

ROAD SWAP BACK ON?

TALKS around the ownership of the Wallaroo entrance road could be set to rev up again.

Copper Coast Council started discussions with the state government about a potential road swap in about 2013

But in 2019, council presented a plan to the government which would have council take control of a 5.4 kilometre section of the Copper Coast Highway as well as the Spencer Highway, Victoria Street, Mays Crossing, Hughes Street and Irwine Street.

In exchange, council would hand over ownership of Bowman, Sharples and Magazine Roads.

Independent assessments of the roads, including the condition, were completed last year and found council would take on \$1.4 million more in road maintenance than the state government, so council asked for that sum in addition to the road swap.

But the suggestion was all but rejected by Minister for Transport Corey Wingard.

Council CEO Russell Peate and staff are now working on a new proposal in which the state would still take the heavy vehicle transport routes.

Council would then own the section of Copper Coast Highway, Victoria Street, May's Crossing and Hughes Street.

"We haven't heard anything from the government about this since December 2020," Mr Peate said.

"In this instance, we would have to pay them just over \$250,000 (because of the quality differential).

"I expect it to come to council in the coming months, and if councillors think it's worthy, we'll have a look and make it work.

"We would have to do some consultation, design and cost it and that would take time.

"If it was accepted by the government, we'd then go through the grant funding process as well." At an informal gathering, Mayor Roslyn Talbot expressed concerns about the potential for the state government to also let the main freight routes fall into disrepair.

Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said the potential plan was intended to show that the first option was more beneficial to the government.

"In that one, we take more roads off their assets," he said.

"But we needed something to get the conversation happening again."

I REFER to the news in relation to the dismantling of SAPSASA.

Many Olympians and Paralympians recount the dreams they had when they were young (primary school age), the determination and desire to compete and achieve, sometimes against all odds to be the best in their chosen sport.

South Australian Primary Schools Amateur Sports Association is a more than 100-year-old institution which has successfully given primary school children in South Australia a pathway in competitive sport for generations.

The SAPSASA pathway enables all schools, whether independent or state, in regional and metropolitan areas, to put forward teams and athletes to compete in different sports at a district, state and national level.

In 2013-14, a successful full consultative restructuring review including key stakeholders, district convenors and schools was completed to ensure: equality between metropolitan and country districts, geographical needs of local schools and communities were met, evenness of competition with greater participation rates and opportunities for children within districts, and evenness of the number of children within districts to ensure fairness of access to representative teams.

The only selection criteria used in SAPSASA sport is merit, just as it should be.

So, why try and tear down such a successful and inclusive institution? Why destroy the chance for kids to participate in competitive sport, which builds resilience, self-awareness, teamwork, and a healthy lifestyle away from digital devices?

The minister should be commended for putting a 12-month halt on the dismantling of a 100-year-old institution.

Work to begin on Wallaroo to Moonta trail

CONSTRUCTION of the Wallaroo to Moonta shared path is set to begin next month.

The 14.4-kilometre walking/cycling/running trail will link existing paths from Wallaroo to Kadina and Moonta to Port

The path will start in Ryan Street, before travelling along Cornish and Park Terraces before crossing Magazine Road to link with the old railway corridor and end by the Moonta

Copper Coast Council mayor Roslyn Talbot

said the project was well supported by the state and federal government.

About \$104,398 was secured from the Federal Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program — Phase 3, \$418,000 from the State Open Space Program for 2021-22 and \$187,800 from the State Bicycle Fund.

Council is contributing \$744,200 and an additional \$150,000 for project management

"It's pleasing to have secured further funding through the State Bicycle Fund and we thank the South Australian Government for their contribution," Mrs Talbot said.

"A lot of planning and work to secure funding has gone into this project, so it is exciting to see construction of this path set to commence next month.

"Council's infrastructure team is working closely with the Moonta National Trust and Heritage SA to ensure the timber sleepers and rails of the former railway line remain intact.

"The plan is to also work in conjunction with the Moonta Mining Precinct

Conservation Management Plan and have connecting paths to showcase the Moonta Mines." Mrs Talbot said the path will use the same

materials as the Kadina to Wallaroo trail. Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said the

trail will be beneficial for community health, tourism and infrastructure.

"It's excellent to see the bikeway extend from Moonta to Wallaroo," Mr Ellis said.

"I know the existing trail from Wallaroo to Kadina enjoys significant use and I'm certain the new section will be a welcome addition."

Ardrossan Men's Shed's osprey nesting project

OFFSHORE osprey nesting platforms were the focus of Minister for Environment and Water David Speirs' recent visit to the Ardrossan Men's Shed.

Men's shed members have been working on the platforms which are part of the state government's recovery strategy for the endangered bird.

Raptor (birds of prey) species eastern osprey and white-bellied sea eagle nest across the South Australian coastline, including on Yorke Peninsula.

The recovery strategy focuses on site protection, access restriction, data management, and planning and policy which includes the installation of artificial nest platforms.

Men's shed secretary/treasurer Kevin Betterman said they were approached by the local Landcare group to create the nests.

"They have been made out of a composite fibreglass material that comes in different sizes and connects together," Mr Betterman said.

"They use this kind of material for walkways and things like that ... the material is made in Queensland.

"We had the materials delivered and then had to work out how it all went together and we ended up making four of them."

Six platforms are planned for around the Yorke Peninsula.

'The tall ones will be sunk into a seabed and are about nine metres high ... there is another that will be moulded to rocks," Mr Betterman said.

"They have already put one up at Price which had to be installed using a helicopter so it's a bit of task to do."

Mr Betterman said the team had to assess whether they could complete the project.

"The government had designed nesting frames (made from) steel but that was too expensive and heavy," he said.

"We had to cut up the material, drill holes and things like that ... we only work two days a week.

"It would take about a week to cut the material, get it ready and then a day and a half to put it all together."

No freedom day for SA

THERE are no new cases of COVID-19 in South Australia but there is no end date to restrictions in sight.

Premier Steven Marshall said there would be no "freedom day" in South Australia when vaccine targets were

"While SA has signed up to the national roadmap, to allow border measures and lockdown rules to ease, some level of local restrictions will remain in force to keep people safe," Mr Marshall said.

"We will have to keep some public health social measures in place.

"We're not going to have a freedom day where the borders are open and restrictions are removed at the same

Mr Marshall said the pandemic was still dangerous and the government wanted to maintain good management of

"Anybody who becomes infected in SA, along with their close contacts, will still face periods in quarantine,"

'We do not want the disease running through our state even though it will eventually come in.

"We want to do that on our own terms and that means, test, trace, isolate and quarantine, and have some public health measures remaining in place."

There are currently seven active cases of COVID-19 in SA, all in medi-hotels, taking the state's total cases to date

Dancing restrictions ease

SOUTH Australia is set to ease some local COVID restrictions and border rules.

SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens announced the changes after a transition committee meeting today (Tuesday, September 21).

Dancing will return to private functions, with up to 50 people allowed on the dancefloor at a time, from Thursday.

Pub patrons will be able to stand up with a drink in outdoor areas of licensed venues, including beer

As of Saturday, travellers from Brisbane will be allowed to travel into the state with no testing or quarantine requirements.

Home gathering rules remain capped at 20 people and there are no changes to mask rules.

Copper Coast able to celebrate New Year's Eve

WALLAROO will have a fireworks display this New Year's Eve after COVID-19 caused the annual celebrations to be cancelled last year.

However, the associated sideshows and stalls will again be missing due to restrictions and lack of volunteers.

The Drakes Supermarkets Copper Coast New Year's Eve Celebrations committee would have needed about 50 COVID Marshals for the event.

The committee held an information night at the Wallaroo Town Hall recently for interested people; however, the number attending fell well short of the required volunteer mar-

"We had a meeting with SA Police and they advised us not to have the sideshows and food stalls because trying to police it with COVID Marshals was going to be a big job," secretary Bob Short said.

"We would need a pool of 50 marshals to be able to do it which we weren't able to do so we decided rather than cancel it, to keep the fireworks?

"We thought it was important to have something at Wallaroo on New Year's Eve so we will have the normal fireworks displays at 9.30pm and again at midnight."

The committee has spent the past 12

months fundraising but still needs sponsorship to help make the fireworks happen.

"Without those sideshows and food vans our income is not there so we are definitely looking for sponsorship from the businesses of the Copper Coast," Mr Short said.

"Doing it this way means it's only a half an hour job for the 9.30pm fireworks and midnight so this is more achievable.

"Last year we had nothing, we could have gone down that path but we believe Wallaroo deserves fireworks displays for New Year's Eve."

Celebrating brush-tailed bettongs

A COMMUNITY event was held last week to celebrate the reintroduction of brush-tailed bettongs to Yorke Peninsula.

Forty of the nationally endangered animals were released at two sites in Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park recently.

The 28 females and 12 males were translocated from nearby Wedge Island, where more than 1500 brush-tailed bettongs

It was a milestone moment for the ambitious Marna Banggara project, which aims to restore lost species to the local landscape.

About 70 people attended the celebration at the Marion Bay Community Hall including Minister for Environment and

Water David Speirs, Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis, and Yorke Peninsula Council mayor Darren Braund and CEO Andrew Cameron.

Also present were representatives from Marna Banggara project partners including Department for Environment and Water, Zoos SA, Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation, Fauna Research Regional Development Australia Yorke and Mid North, Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park

and University of Adelaide. Zoos SA's brush-tailed bettong Rambo also made a guest appearance.

Speeches were delivered by Mr Speirs, Northern and Yorke Landscape Board Community board member Sam Germein and Marna Banggara executive steering committee chair Trevor Naismith

The event closed with a question-and-answer session giving guests an opportunity to quiz the panel about the future of the Marna Banggara project, how the recently translocated brush-tailed bettongs are faring in their new home and the significance of their return for the Nharangga people.

"The crowd heard that the brush-tailed bettongs are settling into their new home in Guuranda-Innes National Park," a Northern and Yorke Landscape spokesperson said.

"There is plenty of evidence of their digging activity, which aerates the soil, disperses seeds and improves water infiltra-

No change to elector representation

YORKE Peninsula Council will make no changes to its ward system or the number of elected members.

Council formally adopted its preference to remain with 11 elected members and a mayor at its September meeting.

This is despite having more councillors than most councils its size and feedback from a ratepayer calling for the reduction in elected members.

YPC has 8835 electors spanning 5834 square kilometres while, in comparison, Copper Coast Council is represented by a mayor and nine councillors with 11,405 electors, spanning 773 square kilometres.

All councils have to review aspects of their composition and the division, or potential division, of the council area into wards.

Council CEO Andrew Cameron will prepare a final report to advise the Electoral Commissioner about the final

Nurses at risk of burnout, fatigue

A RECENT survey by the Nursing Australian and Midwifery Federation branch) has highlighted concerns about fatigue and burnout levels.

Almost 70 per cent of nurses and midwives in the study reported working unpaid overtime, with 25 per cent working double shifts.

Perhaps more concerning was more than 56 per cent of respondents had intentions to leave the industry within the next five years.

The survey also found younger nurses reported higher levels of emotional exhaustion, especially those aged 30-39 years.

"Overall, this pattern of data suggests we are facing a generational loss of younger nurses and midwives because of the pressure placed on them by the system to work in such demanding and fatiguing environments," ANMF (SA Branch) CEO/secretary Adj Associate Professor Elizabeth Dabars AM said.

"We have grave concerns for workforce capacity in the future which is intrinsically linked to burnout and fatigue as evidenced in the survey results.

"Health Workforce Australia in 2014 projected a shortfall of approximately 85,000 nurses/midwives by 2025 and

123,000 nurses/midwives by 2030."

Ms Dabars said there was no work actively being done to build the future workforce to a level the community would need.

"Much of the fatigue being experienced now has arisen from shortages in the workforce, not due to COVID alone but through health system managers and governments being asleep at the wheel," she said.

"We have clear shortages in areas such as mental health, critical care, emergency nursing, peri-operative care and mid-

"Country areas have the additional disadvantage of trying to recruit in these areas of shortage with few additional incentives to offer.

"The chronic issue of fatigue and burnout amongst nurses and midwives has never been in such urgent need of redress as it is right now.

"If the state government yet again fails to act on these significant survey results, then we are most certainly facing a major health crisis in the very near

"Inaction by government and SA Health means that they are complicit in creating ongoing crises in the workforce."

New legislation aims to stamp out drug drivers

THE state government has introduced legislation to Parliament which would instantly remove drug drivers from the roads.

Road Safety Minister Vincent Tarzia said the Road Traffic (Drug Driving and Careless or Dangerous Driving) Amendment Bill 2021 was another significant step towards increased road safety for the

The bill will allow SAPOL to issue a three-month instant loss of licence if a positive roadside drug screening test is returned.

More than 6270 drivers were detected with drugs in their system from 2019-20.

Tragically, 311 drivers and riders who lost their lives on roads tested positive to drugs between 2015-19.

"This nation-leading road safety measure takes drug drivers off the streets the second they test positive for illegal substances," Mr Tarzia said.

"It's unacceptable, unfair and tragic that their selfish choices could cut someone else's life short.

"This legislation is crucial to strengthening road safety for every motorist and pedestrian."

An immediate loss of licence for drug driving does not currently exist — if a driver returns a positive roadside test, an oral fluid sample is collected and provided to Forensic Science SA for spectrometry analysis.

If the spectrometry analysis returns a positive result, the Registrar of Motor Vehicles advises the driver of their three-month licence disqualification.

This means there is a 28-day delay between the initial test before a loss of licence is enforced.

SA-BEST Attorney-General spokesperson Connie Bonaros said she advocated strongly for the important reform.

"We have worked closely with the government and SAPOL on this proposed new legislation in a

collaborative effort to reduce the prevalence of drug drivers on our roads," Ms Bonaros said.

"Make no mistake - drug drivers on our roads are killing or seriously injuring innocent people."

SAPOL will also have discretion to decide if the driver should lose their licence at the roadside. or whether circumstances require further testing.

Do not leave your cooking unattended

SOUTH Australian Metropolitan Fire Service and SA Country Fire Service respond to more than 250 cooking-related house fires each year.

Unsafe cooking practices are one of the most common causes of preventable residential fires in SA, costing householders more than \$2 million a year.

MFS community engagement officer Douglas MacDonald-Taylor said cooking is a task which requires full attention, and any distraction may lead to a fire which potentially threatens lives and destroys property.

"Never leave cooking unattended, even for a short amount of time, if you have to leave the kitchen, turn off the stove," Mr MacDonald-Taylor said.

"MFS and CFS firefighters regularly attend close calls where a resident has left cooking on the stove and fallen asleep.

"This is a dangerous scenario that — without working smoke alarms - can quickly turn fatal."

The MFS also warned the community to never use water to put out a fat or oil fire.

"Water can cause burning oil or grease to splatter and create a much larger fire, putting you and your family in more danger," Mr MacDonald-Taylor said.

"Having a fire blanket and a dry chemical powder fire extinguisher near your kitchen away from the stove is your best protection for a grease fire.

But that's not enough — familiarise yourself with the instructions so, if the time comes, you will know how to use them correctly and

More support for tourism and hospitality businesses

LOCAL small and medium tourism and hospitality businesses impacted by the ongoing trading restrictions and border closures will be thrown another lifeline.

A new jointly-funded package from the Commonwealth and South Australian Governments will provide further financial support and a Small Business Hardship Grant will be introduced.

Yorke Peninsula Tourism manager Brooke Liebelt said Yorke Peninsula was still fortunate to receive a good level of visitation.

"However, these packages are really important for the industry in order to assist them to continue their daily operations," she

"YP is primarily an intrastate destination with approximately 88 per cent of visitors coming from South Australia; however, Victoria is our biggest interstate market and therefore this market has definitely been affected by border closures.

"The tourism industry on YP has shown incredible resilience with many diversifying their products and offerings to cope with these unprecedented times."

Treasurer Josh Frydenberg said tourism and hospitality businesses had done it particu-

larly tough as South Australia felt the impact of lockdowns in neighbouring states.

Premier Steven Marshall said SA had been recognised as the most liveable place in the nation and our COVID recovery plan was focused on standing shoulder to shoulder with small businesses as we navigate our way out of the global pandemic.

"While we have more South Australians employed than ever before in the history of the state, there is no doubt many businesses have been doing it tough during the pandemic," he

"These new grants will further support our hardworking small businesses who are the backbone of the state's economy."

COVID-19 Tourism and Hospitality Support Grant payments of \$3000 for employing businesses and \$1000 for nonemploying businesses will be automatically paid to businesses in eligible tourism and hospitality sectors that have already received the COVID-19 Additional Business Support

Applications for the new COVID-19 Business Hardship Grant and larger COVID-19 Tourism and Hospitality Support Grants opened September 17 and close on October 31.

The new package includes:

- COVID-19 Tourism and Hospitality Support Grant for businesses in eligible tourism and hospitality sectors (and other sectors such as performing arts, creative artists, taxis and car rental) that have already received the COVID-19 Additional Business Support Grant. Grants of \$3000 are available for businesses with turnover less than \$2 million, \$10,000 for businesses with turnover of greater than \$2 million, \$20,000 for businesses with turnover
- of greater than \$5m, a grant of \$1000 for nonemploying businesses.
- A new COVID-19 Business Hardship Grant of \$6000 for employing businesses with annual payrolls below \$10m and \$2000 for nonemploying businesses who have experienced a minimum 50 per cent reduction in turnover over the eligible period and haven't been eligible for previous business grant support since July 2021.

Regional tourism still struggling

September Narungga update

Busy times in and out of Parliament

The four weeks since my last column have been particularly busy, inside and outside of Parliament. Whilst we're in another sitting week now, I was pleased to be back last week in the electorate office albeit out every day meeting with constituents, businesses and school leaders anywhere from Marion Bay to Port Broughton, and multiple towns in between.

In the past two sitting weeks, I've lodged two petitions (one calling for investment in the Kadina-Wallaroo entrance road and the other demanding a solution to combat rising numbers of Pied Cormorants on SYP), delivered two grieve speeches, directed questions to Ministers, and formulated and introduced the Road Traffic (Work Areas and Work Sites) Amendment Bill 2021.

The latter is to impose higher penalties on companies which leave unnecessary speed limit signs out around roadworks and is in response to the significant feedback I've received on this topic.

In the chamber I also formally asked Minister Wingard specifically why speed restrictions on Highway One south of Port Wakefield remain in place for so long after work on new bitumen appears complete. To hear the Minister's answer (and to view all my speeches) visit www.fraserellis

Of the grieve speeches, one was about the impact on Port Vincent and Stansbury communities of the Pied Cormorants (shags) issue and the other was to again air my continued concerns about our health system and local health services.

We simply must do more to attract and retain our rural doctor and nurse workforces as our towns and communities will wither and die without reasonably accessible health services.

I do not think it is an exaggeration to say the attraction and retention of doctors in regional South Australia is the single biggest issue we face.

In some good news, I secured the commitment from Education Minister John Gardner MP there is no reform now afoot to remodel the SAPSASA system that would reduce the number of districts and thus the numbers of rural students participating in this wonderful scheme that has worked successfully for decades.

This swift response was a relief.

AGL powering Southern YP hubs

SOLAR panels and batteries have been installed in hubs across southern Yorke Peninsula to support communities during extreme weather events.

Energy provider AGL has installed 33kW of solar panels and 54kWh of batteries across hubs in Edithburgh, Stansbury Yorketown.

AGL provided a grant of \$175,000 to the communities which were impacted by the 2019-20 bushfires, which, in catastrophic fire conditions, broke through containment lines impacting property and livestock in the region.

AGL chief operating officer Markus Brokhof said in times of need these community hubs are critical in providing a safe place for people to come together.

When extreme weather hits communities, power can become unreliable, leading to blackouts and furthering the risk to the wider community," Mr Brokhof said.

"The communities in the southern Yorke Peninsula have suffered unimaginable loss over the past few years but are rebuilding and ensuring that the best facilities are in place to protect the community in the future.

"We know these hubs have become a focal point for locals in times of need and the solar and battery installations mean they will be able to reliably operate and continue to be a safe haven for so many people, even during the darkest hours."

The installations will be connected to AGL's Virtual Power Plant, helping to stabilise the grid and providing a sustainable energy source for the community while producing enough energy to power nine average South Australian homes.

By displacing electricity which would otherwise be sourced from the grid at a higher emissions intensity, the solar and battery installations will avoid 17 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions annually.

SYP Community Hub coordinator Kate Martin said, during and following the Yorketown fire, many people in the communities realised how underprepared for emergencies they were.

"AGL has been involved in the fire recovery program since soon after the fire, and we are very grateful for its contribution in general and for the installation of the solar systems specifically," Ms Martin

Stormwater trial on Heritage Drive

COPPER Coast Council is partnering with Legatus and Space Down Under to trial a stormwater harvesting concept.

A series of 10 Norfolk pines have been planted along Heritage Drive, Wallaroo, as part of the 12-month trial.

Half of the pines will be watered by council staff and the other five will solely be watered by underground water collection pods.

The pods collect water through a kerb mounted infiltration system, which keeps the water until it soaks into the soil.

"These systems deliver stormwater quality and quantity benefits while the increased irrigation of street trees helps to mitigate the urban heat island effect and improve other environmental and human outcomes," a recent Legatus

"By intercepting the 'first flush' of stormwater, TREENET Inlet Systems remove pollutants near

This promotes bio-sequestration of nutrients such as phosphorous and nitrogen that might otherwise cause algal blooms in receiving waters downstream.

"This project presents new opportunities to improve the local environment and mitigate climate change."

The trees will be monitored, measured and the data collated to determine its effectiveness across the year.

St Mary MacKillop School, Wallaroo, has donated 1000 collection cloth bags, which feature designs by students Trae Wellgreen and Emilie Nash.


"The St Mary MacKillop School site is the first stop and they have supplied the bags for the children to use," Mrs Ayles said.





Jess's artistic adventures

THEY say a true artist is not one who is inspired, but one who inspires others.

Jess Hewett, of Port Broughton, is doing her bit to inspire the local community to support South Australian artists and bring more art culture into regional areas.

Through her business, Jessica Hewett Curating, she is organising the upcoming Empower SA Exhibition at Port Broughton's Gallery 1871 during the October long weekend.

Jess said she has had a passion for all things art since she can remember.

"This small venture into independent curating is my way of trying to combine and share my love of history, art and education," she said.

"The concept behind Jessica Hewett Curating is to support artists in taking the hassle out of showcasing and exhibiting their work.

"I will identify the location, complete the installation and manage interest so the artist can focus on their creativity."

After completing school and beginning a commerce degree at Adelaide University, Jess spent two years travelling throughout Europe and South East Asia.

"I went to every art gallery, museum and place of historical importance I could find, from Uffizi in Florence, to the Pergamon in Berlin and the Killing Fields in Cambodia," Jess said.

"When I returned from overseas all I wanted to do was work in a gallery or a museum, becoming a curator of some description.

"I began hassling Art Gallery of SA employees until Julie Robinson, senior curator of prints, drawing and photographs, took me on.

"I spent several years learning from Julie and finishing my Art History and Classical Studies degree at Adelaide University."

After finishing her degree, Jess reconnected with future husband Andrew Hewett, who

she met previously in high school, and moved to Port

"Moving to the Mid North was wonderful, Andrew has a beautiful family and the Port Broughton community is so welcoming," she said.

"Unfortunately, I did find trying to get work in curating or the arts very challenging — lots of volunteer work is available just no paid work.

"I returned to study and completed a Graduate Diploma in Teaching while working at Rodda Communications, now Telstra Kadina, and Broughton Marine.

"Once completed, I got my first appointment at John Pirie Secondary School in Port Pirie

as a visual art and HASS (humanities, arts and social sciences) teacher, where I have been for the past eight years and more recently working within Aboriginal Education."

Jess said she was incredibly passionate about teaching and her school, and specifically the area of Aboriginal education.

"My own learning and work

in that area is something I am very proud of," she said.

"I've met the most wonderful people through this work, and I value these relationships so much."

Andrew and Jess also run their family business, Hewett Seafood, and have two sons Bodhi and Noah.

"We love the simplicity and

peace of the ocean from fishing to diving," Jess said.

Jess grew up on Kangaroo Island, the daughter of Cate Telfer, a school principal, and Peter Telfer, founder of Adventure Charters, now Exceptional Kangaroo Island, the island's first 4WD touring company.

"Dad suddenly passed away at 40 of a heart attack and Mum took my brother Sam and I to live and attend school in Colorado, USA, for a year before returning to KI," she said.

"Growing up on KI, in a place of such natural beauty, I've always felt as though the island has been bubbling with the most creative, entrepreneurial and artistic of people — it's what the island produces the best in my opinion - good, creative peo-

"I feel like Mum taking my brother and I overseas at such a young age made us have a very strong global consciousness and perspective, and I am grateful for that."

Jess followed in her father's footsteps and attended Westminster Boarding School in Adelaide.

"I also participated in a lifechanging trip to South Africa working with Habitat for Humanity in shanty villages outside of Cape Town and Johannesburg," she said.

"Whenever possible we love returning to KI, although this has been more difficult since losing our 50-year-old family shack at Hanson Bay to the devastating bushfires of 2020."

Jess said, for many, work was a means to an end, a way of affording to live, or affording to live the way you want to.

"But, if you are lucky enough to be able to find work that truly feeds your soul, is about your passion and that you love, it's not work anymore — this is how I feel about teaching, the arts and curating," she said.

"I see my husband doing this every day — fishing is not easy, in fact it's a tough gig — but he is one of those people who is living his dream and I aspire to do that

Blooming beautiful

THE wildflowers around Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park are putting on a show.

Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park ranger Mark Davison said good rainfall and cold temperatures during winter had provided ideal conditions for an abundant display of native flowers.

"From the moment you enter Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park, to right across the park, you can spot the most magnificent display of wildflowers," Mark said.

"Native lilacs, also known as hardenbergia violacia, with their beautiful, vivid purple flowers are in full bloom.

"Templetonias, also called cocky's tongue or flame bush, with their large, striking red flowers, can also be easily spotted.

"Other wildflowers also on display include old man's beard, coastal velvet bush, coastal bearded heath, wattle, common fringe myrtle, pea flowers, running postman,



scented leucostrongly pogons, rice flowers and melaleuca.

"Beautiful native orchids can also be spotted here and there on some of the walking trails throughout the park."

The park has 333 species of native plants with 115 of those of conservation significance and many which are not found anywhere else on Yorke Peninsula.

Mark said spring has also brought new life to the park with several groups of newly hatched emu chicks getting around.

Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park is worth a visit at any time of year, with plenty to do including camping,



fishing and surfing.

Bushwalking is also a great way to discover the park, with trails ranging from 30minute strolls to four-hour

The park also has a rich and tumultuous maritime history, with lighthouses and the Ethel shipwreck popular places for visitors to explore.

The historical, abandoned township of Inneston with its restored heritage cottages is an accommodation option, and there are also several campsites within the park.

Tricia Stringer to celebrate book launch

PEOPLE are already flocking to get a copy of Tricia Stringer's latest book, Birds of a

The book tells the story of three women, Eve, Julia and Lucy, who are thrown together by unusual circumstances in the seaside town of Wallaby Bay.

"I've wanted to write this one for quite a long time, in that Wallaby Bay is actually Wallaroo," Tricia said.

"I've always wanted to write a story about our prawn industry, it's really one of our best kept secrets.

"So the inspiration for the story itself came from other places but the prawn industry fit in perfectly with Eve's plot."

Eve has been a partner in a fishing fleet for as long as she can remember but they

want her to sell and she grapples with what her life would be without work.

Lasering floaters

Invasive surgery is often a step too far to eliminate vitreous floaters for many, but an Australian-developed YAG laser therapy is proving to be a good first-line option for selected patients.

Patients troubled by vitreous floaters can be particularly motivated to seek treatment, but are frequently left disappointed when told they'll need to learn to live with the irritating structures drifting through their field of vision.

The often-benign nature of symptomatic floaters can mean they're underestimated by busy optometrists and ophthalmologists focused on more sight-threatening conditions.

Overwatch, FMC under more fire

Fin Hansen REPORT BY

AFTER experiencing negative effects of new herbicide Overwatch, farmers from Wimmera, Victoria, have proposed a class action against its developer

The pre-emergent was widely anticipated as an optimal solution for ryegrass control in crops across Australia, including on Yorke Peninsula.

Following seven years of trials, the chemical was applied to more than a million hectares earlier this year and received numerous mixed reactions concerning performance.

White bleaching effects

have been commonly observed in paddocks where Overwatch has been sprayed, as well as in neighbouring paddocks.

However, many have suggested its performance against ryegrass has lived up to expectations.

Class action drawing interest

Since its proposal, about 50 graingrowers from Western Australia, South Australia and Victoria have expressed interest in the class action, by Sydney law firm Levitt Robinson.

Special Counsel at the firm, Brett Imlay, said the movement is growing every

"Barley and wheat growers have been particularly affected, as they're not experiencing what they expected," Mr Imlay said.

"We're not just seeing bleaching effects, but quality damage and even crop death

"(Farmers) don't know what their losses will be until harvest, but some are estimating between 25 and 50 per cent."

Mr Imlay said the issues had been reported by farmers who had been successful for many seasons.

"They have had several paddocks without the application that have been flourishing," he said.

"We're still gathering registrations and analysing information about different sowing methods and soil conditions.

"I encourage farmers to document what's happening, compare paddocks and keep track with their agronomists.

FMC backs its product

FMC Australia and New Zealand head of development Geoff Robertson said they had received welcome support and reports of satisfaction from agronomists and growers.

"While there were some (farmers) who experienced transient bleaching early in the season, the majority are now seeing substantial recovery of crops," Mr Robertson said.

"Crops have established well following the late (rainfall) on the Yorke Peninsula this season."

Mr Robertson said it was unreasonable to determine yields until harvest.

"Talking about measurable yield for any crop now is simply speculation, with many factors still at play until harvest," he said.

"If there had been legitimate on-label use of FMC product in a paddock requiring investigation, FMC is addressing that directly with the grower concerned.

"Growers understand the unique agronomy of each paddock and that each inquiry must be dealt with in an individual manner."

YP AG Kadina agronomist Darryn Schilling said local agronomists have started evaluating the herbicide's performance with their growers.

"We're seeing some reasonable recovery (from early bleaching effects) now," Mr Schilling said.

"There's likely to be some damage, we just don't know how much yet.

"Visual effects don't always equate to yield damage and weed control has still been positive.

"It seems things have improved a lot and we'll continue to work through the process."



Exploring micro climate and sheep

DECREASED lamb mortality and increased marking rates will be the major focus of new largescale research by Meat and Livestock Australia.

MLA is partnering with the University of Western Australia and Murdoch University to investigate the impact of heat stress on ewes and whether edible shelter can improve lamb survival.

"Improving reproductive performance has consistently been ranked the highest priority by our sheep producers and advisory committees and that's why we're directing research to find practical solutions that producers can implement on-farm," MLA general manager for research, development and adoption Michael Crowley said.



Mildew genes hold key to resistance

AUSTRALIAN researchers have discovered a set of unique and potentially durable resistance genes from exotic barley lines which can be used to develop crops with stable resistance to powdery mildew.

The three adult resistance genes share new mechanisms for fighting the barley powdery mildew pathogen and were discovered at the Centre for Crop and Disease Management.

Powdery mildew is a challenging disease for Australian barley growers, especially in high-rainfall and humid weather conditions favoured by the pathogen and can result in substantial losses in quality and yield.

The CCDM's barley research team noticed some barley lines were resistant to powdery mildew at adult stage but not as seedlings.

"This led us to focus our research on adult barley plants, specifically in exotic lines and landraces that are not closely related to modern barley cultivars and which have a limited range of resistance genes to powdery mildew disease," Dr Simon

Ellwood said.

"While these exotic and wild types of barley are not ideal as grain crops, their desirable traits can be bred into elite barley lines, including the new resistance genes we have identified."

The team searched for resistance in more than 1000 exotic lines and wild relatives of barley from regions of the crop's diversity in the Horn of Africa, the Near East and Asia, accessed through the Australian Grains Genebank.

"What makes our newly discovered resistances useful to breeders is their atypical nature," Dr Ellwood said.

"They share common features which suggest they operate by a different mechanism to conventional genes to resist powdery mildew, so integrating them into Australian barley cultivars should make for a strong defence that is difficult for the pathogen to overcome.

'They also appear to be broad-spectrum showing resistance to all powdery mildew pathotypes tested and they are each single genes which makes them easier for breeders to work with.

"The new genes will allow breeders to reduce the reliance on MLO, a broadspectrum resistance that is the only current alternative.

"By providing breeders with the knowledge and tools to deliver stable resistance in barley cultivars, we are supporting the adoption of

improved germplasm and helping Australian growers to cost-effectively manage powdery mildew disease."

Big cost of spring frost

SPRING radiation frost is estimated to cost Australian grain growers \$360 million in direct and indirect losses each year.

Researchers at the University of Adelaide and University of Wollongong ranked the susceptibility to frost damage in wheat and barley germplasm (seed and tissues) under frost prone landscapes across Australia in a paper published in Frontiers in Plant Science.

The researchers applied a novel detailed statistical framework to an extensive, multi-environment dataset, spanning multiple sowing times of wheat and barley across South Australia, New South Wales and Western Australia between 2010 and

The analysis could aid growers and plant breeders in identifying the most well-adapted varieties for breeding programs, and help to circumvent significant economic losses due to frost damage to grain crops, Adelaide Uni School of Agriculture, Food and Wine's Dr Ariel Ferrante

"Growers are not able to rapidly

assess frost damage to crops due to the physical structure of the plants, so damage is not evident until several weeks after frost has occurred, when it may be too late to make decisions such as whether to cut for hay or to continue to harvest," she said.

To mitigate against yield loss and quality downgrades, growers usually sow their crops earlier but at the risk of exposing the reproductive organs of plants to the highest susceptibility of spring radiation frost."

The relationship between plant performance in response to frost and plant height and spike length among varieties within different maturity groups was also investigated.

"Using this method, we have been able to show for the first-time genotypic differences to frost damage in barley, and we extended the preexisting wheat dataset by three years," Dr Ferrante said.

Co-author and research supervisor Professor Iason Able said the results provide information which breeding programs and growers can use as a foundation to develop wheat and barley varieties with improved susceptibility to spring radiation frost.

"Effective post-frost responses to minimise the impact of frost on yield, stability and profit is crucial to assist growers and breeding programs to make informed decisions regarding extracting value from frosted crops,"

The research was supported by the GRDC within its National Frost Initiative which aims to provide the Australian grains industry with targeted research, development and extension solutions to manage the impact of

HOT FISHING TIPS

Recipe, crab cakes — Ingredients: half-cup mayo, 1 egg, 1 spoon Dijon mustard, panko breadcrumbs, 250g crabmeat (cooked), splash Tabasco sauce, chopped parsley, cooking oil, lemon wedges. Preparation: combine mayo, egg, mustard, sauce and whisk. Set aside for 15 minutes then add crab and parsley and gently make the patties. Coat with panko and cook in a medium hot pan with oil (3-5min each side). Serve with lemon wedges and a glass of cold white wine.

Wallaroo: North-west winds were pretty much the order for a lot of last week forcing ietty anglers to fish the south side. Catches included blue swimmer crabs, mullet from the sandy shallows and the occasional squid. Boat trips were on the light side as crews fished for King George whiting, gar and squid off Point Riley and Riley Shoals.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Try the jetties for blueys, yellowfin whiting and mullet (again from the sandy shallows on a high tide), garfish and squid. Boat crews reported rat kingfish from Steamer channel and snook, gar and squid off Tipara Reef. Ouite a few of the male blue crabs

are light on meat.

Point Turton: Reasonably persistent onshore north-westerly winds prevailed along this part of the YP coast, keeping boat trips to a minimum. Whiting and squid are in Hardwicke Bay and Point Souttar northern grounds on the drift. Jetty-based anglers reported tommy ruff (Australian herring), squid and salmon trout here and from the boat-ramp breakwater.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Caravan and camper traffic had to be seen to be believed last week. There are extensive roadworks between Urania and Minlaton. Try the jetties for squid and tommies, while boat crews caught red nannygai, sweep and snook.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Boat trips to the Orontes Bank and Tapley Shoals had snook, whiting and the odd blue crab in the catch bags. Jetty fishing has ruff and squid in the late afternoons. Blue morwong and big KG whiting are off Troubridge Point.

Ardrossan: West to north-west winds up to 25 knots blew in for most of the weekend, with intrepid boat trippers hugging the coastline fishing for bluevs, squid and small gar, Rakers tried their luck at Tiddy Widdy Beach and James Well on the outgoing tide.
