

THE trial of independent Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis began in the Adelaide Magistrates Court yesterday (Monday, September 18).

Mr Ellis has been charged with 23 counts of deception in regards to 78 claims, totalling \$18,000, for the Country Members Accommodation Allowance from April 2018 to June 2020. He has pleaded not guilty to the charges, the earliest of which occurred just a month after his election.

Prosecutor Robert Walker said media reports about suspected misuse of the CMAA in June 2020 marked the end of Mr Ellis's claims.

The following month, Mr Ellis released a media statement, which Mr Walker described as the "start of damage control".

"The explanation he gave in the media release and subsequently, on the prosecution case, constitutive partial admissions," Mr Walker said.

Mr Walker said circumstantial evidence, including phone, bank statements, diary entries and traffic cameras would be presented in the trial.

Mr Ellis voluntarily repaid \$42,130 in claims, stating some may have been made in error, before the investigation by the Independent Commissioner Against Corruption was announced in 2020.

Asbestos uncovered at illegal dump

YORKE Peninsula Council has isolated two sites on southern Yorke Peninsula after material containing asbestos was found at an unsanctioned Marion Bay dump.

The Marion Bay and Berry Bay South locations are to be secured with temporary fencing to prevent unauthorised access, and warning signage installed, as council works with experts to remove the hazardous material and rehabilitate the land. The Marion Bay site has been used as an undocumented and unapproved community dumping area for decades, a practice dating back to before smaller councils amalgamated to form YPC in 1997.

Members of the Formby Bay Environmental Action Group discovered items, including an old hot water heater, tin roofing, concrete, tyres, wire and piping, in a small quarry on Lighthouse Road at Berry Bay South, in July. According to the group, subsequent enquiries revealed the culprit was a YPC employee who transferred the rubbish from Marion Bay.

When the matter was brought to the attention of council's senior management, they immediately launched an investigation into the matter. The investigation, being conducted by an independent investigator, remains ongoing.

Cost of living

IT'S good members of the state government attended a community forum with industry stakeholders, about options available to combat the rising cost of living in the regions (YPCT 12-9-23).

People are selling their homes and living in caravans as they can't pay their mortgage.

It appears only we everyday citizens are carrying the weight of high inflation and cost-ofliving increases currently being experienced.

It's frustrating when government members are questioned about our high inflation and cost-ofliving situation, and their standard answer is Australia is affected as a direct result of overseas economic problems and the Ukraine war.

I find this difficult to believe, given the current high profits made by large corporations.

Defence calls wrong claim an honest mistake

THE Country Members Accommodation Allowance is available to Members of Parliament whose usual place of residence is more than 75 kilometres from Adelaide, and who are required to stay in Adelaide overnight to attend to Parliamentary or other relevant duties.

It is alleged Mr Ellis claimed the allowance for nights he did not spend in Adelaide and he was unaware of a rule change in November 2018, whereby politicians had to incur actual expenditure to receive the payment.

The trial was initially expected to begin last August but was cancelled when Mr Ellis (unsuccessfully) appealed a Magistrates Court decision which ruled his allegedly fraudulent claims were not covered by parliamentary privilege.

Representing Mr Ellis, Scott Henchcliffe KC admitted his client had made some mistakes when completing his forms.

He said Mr Ellis had claimed for some instances where he did not stay in Adelaide, but had also not lodged claims on nights he did.

"Mr Ellis did not make any of his claims for the allowance dishonestly or to dishonestly benefit himself," Mr Henchcliffe said.

So far, Magistrate Smart has heard from members of Joint Parliamentary Services, Corporate Services and Mr Ellis' office manager Rosemary Cock.

Ms Cock described Mr Ellis as a man of high integrity. "He is community-minded, trust-

worthy and honest," she said.

The trial continues this week, and is also scheduled for a week in November.

FAMILIES on southern Yorke Peninsula are missing out on newborn home visits from Child and Family Health Services nurses, despite assurances from the Women's and Children's Health Network.

Yorketown's New Mama Meet Up group facilitator Katie Hughes said three local mothers with babies aged between 5 and 12 weeks were offered newborn home visits with a CaFHS midwife, which were meant to be provided in the first four weeks after birth.

The mothers instead had the options of attending a clinic in Minlaton offered three days a month or a telehealth consultation.

"They should be offered these visits as a matter of course. We keep seeing these same issues over and over again," Ms Hughes said.

According to the CaFHS website, families in South Australia are offered a consultation with a CaFHS nurse after the birth of a baby and nurses can make home visits if preferred or new parents can attend a CaFHS clinic.

"Within your first two to four weeks of being home with your baby, CaFHS will contact you to arrange your first consultation," the website states.

A WCHN representative said records for CaFHS Country North, based in Kadina, showed between June and September, all families who had been referred and consented to be contacted were offered a home visit for their baby's 1 to 4 week health and development check.

"The majority of these families received a home visit, with a small number having their health and developmental check over a video call or phone call, or by attending one of our clinics," the spokesperson said.

"CaFHS relies on the birthing hospital to refer families to our service. "Due to a clerical error during the

June–September period, CaFHS Country North did not receive a referral for one family. "While they were not contacted and offered a 1 to 4-week health and development check, they were followed up by our service and received an 8-week health and development check home visit.

"CaFHS has been in communication with community members in the region and reiterate they can contact us directly should they have any concerns with an individual experience."

The spokesperson said all CaFHS Country North families could access clinic appointments in Minlaton and Maitland.

"In response to community need we have recently increased Maitland's clinic days from once to twice per month," the spokesperson said.

The New Mama Meet Up Group has been advocating for the local replacement of two CAFHS nurses who were based in Maitland and Minlaton, and retired or resigned in the past two years.

Ms Hughes said having access to locally based nurses would build

relationships and save families and nurses from having to make round trips of four to six hours to or from Kadina.

"We are so grateful to all the wonderful CaFHS nurses, regardless of where they are based, however we want to ensure these nurses are given the time and resources they need to look after parents and babies," she said.

The group's push has been backed by Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation South Australian branch chief executive Professor Elizabeth Dabars.

Ms Dabars said the provision of consistent care by nurses and home visits was important for babies and parents.

"The nurses can help to ensure the home is safe and suitable for the parent and child, and see the interaction in a familiar environment for parent and newborn," she said.

"They can try sleep and settling techniques, troubleshoot breastfeeding ideas and solutions in the environment in which they will be living."

Community rallies as fire destroys more than a home

PORT Vincent has wrapped its arms around Ebony Fleming and Michael and Jeanie Zeller after the family lost their house, belongings and beloved pet dogs, Chef and Banjo, in a fire on Friday, September 8.

The trio said they had been overwhelmed by the support shown, including a GoFundMe page — set up by the Port Vincent Progress Association which has so far raised more than \$11,000.

No one was home when the property caught alight in the early evening, when CFS firefighters battled to control the blaze to the back section of the house.

"Everyone packed up and left a bit after 7pm and we were just having a look around the back of the house, and when we came around it, we could see the fire had started up again," Jeanie said. CFS volunteers managed to

control the blaze again and Jeanie went in to grab a book of the family's history of birthdays, dating back to the 19th century, in the time between infernos.

However, the nightmare didn't end there, making the family feel as though they were the unluckiest people on the peninsula.

"We just sat and had a big cry, to be honest, and then the fire alarm went off at 11pm and I said to my husband 'no one could be that unlucky tonight, it has to be our house," Jeanie said.

"We walked outside and we could see the flames from a couple of blocks away, and that was it; the neighbours' house was damaged unfortunately, and ours was completely gone."

The family has been hardest hit by the loss of their beloved pet dogs, which suffered from smoke inhalation during the first portion of the blaze.

"They couldn't get out the doggy door at the back, which is where the fire started, but they weren't burnt — they were our everything," Ebony said.

"I've had Chef for about four years, she was my rescue dog, but she also rescued me because I was going through a real rough patch when I got her and she grounded me quite a lot."

Jeanie concurred, and said Banjo had the exact same impact on her life.

"I called Banjo my depression dog because he has never been alone since we got him, he was always with us," Jeanie said.

"They were spoilt dogs, but they deserved to be spoiled.

"The whole community knew Banjo, because he was a little troublemaker; you'd often hear someone yell out, 'Banjo, get here!"

The trio said they believed they'll never be able to repay everyone for their generosity through what has been such a difficult time.

Michael said, simply, the support meant the world to them.

"The caravan park was fantastic; they put us up for nearly a week and they had clothes, food, shoes waiting for us, just about everything," he said.

"We went to the local pub to get some drinks and food, and they wouldn't let us pay, so that was incredible too.

"There's no way we can thank everyone individually because it has just been so far-reaching, but we couldn't be more grateful for the love and kindness."

Dumping "deeply regrettable"



NON-FRIABLE asbestos products, like those found in the dump sites on southern Yorke Peninsula, are made from a bonding compound, such as cement, mixed with a small amount of asbestos, typically less than 15 per cent.

The products cannot easily be turned into dust, and do not normally release asbestos fibres into the air, and according to Yorke Peninsula Council, it poses a very low safety risk.

Council has arranged for the material to be removed as quickly as possible and has taken the extra step of utilising a dust suppression agent at both sites.

"We are treating this matter with the utmost seriousness," CEO Andrew Cameron said.

"It is deeply regrettable council staff were not made aware of the unsanctioned dumping site sooner, but we have acted urgently to ensure the problem is resolved.

"We do not tolerate any form of illegal dumping regardless of any unwritten historical arrangements and will take every step possible to fix this problem and ensure it is never repeated."

Serious penalties, including fines and imprisonment, may be imposed against any person found to be unlawfully depositing waste onto public or private land or into waters.

Local fuel prices climb above \$2

LOCAL fuel prices have soared beyond \$2 a litre for unleaded and diesel as cost-of-living pressures continue to be felt at the pump.

All of Yorke Peninsula's service stations with available stock are reporting the cost of unleaded 91 above \$2 as of Tuesday, September 19, according to RAA's real-time fuel price tracker.

For many sites across the region, current prices are almost 20 cents greater than their trailing 12-month average, with no sign of relief for motorists in sight.

Copper Triangle Taxis owner Phil Dannenberg is one of many local business owners feeling the pinch at the pump and has recently been forced to increase fares to compensate for the rising cost.

"It certainly hurts at the pump, that's for sure — I've been calling it liquid gold at the moment," Mr Dannenberg said.

"To give you a bit of an idea, I think I've had two fare increases over the past decade, and I've tried to contain putting up fares (to compensate for the rising fuel prices) for as long as I can.

"I try to keep our fares at a minimum, especially during a cost-of-living crisis.

"However, as a business owner you can't continue to stomach costs forever — obviously, everything has got to go

up at some point — so I've been forced to put my rates up just in the past two to three weeks.

"This has impacted our bottom line — I'm lucky because I don't have a mortgage to pay for I suppose so I can absorb a little bit, but it does hurt."

Mr Dannenberg said he didn't understand why fuel prices continued to increase as much as they have in such a short period of time.

"We have got to have fuel to operate our vehicles so there really isn't much we can do, they have us over a barrel," Mr Dannenberg said.

"I am one of the lucky ones in the sense I do receive a small discount when I fill up, and while it isn't a great deal, every little bit helps.

"Over the volume of fuel we use, a small saving on one tank can lead to bigger savings over the course of a month."

RAA fuel expert Mark Borlace said regional communities were subject to higher transport costs which impacted the price at the pump.

"The data shows on YP, there is quite a difference in average fuel prices which means there's an opportunity for motorists to save money if they plan where and when they fill up," Mr Borlace said.

"RAA encourages motorists to use real time fuel pricing apps, like the RAA app, to get the latest fuel prices to shop around for the best deal."

Narungga update September 2023

There was good news this month with a six-month trial of 24/7 security guards deployed at Wallaroo Hospital from September 1.

The trial will occur while an ongoing security model is developed to be implemented in the long term.

I congratulate the whole community who rallied behind the push for this welcome outcome and sincerely hope all staff now feel safer and fully supported in their workplace which provides such essential front-line health services in our region.

Also on September 1, new regulations in the next phase of banning single use plastics came into force.

I advise now banned are plastic stemmed cotton buds, plastic pizza savers and single-use plastic plates and bowls (exemptions are in place for any medical, scientific, forensic or law enforcement purposes only).

These products join the already banned single-use plastic straws, cutlery and stirrers (prohibited since March 2021) and polystyrene cups, bowls, plates and clamshell containers (March 2022).

Next to be banned (from September 2024) will be plastic produce bags and single-use plastic beverage containers, including coffee cups; and after that, plastic fruit stickers, plastic soy sauce fish and products with attached plastic straws/cutlery will follow. For more details, visit

Expansion talks in full swing

KADINA Child Care Centre could apply to have its entire expansion funded through a new federal government grant program.

The Regional Precincts and Partnerships Program Stream 2, which the centre plans to apply for, is set to deliver between \$5 million and \$50m for each successful project across Australia.

A grant close to the minimum amount would be enough alone to fund the centre's expansion, initially estimated to cost \$9.3m.

If successful, the grant amount would be up to 100 per cent of eligible expenditure for the project.

Kadina Child Care Centre director Caren Hammerstein said she was pleased to learn the funding stream was available. "Our ever-growing demand and waitlist (now at 89 children) show why this project is worthy of being funded," Ms Hammerstein said.

"Local families are facing financial pressures and there's a need to work to be able to meet their financial commitments with the cost-ofliving increases.

"(However), so many families currently find it difficult to enter or re-enter the workforce due to being unable to gain a spot within a centre.

"There needs to be availability for children to be provided with opportunities to support and enhance their development, and accessibility for families to access respite care.

"The businesses and area are currently unable to attract suitably qualified employees to fill positions because they (potential employees) can't find care for their children.

"The developmental growth which

Council delivers loan to centre

COPPER Coast Council has committed to loaning the Kadina Child Care Centre \$250,000, subject to the receival of federal funding for the new centre.

However, council has decided not to fund project management support for the project delivery, per the centre's request.

CEO Russell Peate said council was not in the position to undertake the project management for such a large project.

"This would require at least one full-time person to project manage the construction of the new centre," Mr Peate said.

"Council will assist with the procurement process to select the preferred contractor and we will also be providing a letter of support (for the funding).

"Increased child care is an identified need of the Copper Coast and will be important for local employment."

has occurred and is being planned for the Copper Coast and the employment opportunities that will be available at the centre are other reasons this should be funded."

The amount of funding the centre applies for will be decided once its business case is complete.

MOONTA Mines has been showcased on the world stage, as the bid for its joint World Heritage Listing continues.

The Australian Cornish Mining Sites: Burra and Moonta Mines bid was showcased to more than 1300 people at the International Council on Monuments and Sites at the 21st General Assembly and Scientific Symposium in Sydney last week.

The display was aimed to promote characteristic engine houses and represent places Cornish mining heritage continues to be maintained in Australia.

Representatives from Copper Coast Council, Regional Council of Goyder and National Trust of South Australia attended the conference to help promote the bid.

National Trust SA CEO Stuart McNab said the trip enabled project partners to better understand the journey required and long-term benefits of World Heritage status.

"Our (Cornish Mining Sites) exhibition booth helped us gain good interest, and the ICOMOS members may vote

on the bid so this is important," Mr McNab said.

"It was all about showing the region's historic connection to Cornwall and linking that to potential World Heritage Listing.

"There are a number of processes the bid must go and through, the community has a role to play helping to tell the stories.

"But we have a compelling story... some of our sites are in as good or better condition than some sites in Cornwall."

CCC mayor Roslyn Talbot said there was a great deal of interest in the exhibition.

"Many people were impressed with our display and left much more aware of the history of our Australian Cornish Mining Sites," she said.

"We also learned a lot about the next steps in the process, obstacles we may face and how we can overcome them."

An amended Tentative World Heritage Listing Submission is set to be endorsed by the Regional Council of Goyder later this month, before being formally submitted to the state government by the end of September.



Cr Schmidt joins steering group

COPPER Coast Council elected member Bruce Schmidt has been appointed to the Australian Cornish Mining Sites World Heritage Consortium.

As a member of the consortium's steering group, Mr Schmidt will contribute to the strategic decision-making body in the push for the joint World Heritage Listing of Moonta Mines and Burra.

"My role will predominantly be to feed back information to the National Trust of


SA and council," Mr Schmidt said. "I've lived in the mines and been

involved with the area for quite some time. "It will be important to represent the needs of both council and our ratepayers.

"This (World Heritage bid) is not going to be cheap, so we need to make sure the community is getting good value for money.

Step up and save the Bay

MEMBERS of the Hardwicke Bay community are calling on someone to run the town's Bay Cafe/Diner, which has been empty for the past four years.

Without an operational store, residents have to travel to Warooka or Minlaton to purchase goods.

It has also punctured a hole in the town's positive vibe, with the opportunity to meet with friends for a coffee or ice cream after school or on the weekend gone begging.

Hardwicke Bay and District Progress Association chairperson Ashley Gordon said the business had always been well served by the community when open.

"It's been here for about 40 years, had a variety of owners over those years and it got put on the market about four years ago, but unfortunately, it hasn't sold," he said.

"It's a vital community asset we've got no other community shops in the town — it's 20 kilometres across to Minlaton, Yorketown or Warooka to get basics like fuel, ice and food.

"We're just really desperate for someone to take it on and we think it would be a very viable business; it's on the main highway and there's plenty of new people in the town." Resident Heather Bland said it had left the town feeling somewhat soulless without a store.

"I've been coming here since I was a child... and my kids have also grown up coming here and they even miss it," she said.

"Being young adults, they'll come down after work on a Friday night and of course, there's nowhere to eat, there's nowhere to get anything."

As a fishing town, residents acknowledged issues with no access to fuel, bait or a bite to eat before locals and holidaymakers set sail.

The site also doubles as the school bus drop-off and pick-up point, with many former students frequenting the store for a before or after-school snack.

"It was very vibrant for the children, because we always had lots of family come up, and we always trusted the kids to be able to ride together (on their bikes) as a group, to get a bag of lollies or an ice cream," resident Marion Zafry said.

"It's also a bit of history, the tractors (which people use to launch their boats in lieu of a ramp) are unique to Hardwicke Bay, and they can't be filled up here anymore."

"It's important to look at the signs and identify what type of conversation is needed.

"If someone seems overly frustrated or lacking motivation, there may actually be something wrong."

Ms Macri said it was important to

make the conversation as normal as possible.

"It's important to make people feel comfortable and not be too confronting - open-ended questions are usually a good start," she said.

"If it prevents people from doing something drastic and gets them to express their emotions rather than taking it out on themselves, then that's the right type of conversation.

"Although men are getting better at these conversations, people are still saying 'nah, she'll be right'.

Groups share in first round of community grants

A TOTAL of 24 groups have been boosted by the first round of Copper Coast Council's 2023-24 Community Grants Program.

Council will roll out the first \$51,434 of its \$120,000 annual community grant fund to unlock new projects, refurbishments and repairs for groups across the Copper Coast.

Wallaroo will have a new street mural after \$1405 was awarded to the Wallaroo Development Community Association.

WCDA president Andy West said the mural would be a reproduction of a famous painting by world-renowned artist Jeffrey Smart, which depicted the town of Wallaroo and its heritage.

"Mr Smart completed the painting whilst in Wallaroo in 1951 and went on to become one of Australia's most famous artists," Mr West said.

"A number of years ago it was decided a good way to create interest in the history and to add to the appearance of the town was to paint murals on buildings

that depicted Wallaroo's history. While Mr Smart may have only been a visitor to the town, his impression of it and his prominence as a noted artist make his work valuable to our fairly recent past and must be recognised.

"We have received permission from the estate of Mr Smart to reproduce the painting on an aluminium composite panel."

Moonta Cricket Club has received \$7833 for the second stage of its new three-lane practice net project.

The funding will enable external cage meshing, retractable soft netting and synthetic carpet to complete the facility.

Club committee member Josh Ritter said the upgrade would help increase club membership and expand its junior pathways.

"The nets will be fully enclosed and one will have double gates specifically for a ball machine," Mr Ritter said.

"They can also be used for warm-ups during footy season.

"With our turf (playing) pitch too, our facilities will allow us to draw more competition here like zone carnivals and women's cricket."

An open letter to the Australian Government

Dear Prime Minister,

Grants that provided temporary relief in the face of last year's steep rise in the cost of newsprint were gratefully received, but this year's federal budget outlay of \$900,000 on yet more academic research to tell us what we already know won't

prevent more newspapers joining the 200+ titles that have closed across Australia over the past three years. ACM and Country Press Australia call on the Australian Government to take meaningful action now to support regional

newspapers, the jobs and public interest journalism they provide and the communities they serve.

As no fewer than three parliamentary inquiries led by MPs from across the major parties have previously recommended,

the government should immediately:

1. Guarantee a fair share of its existing advertising budget is devoted to regional newspapers. Adopting the Victorian government's simple policy of mandating that a full page of government advertising appear in every regional and commu-

nity newspaper every week will provide publishers with certainty and sustainability.

2. Extend funding for cadet journalist training programs to grow the talent pool of regional reporters. 3. Commit to exploring a public interest journalism tax rebate, as previously recommended by the ACCC, and other tax

incentives for regional publishers to hire more journalists and launch new publications. Every week millions of regional Australians support trusted local newspapers and the accurate and reliable journalism

they deliver. On behalf of our readers, we urge the Australian Government to do the same.

A NEW group for people with a passion for storytelling is coming to the region.

Gaynor Jackson, a recent retiree and new addition to the Wallaroo community, helped by her friend Gail Warren, will host the first meeting of a new Storytelling Australia SA sub-branch at her home on Saturday, September 23.

Storytelling Australia is a not-for-

profit association which focuses on practising and promoting the art of oral storytelling.

The association was founded in 1982 by patron and author Mem Fox and aims to cultivate an interest in storytelling and listening.

Mrs Jackson joined Storytelling Australia SA three years ago while living in Adelaide.

"It's not just for retired people, it's for academics, teachers, mums and dads, anyone who just wants to come along because they're interested in words and people.

"It's so different to any other group I've ever belonged to.

"There's a real sense of connection made through sharing stories, which is a lovely thing.

"There's also no expectations or competition, it's just about stimulation."

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Aged care taskforce putting people first

A TASKFORCE has been created to put forward funding options for aged care in Australia.

The taskforce's primary intention is to review funding arrangements to ensure they are fair and equitable, and create a safe and high-quality system.

National Seniors Australia welcomed the announcement of the draft Aged Care principles.

Chief advocate Ian Henschke said the guiding principles would help drive the muchneeded reforms and reflect what members and the wider community wanted.

"Older people tell us they want to stay in their own home and not go into an aged care home, so we're pleased this is one of the key priorities," Mr Henschke said.

Government report backs the need for reform

THE release of the government's Intergenerational Report backs the need for reforms being considered for aged care in Australia.

The IGR forecasts the number of Australians aged over 85 will triple, and those over 65 will double in the next 40 years, with demand for aged care set to spiral.

At the same time fewer Australians will be working and paying tax, putting significant and continued strain on the federal budget.

Aged and Community Providers Association CEO Tom Symondson said the IGR showed just how important it was we reform the system, so it's both fit for purpose now and fit for purpose in the decades to come.

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"We also have long called for a simpler, fairer, more transparent system — this is now listed as a key part of the way forward.

"Most importantly, accountability for all funding received is now enshrined, so taxpayers and recipients of care can have confidence in the system they pay for.

'These principles are a good way to start the funding reform process, along with the commitment to community consulinformation the IGR provides about the scope of the problem, to find the solutions and meet the challenges associated with an ageing population," he said.

Older people, their families and the community should have their faith restored in aged care, which is a fundamental part of Australia's healthcare system."

Red Cross to attend the YP Field Days

AUSTRALIAN Red Cross's Emergency Services team will be at the Yorke Peninsula Field Days, Paskeville, to chat about volunteering and the Telecross REDi service. "When we think natural hazards, we often think

floods, storms, and bushfires; we think loud and fast," a Red Cross spokesperson said.

"But scorching temperatures across the south-east of Australia in early 2009 were a silent killer.

"More than 370 people lost their lives due to the 13-day heatwave, more than the fires of Black Saturday bushfires, which coincided with the last part of the heatwave.

"Heatwaves in Australia are more deadly than all other natural hazards combined.

"They are a real risk, with the very young, elderly, and those with pre-existing health conditions most vulnerable to heat-related illness.

"As the season warms, and as we watch the heat dome devastating southern Europe, it is time to prepare for the summer ahead — a summer likely to be hotter than recent years."

Australian Red Cross, with several community partners, spearheads a program to support vulnerable community members during heat events.

Clients receive a wellbeing call each day during the heatwave and advice on how to stay safe during the extreme heat event.

"An escalation process is in place should a client not answer the phone or be feeling unwell," the spokesperson said.

"Depending on the scenario, emergency contacts may be called or, for acute cases, an ambulance attends.

"Volunteers are crucial to this program but as summers warm and the population ages, many more are needed to keep up with the demand for the service.

"Fortunately, one individual can make a significant difference, each new volunteer allows about 25 new atrisk people to be registered."

John shows how to propagate plants

LONG-TIME Copper Coast Garden Club member John Adams presented tips for successful plant propagation at the club's Wednesday, August 23, meeting.

He brought along piles of cuttings from a variety of plants in his extensive garden for members to take home after he had pointed out some top tips for propagating each of them.

The succulents, John said, need to sit in a dry place until the cuts "healed".

Hardwood cuttings need to be removed from the mother plant with a "heel", which encourages root growth, and a dip in pure Kangaroo Island honey or Johnson's baby talcum powder helps prevent diseases in the cuttings.

John also shared some secret plant tonics, which he said were marvellous for promoting growth.

It was an enlightening and interesting talk. The competition table was again laden

with all sorts of award-winning plants. Spring flowers and vegetables are the best!

Summer is on its way, and it's time for gardeners to prepare for the hot, dry weather ahead.

I have been diligently surrounding all my plants with mulch, which (if I can keep the starlings out) should help my plants through summer.

"Gulf FM will be broadcasting from the market, so come say hi and see how they do it."

"It's the first thing ambos look for if they are called to your place in an emergency, so feel free to grab one, fill it in with your medical history and medication details, and pop it on your fridge," Barb said.

Get your skin checked in Bute

THE Lions Skin Cancer Screening Unit is coming to Bute on Saturday and Sunday, October 7 and 8.

A Bute and District Lions Club initiative, the mobile unit, part of the Lions Medical Research Foundation, will be set up in front of the Bute CFS shed from 9am to 4pm.

Bute Lions member Brett Gill said screenings, on average, took about 15 minutes.

'The examination is thorough, from your scalp to the soles of your feet, including eyes and mouth," Mr Gill said.

'You don't need to do anything to prepare; however, they do ask you have clean hair and are showered.

"Screening is available to everyone over the age of 17."

The screening unit advises people to arrive 10 minutes prior to their appointment to fill in a questionnaire.

"If any lesions are found on the day, you will be referred to your GP to follow up," Mr Gill said.

"Everyone running the program is a volunteer, but all screeners have had specific training to perform screenings.

"If you would like a gender specific screener, please ask so this can be accommodated.

"If you are unwell, have cold or flu symptoms or a temperature on the day, please do not attend."

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The importance of being Cornish

CORNISH Association of South Australia Yorke Peninsula branch members heard about the importance of being Cornish at their August 28 meeting.

Guest speaker was Graham Hancock who explained the theme in relation to the quest for World Heritage Site status for the historical Moonta Mines and Burra Cornish mining sites

This quest, Graham said, began in 2010.

To date, there are 20 UNESCO World Heritage Sites on the Australian continent, along with two tentative listings and others awaiting further consideration, including Moonta Mines and Burra.

South Australia's only WHS listing is the Naracoorte Caves, which have a fossil record covering at least the past 500,000 years, including several ice ages.

Although Kapunda was the first large mine in SA and there were Cornish miners there as well as in other places, the Burra and Moonta Mines specially targeted Cornish miners with an immigration program,

because of their world-wide reputation as hard-rock miners.

Burra and Moonta Mines still have many standing artefacts, such as engine houses, and a strong Cornish connection.

World Heritage Listing of Cornish mining sites in Cornwall and West Devon, United Kingdom, was announced in 2006.

Their application comprised 2168 pages with the chief criteria being Cornish methods of mining, the industrial landscape and cultural aspects.

The Copper Coast's twinning with Camborne, Cornwall, is significant as Camborne is on the World Heritage List.

Tourism is also important.

Branch president Liz Coole thanked Graham for his interesting talk and presented him with a gift, after which afternoon tea was shared with members.

The branch's next meeting will be an outing to Memoree House, Kadina, on Monday, September 25.

"To be able to give back is very satisfying," Neil said.



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

Hooded plover chicks hatch

VOLUNTEERS are appealing to beachgoers to keep an eye out for newly hatched hooded plover chicks.

Chicks have already been spotted at two beaches this breeding season, with eggs incubating at another 13 locations.

One-week-old chicks are being carefully monitored at Kemp Bay near Port Moorowie and at Chinaman's Hat Beach in Guuranda-Innes Dhilba National Park, and eggs at Port Hughes, Wauraltee Beach, Bluff Beach, Hardwicke Bay, Flaherty's Beach, Point Turton, Point Souttar, Corny Point, Port Moorowie and Port Vincent.

Classed as an endangered species, hooded plovers lay their eggs on the beach which makes them susceptible to accidental crushing by beachgoers, off-leash dogs and vehicles, as well as predation by foxes, cats and ravens.

Already this season, a nest has been taken by a cat at Point Souttar, as reported by Friends of the Hooded Plover volunteer coordinator Nanou Cabourdin.

"It's always disappointing to see a nest failure, but this one was particularly upsetting for our Point Souttar monitors, who are our newest volunteers," Ms Cabourdin said.

'We hope the Point Souttar hoodie pair will try again.

"Our volunteers are like anxious parents because there are many threats to the birds' survival.

"The chicks must feed constantly at the water's edge from the day they hatch and they take five weeks to learn to fly.

"If they're disturbed by beachgoers, this can prevent them from feeding or they can succumb to temperature

extremes, dehydration or starvation while hiding. They need space to raise their family."

Beach visitors can help protect hooded plovers by keeping dogs on a leash, walking below the high tide mark, not driving on the upper beach or dune areas and riding horses at low tide, as close to the water's edge as possible.

The Friends of the Hooded

Plover volunteers erect temporary signs at some beaches to identify nests, but not all nests are signed, so it is important for beachgoers to keep their eyes peeled.

It also tops the 82 visits made in 2018-19 when the sector contributed \$145 million to the economy.

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








Sonny Morey has been inducted into SA Football Hall of Fame

Indigenous icon of SANFL football, Sonny Morey, was inducted into the SA Football Hall of Fame at the Magarey Medal evening held at Adelaide Oval on Stansbury resident, has a 3-year-old son, Marley Sonny Morey, to continue his heritage.

In his stellar SANFL career, Morey won the club's 1970 best and fairest and was runner-up to AFL legend Malcolm Blight in the 1972 Magarey Medal count. He coached at Eudunda Roosters in the Barossa and Light Association from 1978 to 1980, delivering a flag in the first year, and spent nearly a decade coaching the Central District under 17s, which included the 1985 flag — the initial junior premiership at Football Park. When the SANFL selected their Aboriginal Team of the Ages in 2011, comprising Indigenous players who had played at least one league game in the SANFL, Sonny commanded a position in the back pocket and also as coach of the team. Equally important in Sonny's story is his work life at the Postmaster-General's Department, or Telstra as it was later known, before a powerful 12-year career with the South Australian Police which included roles working with Aboriginal communities.



Port Broughton's George Hewett and the Carlton Football Club secured a berth in the second preliminary final, after a heart-stopping victory over the Melbourne Demons.

In front of an amazing crowd of 96,412 at the MCG, Carlton came from behind at every interval and grabbed the lead with 56 seconds remaining to defeat the Dees by two points, 11.7 (73) to an inaccurate 9.17 (71).

Hewett, who started on the interchange bench, was a solid contributor all night.

He finished with 18 disposals, including 10 handballs, along with a mark and

three tackles. He was credited with 252 metres gained and also won a pair of clearances.

Carlton is just a win away from a 2023 grand final appearance. Port Adelaide and Bute's Lachie Jones were bundled out in straight sets, being





Ardrossan: Boat crews launched for KG whiting, garfish and squid from Price through to James Well at the weekend. The jetty fetched a night-time mulloway for keen anglers, plus squid and a blue crab.
