If we didn't have a grant, we wouldn't have been able to do this, or it would've taken two or three years to get there.

"To us, the biggest cost is the supply of the materials, we don't have a big bank account to cover that, so for the council to step up and acknowledge that our project has been worthy of a grant is sensational."



NEW GREENS... Port Victoria Golf Club captain Ron Fairchild stands at the tee-box of hole two of the club's new nine hole, par three course.




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Five years in jail for **YP** arsonist

AN arsonist who was charged with starting six Yorke Peninsula bushfires last year has been jailed for five years.

Jane Judd was sentenced to five and a half years in prison by the District Court, Adelaide, last Wednesday, September 28.

Ms Judd was charged with lighting two fires at Agery, two between Arthurton and Maitland and two south of Maitland on November 5, 2021.

She pleaded guilty to two counts of causing a bushfire in relation to the fourth fire on the Spencer Highway.

The court found Ms Judd's offences were committed during fire danger season, at a time when the fire danger index was between 25 and 34, and the maximum temperature of the day was 30 degrees.

"To put the significance of this into perspective, farming machinery is required to stop operating at a fire danger index of 35," Judge Anthony Allen said.

"The crimes involved you driving along a road and pulling over, before lighting pieces of paper and throwing it into the roadside scrub, ostensibly with the aim of creating further ignition."

"Having regard to the prosecution factual summary and witness statements, it is almost miraculous that far more significant damage did not occur.

"Full credit must go to the Country Fire Service and the local community members who successfully intervened at a time early enough to prevent these fires burning completely out of control.

"Had that occurred, the damage would have been vast."

Judge Allen said Ms Judd stopped at Arthurton to restock with more paper towels from the Arthurton toilets.

"You had the opportunity to desist at that time (halfway through the offences) but you did not," he said.

"You have expressed the motivation to your offending was a response to stress caused by an argument with your son leading to your ingestion of methamphetamine.

"Your letter of apology to me sets out a fulsome embracing of wrongdoing without seeking to minimise or attempt to excuse your actions."

Ms Judd was eligible for a 15 per cent reduction in sentencing due to her early guilty plea, with Judge Allen imposing a five year, six month and 10 days penalty.

A MAN has lost his licence after being caught drink driving near Moonta on Saturday, October 1. Copper Coast police stopped a car driving without lights at

The driver, a 55 year old from Moonta, submitted to a breath test and returned a positive reading of 0.129.

Cross Roads.

He received an immediate six

month loss of licence and was reported for drink driving and driving without lights.

The person will be summonsed to appear in the Kadina Magistrates Court at a later date.

Adult Safeguarding Unit expands to all adults

PEOPLE concerned about suspected abuse of South Australian adults can now receive confidential support from the Adult Safeguarding Unit.

The Adult Safeguarding Unit has expanded to respond to all reports of abuse or mistreatment of adults.

The unit was initially set up to respond to reports of abuse of people older than 65, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people over 50.

The expansion is set to support more vulnerable South Australians, with the unit to work with adults to learn more about their situations, refer them to relevant aged care or disability services and help safeguard their rights.

Support also includes legal assistance such as enduring power of attorney, updating financial arrangements, or applying for a guardian or administrator to be appointed.

The unit has received more than

5000 phone calls from people concerned about themselves or others, with around half of these calls resulting in a report, in the past three years. Mr Picton said all adults have a right

to live free of abuse or mistreatment. "This expansion will help ensure protections are in place for vulnerable South Australians and more support available to those who need it most,"

Mr Picton said. "We can all play a part in knowing the signs of abuse or mistreatment and speaking up if we have concerns, with the unit now having the legislative powers to follow up complaints on all adults."

The sentence has been backdated to November 2021, when Ms Judd was arrested, and a non-parole period of two years and 10 months fixed.

"Whilst you fall to be sentenced for only two offences, the background of the 37 kilometre, 60 minute course of conduct means that this is hardly spur-ofthe-moment offending," Judge Allen said.

"A term of imprisonment is the only appropriate penalty.

"I note your difficult upbringing, which played a significant role in your inability to cope with the conflict that arose between you and your son on the day in question.

"You accept that you need ongoing counselling when you are released from prison."

KADINA'S Alison Meier and Leah Holman have organised a fundraiser walk in support of the Pancare

Foundation. Participants are set to walk nine kilometres along the Rotary Copper Rail Trail from Kadina to Wallaroo on Sunday morning, October 9.

Mrs Meier, a breast cancer survivor, said all proceeds raised at the event and online would be donated to Pancare, which funds research into upper gastrointestinal cancers.

"My good friend was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer 12 months ago, so this cause is quite close to me," she said.

"Pancare has been a huge support for her — there are so many webinars and phone consults out there to help patients along the way."

Pancreatic cancer will cause an estimated 3531 deaths this year, according to Cancer Australia data.

Pancare aims to increase its awareness and support sufferers' families, with pancreatic cancer having one of the lowest survival rates of any major cancer. "Just one in 10 pancreatic sufferers makes it past five years once they're diagnosed. This seems to fly under the radar a lot more than other cancers, and there's much more of it out there than people realise," Mrs Meier said.

Mrs Meier has raised more than \$2000 in almost two weeks, and hopes to reach \$5000 by the end of her fundraiser.

Already the walk is being well supported with Leah Holman and her Stronger not Older fitness group joining in various stages of the event.

"We'll be taking donations on the day of the fundraiser, but people can come along for free if they'd like," Mrs Meier said.

"We're aiming for a fun social day while we raise awareness for a great cause."

Mrs Meier has invited anyone interested in the walk to meet at the Kadina Rotary shelter at 7.45am on Sunday, but said people could join in at any point along the way.

The fundraiser will end with a sausage sizzle near the Wallaroo adventure playground.

Flying The Flag On Richman's Engine House

Major conservation works are continuing on Richman's Engine House at the Moonta Mines site. The huge stone walls are being repaired and repointed inside and out. Earlier a new roof was installed last month. As part of that work a flagpole was installed which will proudly fly St Piran's Flag – the Cornish Standard – when the works are finished in 2023.

St Piran was a fifth century Cornish abbot and saint. He is the patron saint of tin miners and of Cornwall.

Legend has it that St Piran "discovered" tin smelting when his black hearthstone, which contained tin-bearing ore, got hot enough for the tin to melt out. The white liquid tin rose to form a white cross on a black background, which became his emblem, St Piran's Flag. He shared his knowledge with

the local people and thus provided them with a way to make a living. St Piran's Day



is celebrated on 5th March, and his flag has become a symbol of Cornish mining, Cornish culture and Cornish heritage throughout the world.

SEEKING JUSTICE Calls to review a suspicious suicide

THE suspicious death of SAPOL Detective Inspector Geoff Whitford in 1981 has received growing online attention.

Channel Nine program Under Investigation examined the case with the help of Mr Whitford's daughter Amanda Schultz, of Kadina, in an episode which aired on Monday, September 26.

Mr Whitford's death was originally treated as a suicide, but when Amanda, a former police officer, decided to learn more about her father, she said certain details didn't add up.

"I was only 9 years old when Dad died so I really just wanted to find out more about him," Amanda said.

"Everything I heard from his friends and old work colleagues made him sound like a genuinely good bloke.

"But the more questions I asked about his death, the more it didn't make sense.

"Looking back, lots of people I spoke to would say things like 'I'll tell you more about your Dad when you're not a copper', which with hindsight, I can see something wasn't right."

Following some digging, Amanda and the Under Investigation team discovered Mr Whitford was declared a missing person by South Australia Police after being just minutes late to court.

This was the same day he was due to give evidence against a fellow police officer facing drugs charges.

Mr Whitford was found with a single gunshot wound to his head near Myponga, shortly before the incident was declared a suicide on October 22, 1981.

Amanda said SAPOL initially declined her access to his coroner's report.

"The report was kept undisclosed due to substantial allegations against living people relating to the death," she said.

"Once the report became older than 20 years, it was able to be released, so I went to parliament and spent a day copying every page of the report.

"When I went away and looked at it, there were so many dates, times and scenarios that just didn't add up."

Eyeing a review

Amanda finally made progress into the case after 18 months of planning with her team of specialists.

"I recently submitted a request for a full inquest into the death of my father to be received by a coroner," she said.

SA Legislative Council Member Frank Pangallo raised Channel Nine's investigation with state parliament last week.

"At the time (of his death) Inspector Whitford was investigating criminals involved in the drug trade and had expressed serious concerns that corrupt police were involved," Mr Pangallo said.

"Some witnesses (of the death) have since been found to be fabricated."

Mr Pangallo said the entire situation pointed to a scandalous cover up.

"The panel on the program (Under Investigation) included a senior criminal barrister and a specialist forensic lawyer, as well as a former major crime detective who worked alongside Inspector Whitford," he said.

"They forensically picked through all the evidence available — they all

concluded it was not a suicide, and could not rule out murder.

"Will the Attorney-General instruct the coroner to undertake a thorough review of the case and direct that the coroner conducts an inquest into Inspector Whitford's death in the interest of justice and closure for Mr Whitford's still-grieving family?"

The Attorney-General said he would seek further information regarding the substance of Channel Nine's investigation, but wouldn't yet commit to a full review.

For her family

Amanda said she intended to discover the full truth of her father's case. "Dad's death has basically been swept into the darkness," she said.

"For so long, Mum, my two sisters and I have had to live with the thought Dad made the choice not to

be here.

"But maybe it wasn't by his own decision — this investigation could potentially be a game-changer."

Amanda said her mother Pam had finally got the empathy she's deserved.

"I can't imagine what it would've been like to raise three girls whilst knowing her husband had just left," she said.

"She never re-married because she didn't want to be put through the pain again.

"She often says to us (her daughters), she's not getting any younger and would rest easy knowing the truth behind Dad's death.

"In a lot of ways, we're doing this for Mum.

"Tm simply seeking natural justice and just want to know this has been investigated properly."

Roads closed for cycling cup

MORE than 200 elite cyclists are set to travel to the Copper Coast for a weekend of riding this Saturday and Sunday, October 8-9.

Town icon celebrates 100

PORT Julia's iconic red shed was honoured with centenary celebrations on Saturday, October 1.

Between 80 and 90 people attended the event, far more than the anticipated 30.

The shed was restored by Yorke Peninsula Council earlier this year and now features a new plaque unveiled by Mayor Darren Braund.

Port Julia Progress Association president Perry Woodward said it was brilliant to see so many people celebrating a piece of the town's history.

"It was terrific; an absolute success," he said.

"The weather was perfect as well, which we were really dependent on for the event to run smoothly and, in the end, we had sunshine.

"We had a long lead up for it and we knew so many things could go wrong, but they didn't, it was fantastic."

The building was built in 1920 to replace an open-ended grain shed from 1906 and was used to store goods while the town was still a busy port, last utilised for loads of barley and wheat in 1967.

Mr Woodward said YP Council must be commended for the

effort which was put in to restoring the shed.

"The amount of effort council has put into the restoration job is just great," he said.

"It's one of those things, that when council started cleaning it up a little bit and making sure it was in the best condition, people started to take notice of it.

"We have a number of sites which form the history of Port Julia, but to see this one so celebrated while still being in great condition is ideal."

Former resident Nancy Travis, now 102 years old, travelled from Adelaide for the event.

During the celebrations, she recounted her memories of growing up in the district and learning to swim at Port Julia when her grandfather worked in the shed.

Mr Braund said it was an honour to be in attendance and unveil the plaque at the ceremony.

"I believe it's the only grain shed left on the peninsula," he said.

"The Port Julia community must be congratulated for being so proactive with town projects like this and for making sure the town's history is recognised.

"There was a band playing, they had a barbecue going and it was a carnival-like atmosphere, all together, it was fantastic and a credit to the community."

Patrol held flare demonstrations where the public could deploy day and night flares under supervision from a Coastal Patrol member.


"Information about checking dates on flares and replacing when needed and the types of flare to use at different times was promoted," Mr Hornby said.

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Plovers slow and steady increase

THE number of hooded plovers on Yorke Peninsula is increasing slowly and steadily, according to the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board.

The program is about to embark on another breeding season, while a biennial count of the bird will be held in November.

Roughly 285 of the 800 plovers in South Australia live on Yorke Peninsula, which project officer Janet Moore said proves just how vital the area is to their future.

"We've had a few good years of chicks reaching a fledgling age, and

there's a two per cent chance eggs will survive to become an adult," she said.

"So, while we celebrate all the good times and little wins we get, along the way there's heartache as well.

The peninsula is an ideal home for these birds because their natural habitat is here, their food washes in and they're what we'd call a flagship species. "If we didn't have them, the beach

wouldn't be a suitable habitat for many species."

The program is a part of Birdlife Australia's beach nesting birds project and NYLB's Marna Banggara, but is driven by the support of local volunteers. Volunteers currently monitor nests at Port Victoria, Port Julia, Balgowan, Point Souttar, Port chicks fledged last season, but Moorowie and Kemp Bay.

"Every two years we survey the entire hooded plover covered area on Yorke Peninsula, recording different threats and dangers amongst other things and give the data to Birdlife Australia, so they can monitor them," Ms Moore said.

"We've had so many volunteers join us to help and they're absolutely essential, because with hundreds of kilometres of coastline to cover, you can't do that without a healthy team of dedicated volunteers pushing you forward."

YPC environment officer Letitia Dahl-helm said council was grateful a record number of hooded plover remained cautious of the constant threats to their habitat.

"In particular, vehicles accessing beaches can cause injury and death to these birds, especially when driven above the high tide mark, which is not the most suitable location to drive a vehicle anyway or when driving at speed," she said.

"Council's dogs by-law requires all dogs to be on leashes within 100 metres of any area of foreshore indicated by a sign and/or a fence as a hooded plover nesting area during August to March.

"Council asks all users of the beach to be considerate of the environment

they are in, the animals that live there, and also other users."

Program volunteer Nanou Cabourdin said while the work they do is important, it's also imperative the public contribute to protecting the birds.

"Most people really want to do the right thing, but it's important we continually educate people about how their actions can cause harm," she said.

"It (protecting the hooded plovers) entails going out regularly and installing signs and fences to protect nests from the public in various spots along beaches where it's necessary.

With council's by-law ... we want to make sure people are aware of that and follow it in the interest of the plovers."

"It's the circular economy recycling in action and it's something all Yorke Peninsula residents can get behind.



Session one, which is completely booked out, is focusing on Apple iPad and/or iPhones while Windows operating systems will be the focus on Wednesday, October 12.

Android phones or tablets will be the topic of discussion on Wednesday, October 26 and attendees will learn more about video chat tools on any device on Thursday, October 27.

Community Care and Transport CEO David McDonald said locals and visitors will quite often walk into their office and ask for technological assistance.

"We received a small amount of seed funding for this pilot program and we are hopeful, if successful, we can turn it into something more permanent," he said.

"There are people in our communities who have trouble setting contacts, or privacy settings, or being able to connect with loved ones.

"We thought it would be great if we could help people and prevent others being left behind by technology.

"We see this as an extension of our services. "Transport will always be our core business, but we firmly believe no one should be left behind."

Mr McDonald said an increased ability to use technology would also improve social connections.

Crows write her-story in AFLW Showdown I

Adelaide Crows wrote a new page for the AFLW history books with their 60-point win against Port Adelaide at Adelaide Oval on Friday night, September 30.

A massive crowd of 20,652 witnessed this inaugural AFL Women's Showdown.

Crows dominated across the contest, collecting 68 more disposals, winning the inside-50 count 40-16 and clearances 33-11.

Power failed to win a centre clearance, and the Crows took 18 marks inside 50 to the Power's three.

Adelaide had the game in the bag by halftime, leading 5.7 (37) to Port 0.2 (2); final scores were 8.15 (63) to 0.3 (3).

Chelsea Biddell (Port Vincent) continued her outstanding season as a key component of Adelaide's impressive and rebounding defence.

Again overshadowed by the potency of the Crows' midfield, the defensive group isn't getting the accolades it deserves.

Biddell had nine disposals (seven kicks, two handballs) to go with four marks.

She also drifted forward and, after a "handball receive", had a ping at goal from 45 metres out, going just left of one of the big white uprights.

Small forward Hannah Button (Stansbury/Yorketown) produced her best game of the season, finishing with a productive 11 disposals (four kicks, seven handballs) and an imposing four tackles.

Younger sister Rachelle Martin wasn't as productive offensively, finishing with three touches to go with three tackles.

"(I was) immensely proud of the way they (the players) went about it," Adelaide coach Matthew Clarke said.

"Obviously it was a big occasion with a big build up, and we thought watching some of Port Adelaide's first month of footy, it was probably their tackle pressure that was their standout feature.



"We set ourselves to absorb that and apply some of our own pressure back and I thought they did it pretty well."

Looking a class above throughout, dual premiership Adelaide Crows skipper Chelsea Randall won the first AFLW Showdown Medal on the back of her 27 possessions, seven clearances and three goals.

After six rounds, Adelaide is tied on points at the top of the ladder with Brisbane, Melbourne and Collingwood; Brisbane is top on percentage and Adelaide second.

Kadina's Stephanie Talbot will return home with a bronze medal to go with high individual honours following the 2022 FIBA Women's Basketball World Cup in Sydney.

Australia's most consistent performer, Talbot helped the Opals to a convincing bronze medal match victory before she was selected in the tournament's Google All-Star Five.

She averaged an impressive 8.5 points, 6.9 rebounds and 5.3 assists, but it was her defensive dominance against the world's best which turned heads this World Cup. Opals first in group phase

Australia cruised past Japan to secure its place in a quarterfinal on Tuesday, September 27.

After 13 first-half lead changes, the Opals knuckled down to pull away with a 17-point win to finish on top of Group B. Talbot contributed seven points, six rebounds, five assists and one block whilst shouldering nearly 30 minutes in her starting role.

Five straight wins

The Opals looked the goods early against Belgium as they eyed a fifth-

straight win to advance into a semifinal. Talbot wowed the home crowd with a spinning scoop layup to extend Australia's early lead

At her facilitating best, the forward dished out a team-high nine assists to go with five points, five rebounds in her side's 17-point win.

Semifinal heartbreak

In arguably the match of the tournament, Australia trailed China for most of the match but stormed home to give itself a late chance.

Talbot again led the way on defence and handed her Opals their first lead since the

second quarter with a clutch layup.

But the home side failed to close out the game, as a late foul put China to the line where both free throws were knocked down to break the Aussies' hearts by two.

Talbot was the only Opal to notch a double-double in the contest, ending with 12 points, 10 rebounds, three assists and three steals.

Aussies bathe in bronze

Australia sent off legend Lauren Jackson with a fairy tale bronze medal match victory against Canada on Saturday, October 1.

Jackson poured in 30 points in her final

game wearing an Opals jersey, while Talbot knocked down 11 of her 16 points in the second term to open up an eightpoint buffer by halftime.

The Aussies doubled Canada's score in the second half to surge home by a comfortable 30 points.

Talbot could only smile after an impressive and-one layup in the closing stages capped off her outstanding tournament.

She flirted with a triple-double by notching 16 points, eight rebounds, eight assists and two more steals in another stellar two-way performance to secure her second World Cup medal.

History making win

This year marks the 60th anniversary of Yorke Peninsula's zone football side beating the first combined Spencer Gulf team at Adelaide Oval on Saturday, July 14, 1962.

Below is an excerpt from the report in the Transcontinental on Tuesday, July 17, Peninsula thrashed the gulf side — as seen by Greg Adams."

In a brilliant exhibition of play-on football, Yorke Peninsula proved itself the best country football league in the state when it thrashed the first combined Spencer Gulf side by 61 points at Adelaide Oval on Saturday.

The Gulf team had its stars humbled by the speed and brilliance of the peninsula line-up and never got into the game at any stage after the first term.

The Red and Blacks were helped on their way to victory by the expert goal-getting of full forward Ross Sawley, who bagged 10 goals.

Yorke Peninsula had more players who were prepared to go in and get the ball whereas many Gulf players stood off and waited. The Gulf tactics had drastic

results

W Avery, at centre half-back for Yorke Peninsula, cut off the direct route to goal for the Gulf team, and he beat all players who were tried on him.

The Gulf made more moves than are attempted in a game of chess, but it was of little use against the machine-like work of their opponents.

Rhythm

The winners adapted themselves quickly to the conditions, and their talks to each other helped them to swing into a rhythmed attack which had results.

In addition to Sawley and Avery, G Gutsche, at the pivot, rated highly among their best.

The Gulf team never had a winner on this line, and it was here the winners gained great drive.

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



Sadly, the club's bowling green reached its use by date in 1997, when it was dug up and replanted with tiff dwarf, which is now maintained by Derek Petherick.

Price said the original green was meticulously cared for across many years. "People came from all over the state to play in our club tournaments," he said. "With our club renowned for its hospitality over 70 years, we have enjoyed the reputation of good food, good friendship and a good time.

"We always remember how our club began with wonderful commitment, dedication and spirit to provide us with the excellent facility we all enjoy today."





GRDC grower guide for machinery investment

GRDC has released a comprehensive guide to support informed decision making around machinery purchases.

The guide, which took two years to develop with input from farm business consultants including Kondinin Group, provides a snapshot of the machinery ownership levels of more than 450 growers nationally.

"It is helping growers compare their position when it comes to industry averages for similar farming operations," Kondinin Group research manager Ben White said.

"Growers are typically presented with conflicting opinions when it comes to machinery purchases and the decisions around big-ticket investments can be stressful.

"This guide provides a range of tools to help growers make better informed purchasing decisions."

Amongst the tools is a new benchmarking formula, which allows growers to calculate their machinery investment levels relative to their overall farm profit.

The Machinery Investment Ratio formula requires growers to calculate their total plant, labour, maintenance and contracting costs relative to their total gross farm income. This ratio indicates the efficiency of owning and operating machinery.

Using this formula, GRDC research found, on average, the level of national machinery investment was 34 cents in every dollar of farm income generated (a machinery investment ratio of 0.34).

"It's important to note there is no one size fits all strategy and growers need to determine the levels of machinery investment or a contracting approach that's suitable for their farm business," Mr White said.

The guide also encourages growers to maintain an up-to-date machinery value inventory.

"The cost of machinery, including used equipment, is escalating rapidly, so keeping tabs on current inventory values as machinery supply tightens will be important in the context of machinery investment ratios," Mr White said.







In a galaxy far, far away

STAR Wars is back with a new 12-episode limited series, Andor.

Andor is a prequel to the 2016 film Rogue One and follows Cassian Andor from his beginnings as a petty criminal to a leader of the rebel alliance.

Something I loved about Rogue One compared to the other entries in the Star Wars franchise was its emphasis on the actual wars occurring.

No jedis with lightsabres, no force powers, just soldiers and their part in a bigger war - which continues in Andor.

Cassian was a standout character in Rogue One. He wasn't afraid to shoot first and ask questions

later, and this series so far has shown how and why he is the way he is. After four episodes, we have followed Cassian as

an orphan of a war-torn planet, to a political pawn and solider of an upcoming rebellion - the rebellion Luke Skywalker would later join.

Unlike other Star Wars products, this show has spent a lot of time building character histories, it's not just flashy violence and laser swords.

While that does feature, it takes a grittier approach and puts substance over style.

An example of this is Stellan Skarsgard's character Luthen Rael.

So far we know he hates the empire and is starting a rebellion all while working in the senate of a government he despises.

It's a proper political drama similar to that of House
