# Chemists cut back

CHEMISTS on Yorke Peninsula are cutting back on opening hours and making other changes to save money in response to the introduction of 60-day dispensing on September 1.

The federal government initiative allows GPs to issue two-month prescriptions of a select group of medications to treat common chronic conditions including asthma, cardiovascular disease, depression, diabetes and hypertension, so patients can save on dispensing fees.

Nearly 100 common medicines listed on

the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme are included in the first stage of the policy and the list will grow to more than 300 over the next year.

Already, opening hours at the Maitland and Minlaton pharmacies have been cut by half an hour each weekday, to close at 5pm, and proprietor Noel Allen said he would probably have to close both pharmacies on Saturdays.

"I will be surprised if Saturday survives, which is a shame because some people only come into town on a Saturday," he said.

"This would be terrible for the town and for tourists too."

Mr Allen said he had laid off an assistant

pharmacy manager who provided support to each of his five regional pharmacies and expected to make other cuts.


The Minlaton and Maitland pharmacies had previously provided weekly packing of dosage administration aids, also known as Webster-paks, as a free public service, but will now charge \$6 a week.

"Seventy patients in each store are affected — that will cost them more than \$300 per year," he said.

"In reality, it costs us about \$15 per week to pack them so we are still subsidising.

"We may have to charge the full cost eventually."

As a former councillor elsewhere, I recall representations being made to the commission to review distribution of grants.

Our councils should take up that fight. And Copper Coast Council must review its

previous decision not to be recognised as a city. With 15,000 residents, city status brings

increased funding possibilities.

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# Concerns grow around dispensing changes

MAITLAND and Minlaton pharmacy proprietor Noel Allen said savings being made by patients on dispensing fees were being covered by pharmacies, not the government.

"Most pharmacies are small businesses run by devoted pharmacists and staff," he said.

"The funding cuts as a result of this new model will cost the average pharmacy \$180,000 per year in lost gross profit — the profit which pays the bills and keeps the pharmacy open and brings a resident pharmacist to town with pay and accommodation."

Mr Allen said the Regional Pharmacy Maintenance Allowance increase announced by the federal government would only be worth about \$22,000 a year each for the Maitland and Minlaton pharmacies and would not cover the loss of income from 60-day dispensing.

Stansbury Pharmacy owner George Kokar said he used to open on Saturdays between the October long weekend and Easter to cater for summer visitors but from this year, he would only open one Saturday a month to coincide with the Stansbury Market.

And he said he was considering closing or only opening for reduced hours on days when he was away to save on the cost of paying a locum pharmacist.

"We have introduced a number of fees for services we previously did for free or a small charge such as Webster packs, blood pressure monitoring, vaccinations, delivery of prescriptions, sick certificates, signing documents, wound dressing, et cetera," Mr Kokar said.


"In its current form, 60-day dispensing may make medicines more affordable for a minority and the government itself, but it will increase the price of services for the most vulnerable, who won't save any money in general.

"The extra strain on the (medicine) supply system means it will become less reliable than it already is and with a number of pharmacies looking to close in towns across Australia access in a lot of regions will be severely compromised."

Meanwhile, the Pharmacy Guild has entered into early negotiations with the federal government over the eighth Community Pharmacy Agreement, which is expected to take effect from March 1, 2024.


Pharmacy Guild SA branch president Nick Panayiaris said the guild had agreed to suspend its public campaign against 60-day dispensing during the negotiations as a sign of good faith.

"We are hoping we can address the potential impact of 60-day dispensing on community pharmacy," he said.

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# Slippery new feature set for New Town

SIX key projects on the Copper Coast are set to be fast tracked thanks to federal government funding.

Copper Coast Council received \$649,964 through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program Phase 4 to fast-track a range of works.

A new slide at New Town (Kadina) playground, the North Beach Traffic Management Plan, extension of the Kadina Dog Park and next steps of the Polgreen and McCauley Park (both Moonta) Masterplans, totalling \$412,199, have all been unlocked through Part A of the program.

Council has also allocated \$237,765 towards the upgrade of Moonta Road, Moonta Bay, through

CEO Russell Peate said all of the projects were identified needs of the Copper Coast, but needed to be submitted to the Department for Infrastructure and Transport for funding allocation before they could proceed.

New Town children are one step closer to playing on a new tower slide after the current structure was fenced off by council due to safety concerns more than a year ago.

Council plans to match the \$81,000 funding with its own contribution to erect the slide.

New Town resident Dean Rodda said he looked forward to seeing a slide being used in the playground

"I helped to build the current slide 40 plus years ago... it only cost about \$5000 which was all fundraising," Mr Rodda said.

"It was very popular and well used so, when the council fenced it off, there was a lot of animosity and we've been lobbying to get it replaced ever

"The new slide will be a similar height to the old one but with a few extra features like a climbing web, (additional) smaller slide underneath and an enclosed internal staircase.

"It's very aesthetically pleasing and will be safe for the kids."

CCC CEO Russell Peate said council would also fund landscaping and a new soft fall surface underneath the slide, bringing the total project cost to about \$180,000.

### Improving traffic at North Beach

Council plans to allocate \$176,298 towards a North Beach Traffic

Management Plan, intended to reduce risk between traffic and pedestrian movements by increasing parking and accessibility on Pamir Court, Wallaroo.

Director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said the plan could provide up to 30 additional car parks.

"Scope for this project includes formalised street parallel and angle parking along Pamir Court to maximise parking spaces for both the cafe (North Beach Kitchen) and Wallaroo Holiday Park," Mr Neumann said.

"We would maintain a 1.5 metrewide footpath (closest the cafe and caravan park) which would connect to the existing footpath.

"A concrete protuberance to slow traffic and a pedestrian crossing will be included to maintain or increase pedestrian access through exposed concrete footpaths.

"We hope to provide improved access to the existing viewing node and platform via steps to provide safe pedestrian access to the cafe.

"The number one priority (of this plan) is safety whilst providing greater access to the cafe and caravan park area."

Council is set to consult the public, including affected landowners, before a draft plan is proposed.

### Big boosts for parks

A total \$80,000 has been allocated to McCauley Park, and \$36,580 to Polgreen Park to progress each of the park masterplans.

Friends of McCauley Park spokesperson Josie Welk said the money would be spent wisely as there was still lots to do within the park.

"We may look at putting a wooden fence up and create a proper carpark at the entrance," she said.

"We'll make sure our plans are clear and work with council to decide what needsto be done."

Moonta and District Progress Association president Matthew Stock said it was wonderful to see a significant amount of money put back into the local community.

"There's potential for some adult exercise equipment and some other projects in Polgreen Park," he said.

### Moonta Road to be sealed

The Part B funding allocation is set to assist with the full sealing of Moonta Road, Moonta Bay.

The upgrade follows stormwater rectification works completed earlier

"We are providing a sealed road surface that includes underground stormwater, kerb and channel, footpaths and street scapes," Mr Neumann said.

"We are still in early stages - a road survey has been completed and the engineering of a road design is out for tender.

"This stage of the project (Stage 1) encompasses Haylock Road through to East Terrace."

Stage 2 will involve the sealing of Moonta Road from East Terrace to Carlisle Street and Stage 3, from Carlisle Street to the foreshore (Marine Parade).

### **Expansion for dog park**

Council plans to extend the Kadina Dog Park by about 1230 square metres, estimated to cost \$36,000.

"Final design is to be confirmed, but the expansion will involve further lawn, play and seating areas," Mr Neumann said.

"This will allow for increased usage and other possibilities, such as catering for large and small dogs."

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# SPRINGING OUT OF WINTER

### Warmest winter on record as spring heats up

DESPITE wet and wild weather last week, a warmer and drier spring has been predicted after the warmest Australian winter on

The Bureau of Meteorology's long-range forecast for spring shows below-average rainfall is likely for most of Australia along with warmer than usual tempera-

BOM climate services manager Dr Karl Braganza said unusually warm days were likely for almost all areas over spring.

"Spring is forecast to be warmer than usual across the country," he said.

Dr Braganza said there was a significant contrast in climatic conditions this spring compared with last year when Australia had its second-wettest spring on record.

"This spring, the forecast shows most areas have a high chance of below-average rainfall, and many areas have an increased chance of an unusually dry spring," he said.

Areas with the highest chance of an unusually dry spring are Australia's south-west and parts of the east.

Climate influences on the spring long-range forecast include the possibility of an El Niño forming this year, with BOM currently on El Niño Alert.


When El Niño Alert criteria have been met in the past, an El Niño event has developed around 70 per cent of the time.

Senior climatologist Catherine Ganter said climate models also showed a positive Indian Ocean Dipole event was likely to form during spring.

"This increases our chances of below average rainfall for much of south-eastern and central Australia," she said.

"If a positive IOD occurs with an El Ñiño, the drying effect is typically stronger and more widespread across Australia, compared with either event by themselves."

Tomorrow's (Wednesday) forecast masimum temperature is 26° and mostly sunny, Thursday and Friday 27°, heading into a fine weekend in the mid-to-high 20s.

### Tickera boundary bid rejected

A BID to change the boundary of the Tickera township has been rejected by the Local Government Boundaries Commission.

The bid was led by local landholder Dale Morphett who proposed the southern boundary of Barunga West Council be moved from a fenceline south of Tickera to a new boundary along Black Rock and Kinnear Roads.

The proposal would have moved land from Copper Coast Council to Barunga West.

At BWC's meeting on August 8, chief executive Maree Wauchope said the commission's final report concluded there was no substantial evidence to support the proposal and recommended it not proceed.

The commission's report said the subject area was predominantly owned by Mr Morphett as the proponent, along with a small number of other landowners with properties along Myponie Point Drive and Morphett Road, Tickera.

A small section of the coastline is under the ownership of the Minister for Climate, Environment and Water as Crown Land.

The proposal argued the existing boundary created a clear division in the township of Tickera, as it separated the residential township area of Tickera from adjacent rural and coastal living properties to the south.

Key points raised by the proponent were that the area had been historically tied to the Tickera community, it utilised services in the BWC area and CCC did not provide roadside vegetation maintenance, and BWC appeared to provide a superior service.

The commission received 16 submissions on the proposal, with the majority in opposi-

Concerns raised by the community about a potential shift into BWC can be categorised into four main areas - community of interest, land use planning, boundary history and road maintenance.

Public submissions found residents of Tickera predominantly used the services provided by CCC in Wallaroo and Kadina, and there was apprehensions around the possibility of land in the affected area being rezoned and developed.

There were also concerns about future maintenance of Black Rock Road, waste disposal associated with the influx of holiday visitors and the impact of any housing development along the coastline adjacent to Myponie Point Drive.

The report noted CCC was strongly

opposed to the proposal.

"The council's view is the proposal is chiefly driven by a desire or an expectation for land within the subject area to be rezoned and is of the view this is not sufficient grounds for a change to a long-standing council boundary," the report said.

The report said BWC had stated, if the boundary change was implemented, it would help the council realise growth opportunities for Tickera, particularly along the coast.

However, BWC had indicated the boundary change was not a priority for it to pursue.

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# **Drunk driver** caught speeding 86km/h over limit

A MAN was reported after being caught speeding and drink driving at Stansbury on Friday night, September 8.

Police were conducting speed detection duties on the St Vincent Highway when they detected a white Audi sedan travelling at 186km/h in a 100km/h zone at about 10.30pm.

The driver, a 38-year-old man from Prospect, was stopped and submitted to a breath analysis test, to which he returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.198.

The man was reported for drink driving and aggravated extreme speed.

He was also issued with an immediate 12-month loss of licence and will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

#### Gel blasters seized at Wallaroo

Almost 20 gel blasters were seized from a Wallaroo home on Sunday, September 10.

Police attended the property at about 5pm, after receiving

information about unregistered

After searching the home, police located 16 gel blasters of varying types.

The occupant, a 47-year-old man, was reported for possessing unregistered firearms, possessing firearms without a licence and possessing insecure

He will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

A South Australia Police spokesperson said if you have a gel blaster, you have a firearm.

"Gel blasters are subject to

the same licensing, registration and security conditions as other firearms," the spokesperson

"Any person not licensed to have a gel blaster, or any person with a gel blaster that is not registered, can surrender it to police or a partici-pating licensed firearms dealer as part of the firearms amnesty."

### Manslaughter charge dropped

ANTONY Ogar has had his manslaughter charge dropped a day before he was set to face

The Port Hughes 60-year-old was set to appear in court on a murder charge over the death of his wife Cherry Gerente Ogar in July last year, but the charge was downgraded to manslaughter in October.

Mr Ogar appeared in the Supreme Court of

South Australia last Thursday, September 7, before a prosecutor entered a "nolle prosequi", meaning the charge would not proceed.

Mr Ogar's legal team had previously argued medical evidence did not conclusively prove an act of violence produced Ms Ogar's fatal head

The court did not hear any reasons for the charge being dropped.

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# **BWC** to create industrial zone

AN industrial zone could be created at Port Broughton with Barunga West Council entering into an option agreement to buy seven hectares of land on the north-eastern outskirts of the

It is part of a push by council to drive investment and job creation in the community.

The land fronts Hornby Road and is owned by a local family. Although zoned for industrial use, it is currently used for farming.

Council plans to offer 15 blocks,

ranging in size from 3050 square metres to 18,420sqm.

BWC chief executive Maree Wauchope said council was taking a proactive approach to address the undersupply of industrial zone land and lack of active local developers.

She said the project arose after council received several unsolicited enquiries from parties seeking to develop industrial land in Port Broughton.

"There had been no interest to sell or develop the property for industry, until council's proposal was put forward," she said.

Ms Wauchope said plans for devel-

opment of the zone included heavy vehicle-compatible roads, dry allotments approved by SA Water, and a principal power hub provided by SA Power Networks.

Future landowners would need to cover costs related to transformers, road crossings, and rainwater harvesting in their development plans.

Mayor Leonie Kerley led the motion to acquire the land so it could be sold to private developers.

"This bold move underscores council's proactive role in facilitating development outcomes which support the growth and prosperity of our communities," Mrs Kerley said.

"It aligns with our broader strategic vision and marks a significant step towards our goal of well-planned and responsible economic development in

"Council is on track to deliver necessary works to make the land suitable for industrial use, despite a reduced option term of six months.

"This includes development feasibility, design works, cost estimates, and negotiations with real estate firms.

"A fully flexible subdivision plan has been developed and design work undertaken on the access road."

Council had been approached by people who wanted to buy land for building sheds and tiny homes and commercial fishers interested in securing land for storage.

Industrial real estate specialist Colliers has been engaged for marketing and sales.

Colliers industrial national director Paul Tierney said there had been encouraging enquiry for the land.

"There is a need for appropriately zoned land to allow industry and other commercial operations to develop and meet their requirements," Mr Tierney said.

"Our process is to determine the level of demand to justify the subdivi-

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# Locals address rising cost of living

COMMUNITY members had the opportunity to hear from industry stakeholders about options available to combat the rising cost of living last week.

Community forums, hosted by Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis, were held in Wallaroo and Minlaton last Thursday, September 7.

Attendees had the opportunity to chat to Alison Wood from the Department of Human Services, Wayne Barbour from the Department of Energy and Mining, and Tom Geyer from Uniting Country SA.

Mr Geyer, who is a financial counsellor, spoke about how to access assistance through Uniting Country SA.

He said creating a budget and sticking to it was a key way people could avoid unnecessary stress.

"The best way to track expenses... is to review bank statements and prioritise your essential spending like rent, utilities, medical and transport," Mr Geyer said.

"The key one is to be able to separate your wants and needs.

"A really helpful resource is a spending diary, but there are also tracking and your banking apps (for your phone) as well.

'We've noticed a lot more

people using buy now, pay later means it costs more (for counservices, as a supposedly easier option to buying things, but it actually just promotes overspending and delays the liabili-

He said the forums were important as they gave people the ability to access all three services in one place.

"At UCSA we offer no interest loans... a loan up to \$2000 for essential goods and services, so that could be household furniture, appliances, car repairs, medical, dental or education," Mr Geyer said.

"As the name suggests, whatever you borrow, is what you pay back, over up to two years.

"Eligibility for these loans is to earn less than \$70,000 annually on a single income, \$100,000 on a double income or have a Health Care or Pensioner Concession Card."

Mr Ellis said the cost-ofliving crisis was easily one of the biggest issues facing locals currently.

"It's only getting more pressing as costs continue to rise, so with so many people doing it tough, I thought it would be a good opportunity to provide as much information as possible about how to ease those pressures," he said.

"The tyranny of distance


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
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

# Lakeside campsite potential

YORKE Peninsula Council is exploring the possibility of establishing two new campgrounds alongside well-renowned salt lakes on southern Yorke Peninsula to complement its already popular bush camping sites.

Council has identified large, flat spaces at Pink Lake and Lake Fowler — two key locations among the abundant salt lakes in the Yorketown area which could be used as official campgrounds.

Both spaces are located along the Yorke Peninsula Salt Lake Trail, a tourist attraction with increasing visitation, including by recreational vehicles, which first opened in 2021.

"The sites at our beautiful pink lakes are already attracting visitors, so providing them with somewhere to stay overnight will be a welcome move," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"With changes planned following this summer to deal with overcrowding at our 19 existing bush camps, it is also timely to add more camping sites to accommodate the many people who enjoy visiting Yorke Peninsula for camping.

"The salt lake campgrounds may also be preferred by campers during winter as they are away from coastal conditions and the lakes can be stunning at that time of year."

Council announced it would release a new online booking system for its campgrounds following a rise

of almost 500 permits on peak New Year's period days between 2018-19 and 2022-23, which revealed limitations with its current in-house system.

'We welcome camping tourism, and want to ensure campers have an enjoyable time rather than being unable to find sites or being packed tightly into campgrounds," Mr Braund said.

"We also know for tourism to thrive in the long term, we need to protect our coastal environment, and unfortunately overcrowding at peak times has caused environmental concerns in recent years."

It has been considered some tourists may prefer the option to camp further inland, as opposed to along the coast, where all the current campgrounds are situated.

Brentwood's Roger Hogben, who has spent his time travelling large parts of Australia in a motorhome and consulted with council on its bush camping facilities, said the introduction of new sites at salt lakes could only be a good idea.

"Because those locations are away from the coast, which would be in contrast to the rest, it would potentially attract others to come more often after they discover them for the first time," he said.

"It's a different option — which is good — and unless they try, they'll never know, because it may or may not work; its success would be in how popular

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# Call to extend breast screening reminders

THE cut-off for breast cancer screening reminders should be extended beyond 74 years of age, according to Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis.

BreastScreen SA currently sends screening reminders to women between 50 and 74 every two years.

Mr Ellis is calling for the upper age limit to be reviewed, in line with an increase in average female life expectancy.

"With the mobile BreastScreen bus currently in Wallaroo again offering its free mammograms, it is timely to look at the process for such vital health checks reminders," he said.

"I have contacted (Health) Minister Picton about this issue before and his response was there was currently no evidence which demonstrates an age raise would result in more health benefits but I think this is not acceptable.

"Early detection programs save lives and bluntly, health expenditure, so I believe it is worthwhile reviewing this practice and raising the age to receive the annual reminders until age 80."

In 1991, BreastScreen Australia's defined key screening age parameters were 50 to 69 but the upper age limit was increased in 2013 to reflect rising life expectancy, Mr Ellis said.

"Another rise is now justified with federal government's Intergenerational Report citing unprecedented numbers Australians are now living well into their 80s," he said.

The Intergenerational Report 2023, released in August projected over the next 40 years, life expectancy will increase from 81.3 years for men and 85.2 years for women to 87 and 89.5 respectively.

Mr Ellis said, although women

over the age of 74 could still have free breast screening, the fact they were not reminded to do so could lead to poor outcomes.

"I received contact from a constituent who accepted it was her own responsibility to keep undergoing health checks, but because she didn't receive her reminder in the mail, it slipped her mind and unfortunately it was not until symptoms occurred she attended her doctor to find out she had more advanced breast cancer," Mr Ellis said.

A spokesperson for BreastScreen SA said free screenings are provided every two years to women over the age of 40.

Women aged 50 to 74 are actively invited to attend for regular screening and this age group is targeted because around 80 per cent of breast cancers occurs in women over 50.

"Women aged 75 and over are welcome to make an appointment for a free breast screen, but as women aged 75 and over may have complex health issues to consider, we recommend they have a discussion with their general practitioner about the benefit of screening for them," the spokesperson said.

"Around one in seven Australian women are diagnosed with breast cancer before the age of 75 with the average age of diagnosis being 62 years old," the spokesperson said.

Regular screening reduces the chance of dying from breast cancer by up to 41 per cent.

Mr Ellis urged constituents who wish to provide feedback on this issue to contact his office.

The BreastScreen SA bus is in Wallaroo until November 7 and is located at 5 John Terrace, next to the old railway station.

It will be at Maitland in November and Yorketown in January.

### Survivor backs push to extend age limit

KADINA breast cancer survivor Sonva Earle supports the push to extend the age limit for screening reminders from

Sonya was 55 when she was diagnosed with breast cancer and had chemotherapy, radiation and a bilateral

She is looking forward to celebrating five years clear of cancer next year.

Her mother, Gwen Knight, of Kadina, and mother-in-law Maxine Earle, of

Clare, were both in their 80s when they were diagnosed with cancer in August 2022 and are being treated with medication.

Mrs Earle, said, although an extension of the reminder limit to 80 vears would not have helped either woman, the fact Australian women are living longer and healthier lives should be taken into account.

"There are a lot of 74-year-old women who are as fit as anybody and I feel they should have the option to be reminded of screening," she said.

Mrs Earle said not sending screening reminders to women after the age of 74 sends a message to those women that they are not at risk of breast cancer.

She reminded all women of the importance of screening and other preventative measures to detect breast

"Early detection is the key — feel your boobs!" Mrs Earle said.





# Locals raise over \$500k for cancer research, support

MEMBERS and supporters of the Northern Yorke Peninsula branch of Cancer Council SA gathered at the Kadina Bowling Club for a morning tea to celebrate the branch's 30th anniversary on Friday, September 8.

Cancer Council SA chief executive Kerry Rowlands congratulated the branch on all its achievements, including the fact it had raised \$500,240 since it was formed.

"It's key to note everyone involved is volunteering their time - we can't thank you enough," she said.

Ms Rowands said \$47,000 of the total funds raised by the branch had contributed directly to the oncology unit at Wallaroo Hospital.

'By the time we reach 85, one in two people has received a cancer diagnosis," she said.

Ms Rowlands said funds raised by the branch were used to support three main areas of activities by Cancer Council SA — preventative programs, cancer research, and support for patients.

She said a current priority in cancer prevention was to limit the health impacts of vaping on Australian children by lobbying the federal government to restrict the sale and distribution of vapes.

Ms Rowlands said advancements in cancer research had made a dramatic difference to cancer patients over the past 30 years, with survival rates for all cancer types increasing from 50 per cent to 70 per cent.

"We want the survival rate to be 100 per cent and we will keep working really hard to support research to make those breakthroughs," she said.

Ms Rowlands said the accommodation provided by Cancer Council SA at its new Greenhill Lodge in Eastwood, Adelaide, was a vital service for regional cancer patients and their families, as it provided fully subsidised accommodation, meals, transport to appointments and other services.

The founding president of the NYP branch Joyce Wearn OAM spoke about the branch's his-

She said more than 200 people had joined the branch since its formation in September 1993.

She was supported on the original committee by vice-president Yvonne Dayman, secretary Judyth Bettess, and treasurer Valerie Adams.

Mrs Wearn acknowledged the many and varied fundraising efforts by NYP branch volunteers over the years, including film evenings, craft stalls, the Relay for Life, Biggest Morning Teas, catering, open garden events, fashion parades and Daffodil Day stalls.

"Thank you for what you are doing and please keep up the good work," Mrs Wearn said.



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### Making preschool hours more family-friendly

THE state government will make preschool hours more family friendly with a trial of out-of-hours care following the release of the Royal Commission into Early Childhood Education and Care.

Work will immediately begin on expanding Out of School Hours Care (OSHC) with more than \$10 million invested into the sector.

This includes a \$1.7m trial at 20 preschool sites, specifically in regions of capacity need such as northern and northeastern South Australia and outer suburbs, with expressions of interest being put out to preschools on Yorke Peninsula.

Adele Kibbler, of Wallaroo, said most families, including her own, would benefit from familyfriendly preschool hours.

"As a family with two working parents, we can find preschool hours really tough to navigate and often have to rely on friends and family for drop-offs or pick-ups," she said.

"To have access to out-

of-hours care, preferably with options for the morning and afternoon, would be superb and make our lives a lot easier.

"However, there would need to be staff willing to take on these extra hours so some of the funding might have to go towards finding the staff to accommodate the idea.

"It's all about finding that balance and flexibility for working parents but also what works best for children's learning."

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said by supporting families through wraparound care the government was lifting the quality of education and increasing workforce participation.

"These outcomes will be significant for decades to come," he said.

"We know for lots of working families, the 9am preschool 3pm timetable simply isn't manageable and prohibits families from workforce participation."

Operational models for these trials will be tested specified locations in 2024.

### **Auslan messaging improves inclusion**

THREE news Auslan signs are hoped to improve children's understanding of sign language across the Copper Coast.

Signage has been erected at the Victoria Square playground, Kadina, and is also set to feature in Polgreen Park, Moonta, and the Wallaroo Adventure Playground.

Copper Coast Council sourced the signs, designed by The Deaf Butterfly Effect, to demonstrate the English alphabet and basic words such as hello, play and friend, in

Council infrastructure services representative Mandie Malone said the signage was intended to ensure access and inclusivity within public

"This project changes attitudes and awareness, making sure all people feel welcome and included in our community," Ms Malone said.

"It is now doubly important for kids to learn more Auslan and interact with deaf and hard of hearing kids in our community since the Department of Education now offers Auslan as a LOTE (Languages Other than English) language in schools."

Kadina 1 year old Aiden Hargrave-Upton, who experiences hearing loss, relies on alternative forms of communication.

Aiden's mother Tiffany Hargrave said it was great to see increased Auslan messaging in public spaces.

"These (signs) are great learning tools to get more kids using sign language," Ms Hargrave said.

The more people who learn

Auslan from a young age, the more people will be able to use it to communicate later in life."

Ms Hargrave said Aiden may need to learn braille in order to

"It would be good to see an expansion of braille locally for kids like Aiden to use," she said.

"There's still lots of unknowns (regarding the extent of Aiden's issues), but the older he gets, the more we'll be able to understand his needs."

Councillor Cathy Vluggen said any new services to improve local inclusion was welcomed.

"It's great to see different types of inclusion happening around the Copper Coast... when I was a child with a disability, there was nothing like this," she said.

"It's also been great to see Auslan

being introduced at local schools and becoming more commonly accepted overall?

Harvest Christian College, Kadina, began teaching Auslan to years 1 to 5 students in 2020.

"This (subject) was well received by students and parents, and from 2021, Auslan has been taught to all primary classes," HCC Auslan teacher Kay Lawrie said.

"Students are positively engaged in learning the language, which promotes inclusivity.

"Not only are students learning a second language, Auslan is a good tool to teach literacy, improve memory and practise effective communication skills.

"Parents have also enjoyed seeing their students perform songs in Auslan at assemblies and end-ofyear presentation ceremonies."

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## \$10k grant for **Tickera trail**

A HISTORICAL well at Tickera will be the centrepiece of a new walking trail, created to showcase Nharangga culture and the well's significance since European settlement.

Barunga West Council has received a \$9998 grant from the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board to create the trail, which will feature a QR code to create an immersive experience for

A council spokesperson said it was expected planning, consultation and signage design would start in September, construction would start in late 2023 or early 2024 and trees would be planted in autumn

The well is located in a gully between Broughton Terrace and North Gully Road and is one of two wells established on the pastoral lease developed by the Parnell and Bowman families in the 1850s.

It was used to water cattle on their way from the Bowman's property at Crystal Brook to supply the townships of Kadina and Wallaroo with meat, and

supplied Moonta Mines with water in the 1860s.

Council chief executive Maree Wauchope said the trail would build on work completed in 2021 by the Tickera Community and Recreation Association, which had revitalised the area.


"Trail-goers can expect an enriched landscape featuring native delights like bush tomatoes, wattle, saltbush, and quandongs," she said.

"With enhanced plantings, visitors are invited to a tactile and informative experience, acquainting themselves with the native food species that have sustained the Nharangga people for generations.

"By emphasising Nharangga narratives, we (will) not only enrich our understanding of the Tickera historic well's significance but also embrace contemporary means to celebrate age-old stories."

Ms Wauchope said the project would reaffirm council's commitment to valuing the Nharangga people's deep-rooted stories and intrinsic connection to the land.

"The project promises to enhance regional tourism,

inviting visitors to explore a unique blend of history, culture and nature," she said.

In a letter of support, Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association chair

Michael Wanganeen said the association would provide cultural advice for the project through the Nharangga Wabana Ngara (knowledge group).

"The area currently has no recognition of Nharangga country and only reflects European history of the well," he said.

**NWN** member Turner said the well at Tickera had been a vitally important water source for the many Nharangga families who lived along the nearby coast-

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

# Imogen fighting her way to the top

Imogen McDonnell initially took up boxing for her fitness, but her love of the sport has taken her to places she could have never imagined.

Originally from Minlaton, McDonnell, a 25-year-old nurse and trackwork rider, began boxing competitively in 2022.

Boxing positively impacts every aspect of my life and has introduced me to an incredible community of people," she said.

"A few things have contributed to me pursing boxing — I have been lucky enough to train with and box against some of Australia's highest ranked repre-

"The opportunity to measure my skills against such a calibre of boxers has been invaluable to my progress and encourages me to keep targeting that high level of

"My partner (Donald Jones) and closest friend (Katie Riddle) are also elite level amateur boxers; I have always looked up to them, so getting to train and compete alongside them is unique and extremely special to me.

"I also love the lifestyle of being an athfor striving performance/health, the discipline it requires and the challenges it presents."

Following a silver medal at the Victorian state titles in May, McDonnell secured her place on the state team and was selected to compete at the 2023 Elite Australian Championships and Pacific Games Qualifier Event.

"This was the pathway event to the 2024 Paris Olympic Games," she said.

"In the semifinal I drew Kaye Scott in the boxing world Kaye needs no introduction, she is ranked number one in Australia and seventh in the world.

"I boxed to the best of my abilities and executed the game plan, but unfortunately lost to the more experienced boxer."

McDonnell's training consists of three to five boxing sessions mixed with many other workout routines and she has a

nine-hour round trip fortnightly to Melbourne for state trainings and high-

level sparring. "Match bouts are not guaranteed, but I'm hoping to close out this year with two (bouts) in November," she said.

"My goal as an amateur boxer is to reach my full potential and continue targeting the Australian championships and selection events.

"I would love to represent Australia at the Olympics, a Women's Worlds Championships, the Commonwealth Games, or any other international tourna-

"I would also like to have a handful of professional fights for the novelty of it, when my amateur career starts to wind

"I see myself having a lifelong commit-

ment to this sport, I am undertaking my level one coaches course and hope to step into a coaching role at some point."

McDonnell currently balances boxing with her two part-time jobs and study commitments.

"There is no money in amateur boxing, so these jobs are my sole income and first priority," she said.

"I am not special, I come from humble

Sam Meschede and Jayden Hawkins dominated in the ruck and around the ground, and they were well supported by midfielder Charlie Dickeson.


Noah Pachur marked strongly and converted well up forward to finish with six goals.

With scores tied at quarter time, a top-shelf defensive effort from Paskeville allowed Ardrossan just one goal for the next three quar-







# Understanding risk management on the farm



WHEN making big decisions on the farm, there are some definite strategies to make the process easier, according to farm management consultant, coach and facilitator Danielle Lannin England.

Ms Lannin England will give an insight into factors to consider when making important decisions at the Hart Field Day on Tuesday, September 19.

"When we talk about risk in agriculture, we often think about production risk, and while that is a key risk, there are other risks around personal and social factors we need to manage as professional farm business owners," she

"Part of it is getting your head around managing risk because we will never eliminate risk, but you can manage

Ms Lannin England will share her top three tips for managing risks during her presentation.

"We sometimes need to step back and check in with our thinking behind decision making," she said.

"There are logical decisions, values-based decisions and intuition.

"On the logical side, by following a recipe of things we know, like the soil types which suit different crops, our fertiliser and fungicide strategies, we can minimise risk in production.

"By building a key team of advisors and support around us, we know we're also making the best financial decisions."

Ms Lannin England said the way we viewed risk and reward was closely linked with the values we hold.

"We know if we're coming off three pretty good seasons like we have, we are often prepared to take more risk and feel quite positive about these decisions," she said

"Where we're at in our

farming career also influences decision making.

"Early in our career we might be more prepared to take more risks, but later in our farming career we might just be happy to go with the status quo so as to not damage the wealth we've built up."

Ms Lannin England has worked extensively across Australia's mixed-farming industries for the past 20 years, and is based at Keilira in the state's South East, where she is involved in a broadacre grains and Merino wool farming business with her husband Jonathan and his family.

She was listed in the Emerald 2014 top 100 Women in Australian Agribusiness, and was the 2013 Western Australian RIRDC Rural Woman of the

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# Sheep herding skills on display

FANS of sheep dog trials will have two opportunities to watch more than 100 working dogs and their handlers in action on Yorke Peninsula this month.

The Dogpro Plus Maitland Trial will be held at Maitland Oval from Thursday to Saturday, September 21 to 23, followed by the Dogpro Plus Paskeville Trial during the Yorke Peninsula Field Days, Tuesday to Thursday, September 26 to 28.

Merv Simmonds from the South Australian Working Sheepdog Association said both events would be threesheep trials, requiring each competitor and their dog to put three sheep through a series of obstacles.

He said he expected about 25 competitors and more than 100 dogs at each event, including teams from Western Australia, Tasmania, Victoria and New South Wales.

"We have attracted more handlers and more dogs this year because it's been boosted by the fact the Supreme Australian Working Sheepdog Championships are being held in Strathalbyn from September 9 to 17,"

"For example, at the 2022 Maitland trials we had 19 novice dogs while this year we have got 35 novices, and in 2022 we had 45 open improver dogs but this year we have 75."

Merv said sheepdog trials were becoming more popular with the general public as a spectator event which could be partly attributed to the success of the ABC TV series, Muster Dogs.

The judge at the Maitland trials will be former state champion, Anthony Ireland, Mundoora.

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



Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham.

ABOUT a month ago I made one of my very irregular appearances at a gig; I went and saw indie-punk Perth rockers Sly Withers at the Lion Arts Factory, Adelaide.

I had discovered the group two and a half years ago, when they debuted in Triple J's Hottest 200 with Cracks, coming in at number 187.

What's played on Triple J isn't usually my type of music, but these guys stuck out to me.

Made up of vocalists/guitarists Jono Mata and Sam Blitvich, drummer Joel Neubecker and bassist Shea Moriarty, they had a good sound, the lyricism was topnotch and they had the vibe of a group of blokes who were passionate about doing what

They released their second album, Gardens, in 2021, which peaked at number 10 in the ARIA charts, and fans were blown away by third single Clarkson, in particular.

It's a terrific song, perfectly encapsulating the feelings many can associate with, intertwined with spiralling guitar.

Their gig, albeit intimate, would've also blown most people away.

They have a roster of songs which runs surprisingly deep, although it was the alreadypopular songs which did the most for the tightly packed in crowd.

They worked through songs such as the stadium-worthy

Explode Into View, charming Lately, and emotionally charged Passing Through in impeccable fashion, only stopping every now and then to plead with the rowdy crowd to stop pushing each other around.

It doesn't get too much better than the ending of Cracks, The Scientist (a cover of Coldplay's original, done first for Like A Version on Triple J) and Clarkson.

Bands like these guys know exactly how to send people home in the right way, feeling giddy about the previous hour and a half, and humming the same tune repeatedly.

They're by no means one of Australia's biggest groups going around, but their star is rising.

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# **HOT FISHING TIPS**

Wallaroo: Last week's strong to galeforce winds with some rain dropped back markedly over the weekend with calm but cool nights producing tommy ruff (Australian herring) and squid in the lights at the ietty. Boats crews reported King George whiting, garfish, squid and big snook.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Boat ramp traffic increased as crews ran out to Cape Elizabeth, West Light and the Steamer channel for a few KG whiting, garfish and the odd blue swimmer crab. The jetties had garfish, tommies at night and blueys.

Port Victoria: The jetty produced squid and tommies while boaties found whiting from the Hardwicke reef and Songvaar wreck grounds and garfish at North Point.

Point Turton: Early morning KG whiting, squid and flathead were landed in Hardwicke Bay and the jetty gave squid and a few tommies. Further west there have been gar and squid out from Point Souttar and The Pines.

Edithburgh: Boat crews fishing Tapley Shoals and Marion reef reported catching snook, big leather jackets, gurnards and flounder. Night fishing at the jetty yielded a few tommies and squid.

Stansbury/Port Vincent: Boaties fishing out from The Hut and then north of the oyster leases to the Orontes Bank reported legal KG whiting, the odd blue crab, squid and small gar. Several teams of rakers were sighted working local beaches for blue crabs at Port Vincent and Billy Goat Flat. Tommies and squid were landed from the Stansbury jetty and Port Vincent wharf.

**Ardrossan:** Try the jetty for night-time tommy ruff, squid and even soapie mulloway. Boat crews caught blueys, squid, whiting and garfish. Further north to Price Creek and Port Julia there have been blue crabs and a few gar.
