REGULATIONS PUT LIMITS ON FISHERS LISING TOWN JETTY

A PORT Broughton fishing business is againfighting for the right to use the town jetty to moor its vessels.

Barnes Seafood is no longer able to safely moor in the Port Broughton bay and had been using the jetty to secure its vessels.

But the business was told by

Department Infrastructure and Transport in March, the use of the jetty was no longer allowed.

"A & C Barnes Seafood were also mooring their crab boat at the jetty and they received the same letter asking us to relocate these boats within 14 days and failure to comply would result in further action," Barnes Seafood owners Jarrad and Angela Barnes said.

"DIT are enforcing the regulation commercial boats are not allowed to moor at the jetty for periods greater than four hours.

"We believe these claims are unfair and impractical and will have a detrimental effect on Port Broughton businesses."

Businesses were also reminded of mooring limits in 2010.

Mr Barnes said the boat ramp had changed the surrounding ecosystem and altered the

seabed, making it difficult to now moor in the bay.

"This is why we can't moor safely now and they (the government) need to take accountability here and work with us to provide an alternate solution," he said.

We have held moorings in the bay in this town for 40 years but since the new boat ramp was approved and built in 2001, the tide strength in the bay has

significantly increased. "The mooring anchors can no longer sink in the mud creating that holding power our larger boats require."

Mr Barnes said he would like to see the regulation updated to allow both commercial and recreational boats to moor at the jetty for longer periods of

"We think there should be a dedicated section of the jetty for

commercial fishing boats and an agreement to moor two berths wide during peak holiday periods," he said.

'If we are unable to do this it would mean we would have to relocate our boats to another town making things very difficult to continue operating our businesses from Broughton."

Another issue I can't understand is why on earth would council agree with the planning of Norfolk Island pines on the footpath opposite the new dwellings at Wallaroo Shores.


You only have to look at the damage they have caused to the kerbing and road at the end entrance of Wallaroo from Kadina.


What's the point in having a beautiful view only to be blocked by 100-foot-tall trees?

I WOULD like to take this opportunity to reflect on the incredible work our health professionals do every day to save lives and support survivors to recover well after stroke.

We know their working environment has become more challenging amid the COVID-19 pandemic, but their dedication to the 27,400 people who will experience a stroke this year, never waivers.

I was heartened to see survivors of stroke and their loved ones around Australia also share their gratitude during Stroke Week, August 2-8, embracing the "United By Stroke" theme.

However, the reality is, we can have the best doctors, nurses and allied health professionals and the most advanced treatments for stroke, but time is still the critical factor.

You must get to hospital quickly to access emergency stroke treatment.

After a stroke, around 1.9 million brain cells die each minute. In most cases, the faster a stroke can be diagnosed and treated, the better the chance of a good recovery. Time saved equals brain saved.

I encourage the community to keep spreading the FAST acronym all year round.

Knowing the FAST message and sharing it with your family and friends can be the first step in saving a life and avoiding ongoing disability.

It may be your own life or that of someone you

The FAST message will help you recognise the most common signs of stroke:

- Face Check their face. Has their mouth drooped?
- Arms Can they lift both arms?
- Speech Is their speech slurred? Do they understand you?
- Time Time is critical. If you see any of these signs, call triple zero (000) straight away.

A stroke can happen to anyone at any age and research tells us the number of working age people having strokes is increasing. These people are not just numbers, they are mums, dads, sons and daughters. They have jobs and families and plans for the future.

Stroke is always a medical emergency. Please know what to do when stroke strikes. Think FAST and act fast at the first sign of stroke.

Safety boost for bushfire season

GAME-changing track-and-trace technology will revolutionise bushfire fighting in South Australia this summer.

Automatic Vehicle Location equipment will be installed in more than 1400 vehicles for the Country Fire Service, Metropolitan Fire Service, State Emergency Service, ForestrySA and the Department for Environment and Water for operations across metropolitan Adelaide and regional South Australia.

Minister for Emergency Services Vincent Tarzia announced Netstar Australia as the tender winner for AVL recently.

"AVL is a crucial tool that provides real-time truck and vehicle tracking, ensuring firefighters and assets can be accounted for at any and every second during bushfires," Mr Tarzia said.

"Netstar's AVL solution has been tested thoroughly and can withstand high demand in some of the state's most remote locations, like parts of Kangaroo Island, where phone connectivity is non-existent.

"This is a significant step forward in terms of safety for our emergency services volunteers and personnel. They should have been given this personal protection many years ago."

A CFS spokesperson said the introduction of AVL technology would play a significant role in enhancing the safety of CFS volunteers and staff, and improve operational intelligence gathered from fire grounds.

"The CFS welcomes this technology which will eventually become part of every CFS vehicle across the state," the spokesperson said.

"Having the ability to quickly and visually track where our resources are at all times will positively impact the way we approach bushfires resulting in improved community safety outcomes."

During the trials — between January and February this year — the AVL project team visited Yorke Peninsula, Kangaroo Island, Mount Lofty Ranges, the West Coast, Far North and South East.

"The technology would make the management of resources much easier, rather than using iPads to track its trucks and volunteers in emergency situations, which was costly and far from perfect," Northern Yorke Peninsula CFS group officer David Bussenschutt said.

"We all operate our businesses from Port Broughton, we all live locally and have young families with children who go to school and play sport here.

While the boats are in town we always use our local trades like Port Broughton Engineering for maintenance as well as the IGA (for groceries) and our local hardware."

Mr Barnes said the boats were icons to the town and an attraction for tourists and locals alike who often walked the jetty to look at the boats.

"We believe tourism and the fishing industry are both vital to keep a community like Port Broughton going strong," he said.

"We understand the jetty does need to be a shared resource and would really like to come to an agreement that caters for both us, commercial fishers as well as the public wanting to access the jetty for recreational activities."

Barunga West Council has written to the Deparment for Infrastructure and Transport in support of the businesses.

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said he had been assisting Barnes Seafood to ensure their business could continue to operate in Port Broughton.

"Their current mooring situation is not working and I have met with, and formally written to Minister Corey Wingard on this issue, seeking a mutually beneficial solution that caters for tourism and recreation, and industry," Mr Ellis said.

'Our next step is a visit from a departmental official in order to uncover a suitable alternate arrangement."

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Help our health staff

MAITLAND locals are calling for increased support for hospital staff.

There have been several instances this year where there have been no doctors on site, leaving nurses to manage the situation with the assistance of MedSTAR and SA Ambulance Service paramedics.

Not only does the lack of doctors create a situation the nursing staff have described as stressful, it affects the care and admission of inpatients and administration of dialysis.

"We had to call patients who were due to be transferred back here from Adelaide and tell them they couldn't come back, and we had to put off general admissions as well," Doctor Rebecca Morgan said.

"There were patients who were due to have dialysis, who we had to put off, or tell them to go to Adelaide.

"And then it's a matter of them trying to fit into the schedule of another clinic too.

"The nurses were left without support, there was no management on site either last week, when they needed

"These are the practical consequences of not having someone here."

Dr Morgan, who manages rostered

on-call shifts at the hospital with her general practice responsibilities, said a lack of doctors also meant there was a possibility residents of the Chappell Wing would need to be taken via ambulance to Wallaroo if they were in need of medical assistance.

"This also puts pressure on our local ambulance volunteers, and the patients — it's not ideal for them to spend 30 minutes in an ambulance from here if they need assistance," Dr Morgan said.

"We do have access to SAVES (SA Virtual Emergency Service) and the telehealth system, and the nurses can use that for prescribing medication, but we want to try and take some of the stress and pressure off them."

Dr Morgan said the added pressures of administering the COVID-19 vaccinations at the general practice clinics, was adding to the workload for regional doctors.

"For Maitland Hospital, which is one of the only COVID testing locations on the peninsula, every time a nurse has to come off the ward to test someone it limits the work they can do when they come back," she said.

Community member Michelle Nelligan praised the work of the nursing staff in dealing with the adversities, but said enough was enough.

"We have such great nurses here, they are absolutely brilliant, and they

have great communication skills with our GPs," she said.

"But they are not being supported, especially in the instances where they need as many people on hand as they can."

Former senator and local resident Alan Ferguson said he felt there was a disconnect between the hospital and the community, since the removal of local hospital boards.

"There is no sense of community communication or ownership," he said. "If there was something wrong, you used to be able to go in and speak to management, now I don't know who is in those roles.

"Things have really deteriorated in the past 12 months.

"The disappearance of local hospital boards has broken down the local involvement in the decision-making process, we don't know what's happening until it's done.

"It is difficult to get anyone out to country areas, we know we're not alone." Last week, the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation (SA branch) said the absence of doctors' places enormous pressure on nurses.

"They rely on doctors and management to provide guidance in areas beyond their level of expertise," branch CEO/Secretary Adj Associate Professor Elizabeth Dabars AM said.

"As dedicated and skilled as our nurses are, they should not be left to fend for themselves and their patients in an environment as unpredictable as an emergency department."

Point Pearce youth shed to receive makeover

POINT Pearce Aboriginal Corporation has received \$25,000 to upgrade and insulate its youth shed.

The corporation will also use the funding through the Grants SA program to install new cupboards in the building.

PPAC community coordinator Kaylene O'Loughlin said the PPAC was happy to receive the funding.

"It's an old shed so we need to make it safer and more accessible for our youth to have their own space," she said.

"There is lots of positive things happening in Point Pearce and we have recently added a Stolen Generation garden and a fire pit."

Yorke Peninsula Council operations coordinator Nick Hoskin said a contractor would be engaged to complete the work.

"The upgrades to the youth shed will include pigeon proofing, removing the old dance floor and concrete, replace a broken door, fix holes in the walls, install a small kitchen, repair the electricity and some new paint," Mr Hoskin said.

"YPC has been helping the Point Pearce Aboriginal Corporation to obtain quotes."

Minister for Human Services Michelle Lensink said more than \$530,000 was dispersed across the state, including the regions, to support South Australians and communities.

"We are thrilled to be funding important community-based projects right across the state to help Australians connect, engage and participate in their local areas," Ms Lensink said.

COVID-19 scare in SA

THERE are no new cases of COVID-19 in the state despite a scare across the

A South Australian woman tested positive for COVID-19 in Mount Gambier after returning from Victoria on Sunday.

It followed Saturday's announcement of another positive case, a woman in her 30s, who returned from Victoria on Jetstar flight JQ778 on

A man in his 30s, also from Victoria, tested positive on Monday but has since returned to Victoria.

SA's border bubble with Victoria has shrunk from 70 kilometres to 30km for seven days.

"These new cases are a wake-up call to South Australia," chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said.

"It absolutely reflects the high rate of community transmission in Victoria at the moment.

"If you're thinking of going to Victoria you really need to consider: Is

"I'm sure they will get their wave under control as their vaccination rates get higher, but at the moment it is very

The Transition Committee met yesterday (Tuesday) and made no changes to restrictions.

Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said the state is still at risk and there were growing fears of an outbreak in Mount Gambier.

"Authorities will be closely monitoring the situation," Comm. Stevens said.

There are currently four active cases of COVID-19 in SA, two interstate and two overseas acquired.

All South Australians who have symptoms of COVID-19 should get tested on the day symptoms appear.

Changes to restrictions have been made for the City of Mount Gambier, District Council of Grant and Wattle Range Council areas. For more details and hotspot locations, www.covid-19.sa.gov.au.

Slow down for safe boating

BOATIES across South Australia are urged to slow down and stay safe during National Safe Boating Week.

The week, October 2-8, is an initiative of the Australia New Zealand Safe Boating Education Group and maritime agencies across Australia.

This year it has three themes — service it, pack it and wear it.

"Safe boating also means sticking to the signed speed limits and exercising respectful marina behaviour," a Department for Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson said.

"Speed limits are in place where

high-speed boats may be a hazard to other water users.

"Various harbours and marinas are subject to speed limits.

"A four-knot speed restriction applies within 50 metres of a person in the water, within 30 metres of any other vessel that may be adversely affected by wash and within most boat havens and marinas throughout South Australia.

"There are penalties if you do not observe the controls or speed restrictions provided."



Petitioning for more resources

AUSTRALIAN Education Union SA branch is campaigning for increased resources for children.

Union members collected signatures during the Yorke Peninsula Field Days with the hope of triggering a parliamentary inquiry.

The Every School Every Child campaign aims to raise awareness about the lack of funding and support for public school and preschool students with additional learning needs.

Branch president Lara Golding said a survey of more than 1000 educators, leaders and support staff found an average of three students in each class needed extra support.

Almost nine in 10 educators said the level of support funding was not adequate and as few as nine per cent of additional funding applications are funded to the level requested.

"Some children are waiting more than two years to get assessed by a specialist," she said.

"In that time they're waiting, those students are falling further

"South Australian educators are dedicated, highly qualified profes-

"They are doing their absolute

"But excessive workloads, crowded classrooms and a lack of appropriate resources means some students miss out.

"Educators are crying out for more funding for ongoing, permanent support staff, as well as behaviour coaches, educational psychologists, speech pathologists and mental health support, in order to improve the support available for children."

Ms Golding said the petition had been well received by locals as regional people recognised the challenges facing local educators.

"Our schools need more investment so every student can learn to the very best of their abilities, and every teacher has the support they need to do the best for their students," she said.

YPC seeking funding for child care

YORKE Peninsula Council will submit an application for grant funding for a \$2.25 million childcare facility.

Council recently endorsed submitting a grant application through the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants Program.

The grant application is the result of a push by local mums who discovered a lack of child care is impacting families and deterring people from moving to the peninsula.

Southern Yorke Peninsula Childcare Feasibility Group members Katie Hughes, Amy Honner and Anna Phasey presented council with their findings in August.

The group has run two surveys to gauge the need for child care on SYP, and said they had identified more than enough need to justify a centre being established.

Of the 175 families that completed the survey only 32 per cent were able to access formal childcare options on southern YP.

About half stated they relied solely on friends and family to provide child care and 18 per cent stated they had no access to any form of child care.

"We are very appreciative about how the community has rallied to support this grant application and particularly Yorke Peninsula Council," Mrs Hughes said.

"I think many people may not have thought about how the lack of childcare impacts the wider community.

"We wanted to create conversation about this issue and it feels like there is now good momentum in the community."

If successful, a purpose-built childcare centre would be constructed in Minlaton.

Council will also apply for bushfire preparedness signage to the value of \$40,000 and provide administrative support and advice assistance to the SYP Community Hub in its application for a \$320,000 Community Connection Program through the same grants program.



Don't put off a heart check during the pandemic



TENS of thousands of Australians could be missing crucial medical appointments because they are worried

about seeing their doctor during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Heart Foundation strongly encourages Australians not to put off important health check-ups such as Heart Health Checks.

New information from the Heart Foundation shows at least 27,000 Heart Health Checks were missed from March last year to July this

We are concerned this could

lead to a wave of preventable heart attacks and deaths.

We estimate nearly 350 heart attacks, strokes and heart-related deaths over the next five years could have been prevented if Heart Health Checks had not been missed or delayed.

During a Heart Health Check your GP will assess your risk factors for heart disease. They will check your blood pressure, weight, cholesterol and blood glucose (sugar) levels, and talk to you about your family history, and if you smoke.

This information is fed into a calculator that indicates how likely you are to have a heart attack or stroke in the next five years — it rates you as having either a low, medium or high

Heart Health Checks are recommended for anyone 45 years or older — or 30 and over for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

I also urge you to book yourself in for a COVID-19 vaccination as soon as possible, if you haven't already.

We know people who have heart disease, and people with underlying health conditions like high blood pressure, have a higher risk of becoming seriously ill, and even dying from COVID-19, compared to other people in the

Having the vaccination means you are much less likely to become seriously ill from COVID-19; it is an important way to protect yourself and those around you.

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

Avastin shortage

The American Academy of Ophthalmology has lamented the behaviour of insurance companies pushing ophthalmologists to use new biosimilar drugs as alternatives to Avastin that have never been tested in the eye.

The move comes amid an Avaistin shortage in the USA, with the AAO concerned that pressure to use the biosimilars is essentially making patients "unwitting subjects in a clinical

"Even the drugs' manufacturers have advised against injecting the alternative drugs into the eye because there is no scientific proof to support it.

This development has alarmed ophthalmologists because one of the drugs may be harmful to corneal tissue," the AAO states.

Apple patent

Apple has reportedly won a patent for a direct retinal projector system that provides dynamic focusing for virtual reality.

A direct retinal projector system scans images, pixel by pixel, directly onto the wearer's retinas.

Dynamic focusing components and techniques may be used in a direct retinal projector system to dynamically and correctly focus each pixel in VR images as the images are being scanned to a subject's eyes.

This allows objects and surfaces that were intended to appear at different distances to be projected into the eyes at the correct depths.

"The last two have been more towards the end of my career.

"I've known there has been a significant role to play for the

"I was happy with my one-onone performance on Hannath; we had an interesting battle."

Poole, 27, was productive across

half forward with 17 disposals (seven kicks and 10 handballs) along with applying plenty of strong defensive pressure, laying

He also chimed in with a goal early in the third quarter to continue the Eagles momentum.

This is Poole's second grand final victory, having played in the 2020 premiership as well.

Curramulka export Matthew Goldsworthy was the Eagles' hard luck story, after he injured his hamstring in the second semifi-

"It is a little weird and strangely detached experience being so close to the group," Goldsworthy, who has played 200-games for the club, said.

"Naturally your ecstatic for the boys, but it is still a hollow feeling from a personal perspective.

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

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Miels's part of SANFL history

Peter Argent REPORT BY

Brenton Miels made SANFL history as one of the youngest SANFL premiership players in 1966.

Miels, who hailed from Maitland Football Club, was just 18 years and 262 days old when his Sturt side defeated Port Adelaide on October 1, 1966.

The victory, under fellow Yorke Peninsula export Jack Oatey, was the first Sturt premiership in 26 years. At the time, Miels was behind Don Gilbourne

(North in 1949), Lindsay Head (Eagles in 1953), Jack Cahill and Ian Hannaford (both 1958) to be the fifth youngest to win a flag.

Miels played on the half forward flank in 1966 and would play in six of the Double Blues seven SANFL premierships across the next decade, in the most successful epoch in the clubs 120-year history.

He wore the number 18 jumper across the majority of his career and was amongst the best players in 1968 where he kicked two goals against Port Adelaide.

He also ranked amongst the best performer in the famous 1976 grand final at Football Park where the crowd swelled to close to 80,000 people.

Miels was selected in the SANFL Team of the Year in 1974 and 1976.

"Brenton had a taste of it (league football) in 1965," great mate and seven-time Sturt premiership defender Phil "Sandy" Nelson said.

"Jim Tilbrook and Brenton, Dean Ottens and myself, we were all raw teenage lads in '66.

"Along with (Keith) Chessell and (Paul) Bagshaw, this group was all aged under 20 in 1966 Grand Final. "Brenton was very talented, quick and a beautifully

balanced footballer, and had a great kick. "That's why Jack used Brenton on a wing across the

majority of his career. "His evasive skills rank comfortably alongside those of Bagshaw and Michael Graham.

"During our time at Unley we brought a speed boat together and would go to the (Murray) River and water-ski during the summers."

Miels played 202 league games for Unley across two stints — from 1965-68 and then 1970-77.

He played in the VFL with Richmond in 1969-70 while completing National Service with the Australian Army, playing seven senior games.

In 1969, he helped the Tigers defeat Sturt in an end-of-season champions of Australia match at

Miles was made a player life member of Sturt in 1973 and was honoured with player life membership of the SANFL in 1975.

Sadly, he passed away in 1997, at 49; he was posthumously inducted into the Sturt Football Club Hall of Fame in 2009





NYP grain growers discuss key topics

REPORT BY

MORE than 60 farmers and industry leaders gathered for the 2021 Northern Sustainable Soils Spring Walk on Thursday, September 23.

Attendees met at Jordan Green's Bute farm, before venturing to four different cropping trial sites.

Topics of discussion included how to improve crop performance on high pH soils, managing powdery mildew in wheat, long-term soil amelioration, soil variability and pH mapping, as well as new herbicide options in lentils.

Speakers were Agronomy

Solutions' Sean Mason, Central Ag Solutions' Paul Ackland, Ag Consulting Co's Stefan Schmitt, Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation's Rodrigo da Silva, Trengove Consulting's Sam Trengove and Jordan Bruce, plus SARDI's Navneet Aggarwal.

NSS executive officer Stefan Schmitt said the event was a suc-

"Local farmers were enthusiastic to chat about some production issues this year, such as the poor performance of deep sands," he

Mr Schmitt mentioned powdery mildew had become an increasing issue on northern Yorke Peninsula.

"(Farmers) need to grow varieties with better resistance packages where possible, as resistance to new-generation fungicides evolves quickly," he said.

"Poor crop performance has been observed on some sandhills in 2021 due to a wet start to the season, resulting in crops being shallow rooted and ill prepared for the snap dry finish.

"Especially on the red sandy soil types, crops have haved off prematurely as a result of natural compaction when the soil dries out.

"The NSS has been looking at ways to remove this hard-setting layer through ripping or spading."

Mr Schmitt encouraged farmers to consider soil pH and texture when planning to use pre-emergent broadleaf weed control options in their lentil programs

"The crop safety of new and old products is largely influenced by soil pH and texture," he said.

Other points of interest from the day included a focus on improving productivity on high pH soils.

"High pH grey calcareous soils benefit from higher rates of phosphorus fertiliser.

"In trials this year, liquid phosphorus products haven't vet improved crop biomass responses over granular products."

NSS Smart Farms project put to use

IN June last year, NSS received \$48,130 from the National Landcare Program for its Smart Farms project, which monitored how zone soil sampling can be used to better manage resource distribution within paddocks.

"By grid mapping depth to compaction within different soil zones, we found farmers can ensure they aren't ripping too far below or above the compaction layer," NSS executive officer Stefan Schmitt

"With this information, farmers can better target their depth of soil amelioration and improve crop yield on compacted sands.

"Grid soil testing enables growers to determine a baseline fertility and soil characteristics level across paddocks from this information inputs and amelioration practices can be targeted."

All findings from the NSS trials, including the Smart Farms project, will be available in the group's annual booklet.


Test and evaluation activities involving static firings and/or firings of naval and artillery weapons are conducted at the Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield throughout the year. The Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield is a vital Defence test and evaluation capability that has supported Defence since 1929.

These firings may require specific tidal or weather conditions, and are critical for the safety of current and new Defence capabilities. Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the $\,$ gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

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HOT FISHING TIPS

Welcome to the column with all the hot tips for fishing around Yorke Peninsula; contact Greg by email at greg@gregjamesfishing.com.au.

Wallaroo: I fished the jetty in the early art of last week with small squid and undersize female crabs being the only result. Boat crews were fishing for King George whiting, blueys and gar from the Magazine and Point Riley as strong northerlies cracked in along the gulf.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes/Port Victoria: Jetty-based anglers caught a few blueys, squid and tommy ruff (Australian herring) over the long weekend, but almost gale-force westerlies kept many boaties at

home. Try West Light for squid and whiting when the weather clears. Good catches of whiting have also been reported from Wardang Island and Port Victoria.

Point Turton: Good catches of squid have come about a kilometre offshore from Port Rickaby and The Pines. Whiting are also up at Chinaman Wells and around at Point Souttar. The jetty has the odd squid in the


early morning and yellowfin whiting are slowly starting to appear in Hardwicke Bay.

Marion Bay: The returning long weekend traffic had to be seen to be believed as I drove south on Sunday. Big squid at Marion Bay jetty was not enough to keep anglers happy as strong winds and rough seas developed late Saturday. Boat crews will target whiting, squid and flathead when conditions improve.

Edithburgh/Stansbury/Port Vincent: Good catches of whiting came from Sultana Passage, Tapley Shoals and Port Giles in recent days. The Orontes Bank also has fish up around the 35cm mark. Jetty anglers have had a quiet few days with the occasional squid only. Rakers working the shallows south of The Hut and Port Vincent reported a few small crabs.

Ardrossan: Gar and blue swimmer crabs were targeted by holidaymakers last week with mixed success. The jetty has blueys and tommy ruff. Local mulloway reports have been quiet.

Aldridge, Ramsey bring home silver

Yorke Peninsula talents Ella Aldridge and Airlie Ramsey have made South Australian Country basketball team history.

The girls went down to Queensland South again, by 17 this time.

SAC U16 Boys assistant coach Grant Keleher, of Moonta, described the girls' tournament as

"Ella Aldridge shot superbly and hit a couple clutch three-pointers that helped the girls run away with games."
