Closing in on new councils

CANDIDATES for this year's local government elections have been revealed.

Copper Coast Council only received eight nominations, one short of the nine required councillors, but enough to ensure a supplementary election is avoided.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot will be elected unopposed as she was the only nominee for the role.

Andrew Male is set to be the only $\;\;$ bury and Innes/Penton Vale Wards.

new elected member, with former councillors Margaret Pope and Dean Rodda stepping down.

There were 11 nominations in Barunga West Council, with nine to be elected and a mayor chosen from successful candidates.

Former mayor Cynthia Axford, Kim Gregory and Kevin Beinke are new candidates for BWC, while Rebecca Hewett has stepped down.

Yorke Peninsula Council mayor Darren Braund has been returned, as have five councillors, and three new faces will also take seats in the Kalkabury and Innes/Penton Vale Wards. Alan Headon, Michael O'Connell and Kylie Gray will be new to YPC, while John Rich, David Langford, Anthony Bennett and Michael Murdock have decided not to contest this year's elections.

There are also four nominees for the three vacancies for Gum Flat Ward.

Mr Rich steps down after more than 25 years of service to local government.

The shortages come as reforms to the Local Government (Elections) Regulations meant all nominations were submitted online and anonymously until the deadline on Tuesday, September 6. "Previously, the returning officer (usually a council staff member) was required to display nominations from candidates for local government elections 'as soon as practicable'," a Local Government Association spokesperson said.

"This meant information about the nominees for council positions was made public throughout the nomination period.

"Potential candidates were able to examine the nominations for wards and council areas, and just before close of nominations, make decisions to nominate if vacancies existed. "This provided an advantage to candidates nominating later in the period."

The spokesperson said amended legislation now required the Electoral Commission of SA to provide each council with a list of all valid nominations, and publish this online after the close of nominations.

"As a result, no details about who has nominated can be made publicly available until after the close of nominations, removing any competitive advantage for candidates," they said.

Time to reform?

THE local government elections could be the most fascinating voting process to happen, without some residents even having to vote.

All candidates were revealed last week and in a surprise to many, there were shortages across the state.

Three councils do not have enough candidates to form a council, two had no nominations for mayor and five fell short of their total vacancy numbers but have enough for a quorum.

Copper Coast Council is one of those five, with eight nominations for nine

According to the Local Government Act, all councils are required to have a quorum (half of the vacancies) to allow meetings to be held.

Essentially, Copper Coast Council is now waiting in limbo until it can return to normal business in November.

Yorke Peninsula Council only needs to hold an election in one of its three wards, Gum Flat, where four candidates are fighting for three positions.

In Barunga West Council, there are 11 nominees for nine spots to serve the community.

It's a concern to see so few people putting their hands up for these important

That is not to say the candidates, both pending and successful, were not worthy of their space and opportunity.

But, it's hard to know whether the lack of nominations across the state signifies a level of contentment in the status quo, ignorance in the process or just plain apathy.

And, if this is what's happening now, what will the landscape look like in another four years'?

Does more need to be done to explain the role of local government in the community?

How do you engage younger people and get them involved?

Is this just a flash in the pan? Will nominations be full and plentiful in four years?

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Moonta cafe damaged in fire



A FIRE has extensively damaged the kitchen at Cafe Capella's, Moonta, Tuesday, September 6.

Emergency services received reports of a fire at the George Street cafe with smoke visible from Wallaroo — at 1.30pm.

Three MFS crews were supported by one CFS truck and firefighters equipped with breathing apparatus were able to contain the blaze to the kitchen.

"Unfortunately, there has

been extensive fire damage to the kitchen with the ceiling collapsing in that area," a MFS spokesperson said.

"There is smoke and heat damage near the kitchen."

Two staff were transported to hospital as a precaution for smoke inhalation.

MFS and SAPOL fire cause investigators are investigating the cause of the blaze and will determine its damage bill.

The cafe is closed until further notice.

The woman purchased her ticket online in the lead up to the draw last Thursday, September 8.

Hers was the sole division one winning entry, claiming the entire \$40m prize.

"It's been a tough few months, so this is life-changing.

"We will celebrate eventually — once I've processed this all."

The woman is the first Powerball division one winner in South Australia

The Lott's division one winners' tally has now reached 301 so far this calendar year, including 28 won by SA Lotteries customers.

Last financial year, Australia's official lotteries contributed more than \$1.6 billion via state lottery taxes and donations to help community initiatives, such as hospitals, health research, disaster relief and education.







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Copper Coast connected through trails

LOCAL cyclists, walkers and runners will soon have access to a shared path connecting Copper Coast's major towns.

Works to join Copper Coast Council's Kadina to Wallaroo path with the Wallaroo to Moonta path began on Monday, August 29.

The new infrastructure is set to run along Ryan Street, from Matta Street to Cornish Terrace, Wallaroo, before continuing along Cornish Terrace and connecting with the Wallaroo to Moonta path at Park Terrace.

This follows recent sealing of the 14.4-kilometre Wallaroo to Moonta trail, completed through to Kadina Road, Cross Roads.

Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said the Wallaroo to Moonta section has already had plenty of use.

"This new section along Ryan Street will act as a link point for the paths to create a larger network of trails," Mr Neumann said.

"Altogether it will span about 25 kilometres and users can start and finish wherever they want."

Mr Neumann said the network was expected to be of benefit during the Copper Trail Parkrun and the Copper Coast Cycling Cup, set to be held on Saturday and Sunday, October 8-9.

"The final stages of completing the path will be in the Moonta township and the National Trust area to coincide with their existing paths and trails," he said.

"We're also collaborating with the Rotary Club of Northern Yorke Peninsula to install four shelters at places of significance along the way, as well as bike repair stations."

Council CEO Russell Peate said the paths would continue to be a great tourism asset for the Copper Coast.

When people come to visit, they're looking for activities such as cycling and walking trails," Mr Peate said.

"I look forward to seeing this become one large network for the community to use."

Council secured \$104,398 from the Federal Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program — Phase 3, \$418,000 from the State Open Space Program for 2021-22 and \$187,800 from the State Bicycle Fund.

It has also contributed \$744,200 and an additional \$150,000 for project management costs.

The Ryan Street connection path is on track to be completed by the end of September.

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Fisherman Bay works in full swing

INFRASTRUCTURE works have begun as part of a long-awaited Fisherman Bay redevelopment.

Successful project tenderer Bardavcol has started on a range of coastal protection measures, including the first section of a seawall which will limit high tide damage to properties along Whiting Road.

Construction of an earth revetment wall and stormwater outlet along the eastern side of Fisherman Bay have been completed.

Additional revetment walls will also be constructed along Whiting Road, while works on a new CWMS system have also begun.

The \$20 million redevelopment has been enabled by an agreement which allows Barunga West Council to secure funds for infrastructure through the sales of allotments from Fisherman's Bay Management.

A total of 162 sites have officially become freehold allotments with the remaining 241 on track to be settled by January.

Council CEO Maree Wauchope said the project represented a significant development for the region.

"After decades of uncertainty, the largest ever investment in one of South Australia's most iconic shack communities will shape the future of Fisherman Bay," Ms Wauchope said.

"This project will provide certainty for residents and generate lasting benefits for the Top of the Yorke.

"Works to install the sewer network and pump stations are scheduled to start next month (October).

"Council is very happy with the progress of the project to date."

The remainder of infrastructure works are set to be staggered at different stages, ensuring minimal disruption to residents, and are due to be completed by July 2023.

ALTHOUGH all eight Copper Coast Council candidates have been confirmed as successful, they must wait until elected members are officially announced on Saturday, November

"In my time working with six councils across two states and numerous local government terms, I have never seen an insufficient number of nominations," CEO Russell Peate said.

"There may have been some feeling of apathy after both state and federal government elections recently.

"In some cases of council decision, the mayor will hold the casting vote due to an even number of councillors."

Incumbent councillors Dr Naomi Bittner and Leanne O'Brien are up against newcomers Trevor Clerke and Scott Hoyle for three seats in the Gum Flat Ward, between Port Victoria and

"Yorke Peninsula Council is pleased all elected member positions, including mayor, will be filled in 2022," CEO Andrew Cameron said.

"A lot of effort goes into seeking nominations and we thank those people who have put their hands up to serve the local community.

"Council will follow the Gum Flat Ward election with interest and wishes the candidates the best of luck."

Barunga West Council CEO Maree Wauchope said the local communities can make a real difference by voting in the upcoming election.

"It is your opportunity to have a say on your local decision-makers, and make the community a better place to live," Ms Wauchope said.

"I urge you to take some time to learn about the candidates, as their decisions will have an impact on the future of your neighbourhood.

"All voting in the council election is by post, so it really is convenient for everyone to be involved in the democratic process."

Council elections will be completed by post, with those applicable electors scheduled to receive their ballot packs in late October.

Completed votes must be received by the Electoral Commission of South Australia before 5pm on Thursday, November 10.

CRISIS POINT Health workforce depleted, burnt out

YORKE Peninsula is heading for a health workforce crisis.

Attracting and retaining doctors and nursing staff is getting harder, while staff burnout is an increasing concern.

Ardrossan Community Hospital has been trying to recruit more nurses for much of the year.

"It's getting hard because we don't have the resources because we're not connected to SA Health," executive officer/director of nursing Jodie Luke said.

"We can't offer as attractive incentives to relocate or reward staff when they do extra shifts because we are a non-government organisation.

"We don't have the finances.

"Our workforce is depleting, (acquiring) agency staff is getting harder, and staff burnout is massive."

Mrs Luke said nursing staff are being lost because they are burnt out.

"We have senior management staff who are working shifts plus doing their managerial roles," she said.

"We can't get doctors and our nurses are feeling concerned about the safety of themselves and patients if a life-threatening illness presents.

"We have had to turn patients

(presenting for acute care) away, and that was incredibly difficult for the staff.

"They were quite distressed by it but people are naturally going to come to the closest hospital in an emergency and there's nothing we can do."

Mrs Luke said the situation is multi-faceted, with Covid restrictions also playing a part in reducing staffing availability.

"We received \$180,000 in funding from the state government for our acute services but that money keeps us running," she said.

"That doesn't attract doctors to the area, and those who are here are opting out of doing acute services — they've done their time.

"So it gets to a point where we can't provide emergency care, which is detrimental to our community.

"Through that, we also lose nurses who want that acute experience, they don't just want to be doing aged care, so retention is a huge problem.

"We can't see any light."

Working together

Mrs Luke has been speaking with Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis, the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network director Roger Kirchner and Medical HQ's Dr Rodney Pearce about a solution.

"There's no doubt there are shortages in the rural health workforce, and there are difficulties in recruiting and retaining (staff)," Mr Ellis said.

We have to spread staff around, there needs to be equitable distribution.

"I will continue to advocate for health in the region in parliament."

One way to cover shortages in regions could be pairing with metro clinics, Dr Pearce said.

As part of the plan, doctors could split their working week between the city and regional

"We want to find a way to create 24-hour cover that's sustainable," he said.

"It's not going to be a quick solution though; you have to get people invested in the area because that creates a level of care and interest.

"By having someone who comes up and spends time with the community regularly, there is a continuity of care.

"We hope to roll this out to Maitland and Ardrossan practices soon.

"If we have a pool of about half a dozen doctors, who spend time working here regularly, it will lead to better results.

"In the long-term future, locums will become the exception, rather than the rule for these situations."

Nurses union pushing for change

THE Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation (SA Branch) has been calling for greater incentives for staff across all health settings.

An estimated 50 per cent of nurses and midwives will leave the workforce during the next 10 years, with a peak in retirements in 2025.

"Regional areas as a whole struggle to attract nursing and midwifery staff with little to no incentives offered for them to uproot their lives and move to the country," CEO/secretary Adjunct Associate Professor Elizabeth Dabars AM said.

"In a bid to address staff shortages and keep open the beds the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation (SA Branch) has been seeking action by the state government in three

Government of South Australia

"These include retention payments and incentives for all frontline nurses and midwives, along with special measures directed to those considering retirement, relocation, or a change

"Regional and rural workforce incentives including housing, relocation expenses, zoning allowances and child care are also a focus as is an urgent offer of a graduate position for all 1200 nurses and midwives who compete their undergraduate qualification in November 2022.

"While the initiatives are not specifically aimed at Ardrossan Hospital, it is hoped they will ensure more nurses will see the benefits of working in regional South Australia and remove some of the financial barriers."

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Take a bow-el for states highest screening rates

YORKE Peninsula residents have some good and bad health habits.

When it comes to bowel cancer screenings, YP has the highest participation rates in the state at 54.7 per cent.

Australians aged 50 to 74 are mailed a free at-home bowel screening test kit every two years through the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program.

The participation rate for eligible people in SA was 46.9 per cent in 2019-20, sitting ahead of the national participation rate (41.6 per cent).

Bowel cancer is Australia's second biggest cancer killer yet 90 per cent of bowel cancers can be successfully treated if detected early.

It is more important now than ever NBCSP participation rates move forward.

Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler said Australians aged 50 and over needed to make time to look after their health by doing their free bowel test when it arrived in the mail.

Health habits revealed

YORKE Peninsula is among the sickest regions in Australia, with very high numbers of people suffering from serious illnesses, last year's Australian Bureau of Statistics census revealed.

The region has a very high number of people suffering from serious illnesses such as diabetes, heart disease, lung disease, arthritis and cancer, as well as the highest rates of arthritis, diabetes, kidney disease and lung disease in the state.

The age of the population in the region is one of the contributing

"If we can get 60 per cent of eligible Australians screening and keep it that way, we can save 84,000 lives by 2040," Mr Butler said.

"Screen time is a feature of modern life and we want screening time to come just as naturally, so why not use your next bathroom stop to complete the test, or add a reminder to your calendar."

Cancer Council CEO professor Tanya Buchanan said in the 424 hours, or 18 days, each Australian spent in the bathroom every two years, thousands of potentially life-saving samples could be taken.

"Countless lives can be saved if eligible Australians, especially those in their 50s swapped out time spent scrolling on their phones while on the loo, with bowel screening time," Prof Buchanan said.

Research shows placing the bowel screening test kit in the bathroom straight away, as well as setting reminders on your phone, could increase screening rates.



A dream come true for the Wyatt family

THE Wyatt family shares a love like no other.

Craig and Margaret, together with their biological children Anthony, Nick and Brianna, have officially welcomed Holly and Havana into the family.

The Wyatts, who began fostering Holly in 2016 and her little sister Havana in 2018, were given the opportunity to legally adopt the girls through a pilot program developed by the Department for Child Protection.

They were one of three successful families enabled to do so in South Australia, something which hasn't been done in about 10 years.

"We became Holly and Havana's legal guardians in 2020 and we thought that was the best day of our lives and honestly as far as we thought we could go in terms of them

'being ours'," Margaret said.
"Little did we know this day would be topped a year later.

"When we got the call (about the program) we jumped at the opportunity, we were so excited but also living on edge a little bit, it was a huge process and we didn't want to be let down.

"Without the pilot program adopting the girls wouldn't have been possible because it is just so hard to adopt in Australia.

"We always spoke about adopting the girls when they

turned 18, through adult adoption, because we wanted them to know we were their forever family — we are now, which is incredible."

Margaret and Craig became foster parents in 2016 but started the process a year before that.

"I wanted to foster for as long as I can remember," Margaret said.

"Every year on my birthday Craig would ask what I wanted and I would reply 'to be a foster parent'.

"One year he said 'well let's do it' and we started the process from there."

Margaret said she had full support from her husband and three children.

"I think you have to be in the right phase of your life to take on such a role and I was really lucky my entire family was on board," she said.

"The training process was a shock, it was a lot of work, interviews and learning; and our children also had to go through a lengthy interview process because they were teenagers at the time.

"To find out how many children needed care was also astonishing — today about 5000 children need care in South Australia alone.

"I think the day we received approval to foster was the day we got a call to pick up our first child that's how much the need is there — we had him for six weeks before Holly and then Holly was our first long-term child."

The Wyatts began fostering

Holly at 10 months old, and were then asked to foster her sister Havana two years later, who they picked up from hospital at just 18 hours old.

"Fostering and then adopting the girls has been rewarding for us but more importantly we wanted them to feel safe and loved — every child deserves that," Margaret said.

"It breaks my heart to think so many children don't have access to stability, love and care."

For anyone thinking about becoming a foster carer, Margaret said it was absolutely life-changing, for the better, but you had to be really ready because it was a huge commitment.

"We've been lucky enough to have these girls join our family permanently but for so many foster carers, it can be quite short-term," she said.

"I think more people would be willing to foster children, in Australia, if the adoption process wasn't so difficult because you do form an emotional attachment to these children and it can be hard to let go when you have

"I don't know what the long-term answers are but something needs to be done because every child deserves the world.

"I would have loved to continue to foster as many children as we could but for right now we just want to give Holly and Havana the life they deserve — we're so in love with them."

Preserving Moonta's Victoria Park scrub

VOLUNTEER group, Friends of Victoria Park, Moonta, is continuing its work to conserve this patch of scrub.

Group members have been working in the park, at the corner of Blanche and Milne Terraces, most Tuesday mornings for the past seven years.

Tasks include picking up rubbish, maintaining paths and removing weeds.

Weeding is an ongoing job, and volunteers focus on declared weeds, and particular sections of the park, to make the work manageable.

This year, the group has worked on a large triangular patch, clearing weeds, including old and dying Aleppo pines, to create an open space of tussocks, native grasses and low flowering shrubs.

The group revegetates degraded areas of the park with local plant species, including trees, shrubs and grasses, keeping in mind the need to plant fewer than 100 trees each year so members can manage the watering needed during summer and autumn.

Previously, there had only been a few quandong trees, in a very shaded area, until a generously donated 30 quandong seedlings and companion plants were installed in a spot where they should thrive, extending a woodland area near the park's western side.

The volunteers have also created spaces for walkers to rest and relax, their newest project the construction of a picnic deck near the top path, an ideal spot for a family picnic when the weather is

Greg Brown designed and built the deck, with all costs being covered by a generous private donor. Wattles, other shrubs, and wildflowers have begun their springtime display, making the park especially attractive.

The park is open to anyone to stroll through at any time, and the group members provide guided walks on the third Sunday of each month; for more information, ring Lib Bartholomeusz on 0419 994 649.



Graham explained the process of separating copper from the ore body.



"All of our members did an amazing job helping out on the day (doing jobs such as) taking the food out to the guests.



HAC nominated for rural health award

PORT Broughton District Health Advisory Council has been nominated for a 2022 South Australian Community Achievement Award.

The HAC is a contender in the Rural Doctors Workforce Agency Rural Community Health and Wellbeing Award for its work establishing a helipad at Port Broughton Hospital.

"In the past, patients needing retrieval from Port Broughton Hospital to Adelaide were taken by volunteer ambulance to the local oval for retrieval by helicopter," the nomination read.

"The Port Broughton District Health Advisory Council was increasingly aware of the issue our health service faced with diminishing ambulance volunteers and the outcomes and dignity of patients needing retrieval.

"Illustrating the Port Broughton District HAC's continued deep commitment to exceptional rural health care in our local community, we looked at the possibility of using hospital land to build a helipad on site.

"The project was delivered by the HAC after extensive community consultation and collaboration with stakeholders such as the Barunga West Council, Barunga Village, our adjacent aged care neighbours, local service clubs, SA Power Networks, and the Yorke and Northern Local Health Network.

"The helipad sits at the entrance of the town, adjacent to our hospital and is a reminder of the partnership between the Port Broughton District Health Advisory Council and our local community to improve health services."

In its first 22 months of operation, the helipad has been used 14 times and has significantly improved turnaround times.

Award winners will be announced at gala presentation dinner on Friday, December 2.

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
was sent to Red Cross headquarters in Adelaide.

"There will be personnel from Adelaide HQ attending and it is hoped as many other branches' members come along as possible; bring your own lunch."









Better irrigation flows to fruition

Port Broughton's town oval is set to have an irrigation upgrade.

The project has been made possible by the recently upgraded Port Broughton Community Management System, which has implemented a rising water main in Fisherman Bav.

This CWMS upgrade requires a workable irrigation system for the disposal of the treated water, allowing extra reclaimed water for the Port Broughton Oval.

Port Broughton Combined Sporting Clubs president Alistair Tod said an upgraded irrigation system would enable more consistent turf for football and cricket players, plus the wider com-

"This upgrade will mean far less maintenance from our volunteers," Mr Tod said.

"It should be a long-term solution to a problem which has caused lots of headaches.

'We have spent hundreds of hours unblocking pipes recently so this should help ease the stress.

"The combined sporting clubs appreciate council's support following these issues."

Barunga West Council received \$3 million through the Local Government Association's CWMS Subsidy Funding Agreement for upgrade last year.

Council CEO Wauchope said the irrigation upgrade was a key part of a significant development.

"The oval's irrigation is integral to the use of wastewater from our CWMS in Port Broughton," Ms Wauchope said.

"The upgrade will replace ageing infrastructure which doesn't work as a result of blockages.'

Irrigation works commenced earlier in the month which council warned would likely affect the 2022-23 cricket season.

The Port Broughton skate park will also be temporarily closed.







Getting to the Hart of head loss

Gabrielle Jones REPORT BY

WHILE there are no genetic solutions for barley head loss, researchers are suggesting a number of factors to reduce the risk.

University of Adelaide associate professor Matthew Tucker and his team, in collaboration with Dr Kenton Porker at FAR (Field Applied Research) Australia and Dr Rhiannon Schilling at SARDI, have been carrying out eight South Australian Grains Industry Trust-funded field trials across South Australia, focused on head loss in barley.

Their findings show that cultivar (variety) choice, historical observations and harvest-time factors, including the fire danger index, all provide useful indicators about the risk of head loss.

Prof Tucker's trials have focused specifically on head loss — where the barley peduncle breaks within the first one to three centimetres underneath the barley head, and usually at harvest-ripe or after harvest-ripe stage — as opposed to lodging (bending at the bottom of the plant) and brackling (bending in different directions at the base of the peduncle).

"From our field trials across SA, from the South East right up to Yorke Peninsula, and including the Mallee and Mid North, I think the most important thing growers need to consider is cultivar choice," he said.

"That's particularly important because there's some cultivars which are more likely to experience head loss in particular environments.

"The second thing is harvest timing.

"If you harvest on time, you've got a much greater likelihood of avoiding

Prof Tucker said plant growth regulator applications will also offer some protection.

"If growers can see significant biomass early in the season, particularly in higher rainfall zones, they should be thinking about applying a growth regulator around growth stage 37, which is the recommended timing for the protection against head loss," he said.

'Growers are always keen to know the cost of the PGR; we have certainly assessed this, and it is generally costeffective for Compass-type cultivars.

"However, it does seem cultivars like

RGT Planet are less susceptible to head loss, and PGR application is unlikely to have a beneficial impact.

"I think this emphasises the need to develop better scoring protocols and risk assessments, in particular, by looking at the next batch of modern cultivars that are being released."

Prof Tucker said historical data, collected at harvest time, could be critical for future season decisions when it comes to reducing the risk of barley head loss.

Keeping an eye on the fire danger rating at harvest time also provides a good indicator head loss may be more prevalent, and can assist in harvest timing decisions.

Prof Tucker is speaking about the issue at the 40th Hart Field Day on Tuesday, September 20.

Gates open at 9am, with the official opening at 10am and first sessions start at 10.30am. Admission is \$44 (students \$15), and includes access to all sessions, guest speakers, and the Hart Field Day Guide with articles and information from each of the sessions.

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

Mr Venning, of Bute, won the Award for Excellence in Technology sponsored by New Holland, following his integration and acceptance of technology innovations at his family farming enterprise Barunga Grains.

"I have introduced several innovative solutions to the business to improve productivity both short term and for the future," Mr Venning said.

"This includes using soil sensing technology to gain a better understanding of the property and what it requires to perform.

"We have weather stations to identify frosts and inversions for better spray application, moisture probes and a protein machine on the harvester.

"We use satellite imagery for guided crop scouting and elevation maps to identify low areas to help scout for frost damage after a bad frost. I have now mapped a large portion of the farm which has provided invaluable insight into the land.

New Holland Australia and New Zealand business development manager Tony Peters said Mr Venning was a role model to young farmers looking to embrace technology on

"James is getting the best out of his farm because he isn't afraid to consider new developments and solutions to old problems," Mr Peters said.

"He is also willing to share his experiences and knowledge with his community so everyone can benefit, and that exemplifies his commitment to the industry and makes him a very worthy winner of this Award for Excellence."

Mr Easter, of Kadina, accepted the Agricultural Student of the Year Award.

Mr Easter is the president of the Adelaide University of Agriculture Students Association, and as such leads several student committees while also being a university peer mentor.

"I originally chose my field of study because I enjoyed working outside, communicating ideas with others and learning about how plants and soil work together to produce what we eat," Mr Easter said.

"My goal after finishing my bachelor degree is to pursue post-graduate studies while still being a strong advocate for opportunities in agriculture.


"I want to get more people to consider the field of agriculture next to careers such as medicine or law as it's just as, if not more, important."

Winter rains boost confidence

YORKE Peninsula farmers are feeling optimistic about above average yields this season due to late and heavy winter rain.

YP AG agronomist Chris Davey said the 2022 season looked positive due to a wet winter and early spring.

'Thankfully, the peninsula has just recorded 20 to 40mm this week, which makes everything look a lot better with higher yield potential for the growers," Mr Davey said.

"With the wet end to winter, and start to spring, later maturing crops like wheat, canola and lentils will benefit greatly.

"Too much rain in some soil types may lead to water logging in the lentils, but this is offset by the greater yield potential.

"I don't think any crops will really struggle.

"It will be up to growers to implement solid fungicide programs to keep disease at bay, which can lead to yield loss in

seasons like this one."

Mr Davey said supply issues early in the year were the priority when it came to planning.

"The late rains mean there has been more of a focus on foliar nitrogen and trace elements than normal," he said.

"Farmers will be looking to control late germinations of weeds, or weeds which have escaped the first application of herbicide.

"Most of the attention now is on the final nutrition for wheat crops, and controlling disease in all crops as inoculum levels are high and conditions are currently very conducive to disease infection and spread.

"My prediction is farmers will be crop-topping a lot more crops than usual prior to harvest to dry crops down, even their maturity and stop the seed set of late weeds.

"A mild finish, with good grain fill conditions, and no extreme events like frost, wind or temperature, will see YP farmers have a bumper harvest."



It just feels like a cash grab.

The only positive from The Hundred, is the increased broadcasting and representation of the women's game, even if it is a strange and unnecessary variation.

Wallaroo: After rain last Thursday/Friday, anglers were pleased to enjoy a weekend of relatively fine, cool, marine weather. King George whiting came from the cork weed and Boiler grounds, and squid from Point Riley and Black Rock. Jetty-based fishers tried for tommy ruff (Australian herring) and

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: A couple of rat kingfish cruised the Port Hughes jetty late on Friday as anglers chased tommies, squid and garfish. Boat crews caught KG whiting, gar and squid from Cape Elizabeth and Steamer channel's northern end. Blue crabs are yet to appear in large numbers.

Port Victoria: Good KG whiting reports continued from Wardang and Goose Islands. as well as Balgowan and Second Beach. The jetty has ruff and squid at night.

Point Turton: There have been some

good catches of Southern Calamari from the Hardwicke Bay drift grounds, Port Rickaby jetty and Pine Point. KG whiting and gar are grounds offshore.

Marion Bay: Big sweep, red nannygai, squid and flathead were off the eastern side of Seal Island when boat crews managed the run out last week. Closer to home there were garfish, squid and big ruffs at Penguin Point, while the jetty had a few squid. Browns and Gym Beaches had a few salmon trout.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Local boat crews caught squid from the northern end of Troubridge Island, Port Giles and Klein Point. along with a few KG whiting and tommies. Orontes Bank has whiting, snook and the odd blue crab from the southern end.







