

Health staff housing project

A \$2.67 MILLION project to provide accommodation for aged care workers in Port Broughton is set to go ahead, thanks to a \$1.66M grant from the Australian Government.

Barunga Village will contribute \$1.012M to the project, in addition to the grant from the Department of Health, Disability and Ageing's Aged Care Capital Assistance Program.

The organisation proposes to build three duplexes on Bay Street, comprising six fully equipped one-bedroom units with flexible layouts designed to accommodate families if required.

Barunga Village chief executive Elizabeth Carroll said the development was progressing through council

planning approval.

Work on the project was expected to start in 2026, pending planning approvals, and tenders for building work would be sought from this week.

Ms Carroll said the units would help ease staff shortages by providing accommodation for new staff for an initial three or six-month period, giving them time to find ongoing accommodation.

"The shortage of suitable housing in regional areas is a significant barrier to attracting and keeping skilled staff," she said.

"This development enables us to offer quality accommodation to new and relocating staff, directly supporting the sustainability of our residential and community

A strange decision

THE article in the YP Country Times (September 16 edition) about the new development on the Copper Coast Highway in Kadina made me realise I'm not the only one questioning the logic behind the placement of the new buildings.

What was once a tree-lined area with potential for landscaping — a space used by RVs and caravans close to shops, public toilets, and in view of the water tower's mural - has been cleared to make way for large buildings.

Why was approval given for the enormous structures? Was the Kadina Chamber of Commerce aware of the proposed size? As the water tower mural was a government-funded commission of theirs, one might assume they would have raised concerns if consulted.

The industrial area near Stratco with empty blocks, or even the originally proposed Aldi site behind Port Road at Wallaroo Mines, would have been far more suitable for all three new buildings.

These locations also offer more space, large areas for parking and the potential for other businesses.

The water tank mural is now hidden from the highway from Frances Terrace, peeling paint is what you see.

I understand growth is needed, but surely not at the expense of bulldozing existing trees and the efforts made to enhance the area's art culture.

The traffic congestion in Kadina is already an issue; piling more large shops into the CBD seems a strange decision. T. Magnay, Kadina

Controlling declared weeds

DOES Copper Coast Council do vegetation audits? I have notified council of the following concerns but have not received a reply.

African boxthorn is a declared pest weed and is spreading rapidly along roadside verges in Wallaroo Mines.

Increasing numbers of young boxthorns (under 40 centimetres) are appearing on council land. These could be removed easily by one council worker using a fork and a ute.

However, larger boxthorn plants — many around two metres high — are now established, and will soon flower and set and seed, spreading further..

Based on their size, each large boxthorn would likely require at least three council employees, a truck, chainsaw, various implements, and the use of a herbicide to spray on the exposed base — and several hours per person to remove.

What will be the cost? Removing boxthorns while they're still a manageable size would be more cost effective.

The same problem exists with prickly pear, which is rapidly spreading on the boundaries and inside the no-go Wallaroo Mines precinct. These would also need one worker, one shovel and one ute to remove.

All of this is taking place in a prominent tourism area of the Copper Coast.

Housing crisis

EVERYONE deserves a roof over their head.

I thought that's something we could all agree on, but perhaps it's not so.

Last week, the YP Country Times covered the state parliamentary inquiry into shortstay accommodation, and what its recommendations could mean for that sector and tourism here on Yorke Peninsula.

The argument was made that regulatory pressures could see properties taken off the rental market altogether, rather than converted into permanent rentals.

This week we have sought renters' perspectives, and it's been suggested that the houses which are vacant more than they are occupied, or vacant 24/7, are the real gut punch.

So, we need holiday homes for tourists, rental stock for essential workers, and housing is a human right

While arguments ensue over who should pay and who suffers, statistics from submissions to the inquiry show about 6000 South Australians are homeless each night, the state's public housing waitlist is around 16,000, and there were nearly 84,000 unoccupied dwellings in SA on census night 2021.

Having a home is something that affects the stability of your whole life and wellbeing.

When it comes to considering the short-stay sector among all this, it might feel harsh at a time when we're in a tourism slump as a result of the algal bloom.

But the housing conversation is one that needs to be ongoing, with each factor examined.

That's if we want quality of life going forward.

Mayor Gray marks a first for YP Council

KYLIE Gray has been elected as the first female mayor of Yorke Peninsula Council, securing a decisive victory in the supplementary election.

The votes were counted on Tuesday, September 29, with Mayor Gray receiving 2615 votes (72 per cent) of the 3611 formal ballots cast.

Her opponent, fellow Innes Penton Vale ward elected member Michael O'Connell, recorded 996 votes.

"It is humbling to be named mayor," Mayor Gray said.

"I think it is a shift, we haven't had many female mayor nominations in the past, so it is good to see females are prepared to put their hand up now."

With more than a decade of experience in government, Mayor Gray brings considerable expertise to her new role. She has previously served on YPC and held roles at the federal level.

"My past experience should help," she said.

"I know how governments run and work, and I know the inner workings of local government, which will help me in my time as mayor." With the next South Australian local government elections to be held in November 2026, Mayor Gray has already set goals for her 12-month term, focusing

on learning, leadership and

"On a personal level, I want to learn the role the best I can and execute it the best I can, she said.

"I hope I can demonstrate leadership and give everyone a chance to know me, and for me to know them."

"This is a unique opportunity and I have a limited time, around 12 months, so it is a great way for me and the community to test the waters and see if we are great fits for one another."

Outside of council, Mayor Gray owns a pilates studio in Yorketown, where she works with a diverse range of clients and has developed strong local ties.

She said she was looking forward to stepping outside her comfort zone and believed bringing a neutral perspective to the chamber would offer her a new and valuable perspective.

The election was triggered by the resignation of former mayor Darren Braund in May. Councillor Richard Carruthers had been serving as acting mayor in the interim.

The promotion of Mayor Gray from councillor to mayor leaves her former council seat vacant, requiring a supplementary election for the Innes Penton Vale Ward. More information about this upcoming supplementary election will be announced in the near future, a

MAYOR Gray received 2615 votes, or 72.42 per cent of the 3611 formal ballots cast. Her opponent, Michael O'Connell, recorded 996 votes (27.58 per cent).

Voting was conducted entirely by post, with ballots due by noon on Monday, September 22. The count was held the following day, and Ms Gray was provisionally declared elected midafternoon after passing the quota of 1806 votes.

The Electoral Commission of South Australia ran the election and oversaw the count.

Of the 9461 eligible voters, 3685 (38.95 per cent) returned declaration envelopes containing ballot papers.

Fifty-nine envelopes were rejected or excluded, giving a

participation rate of 38.33 per cent. Of the 3627 accepted envelopes, 15 contained informal votes.

Jetty works delayed

PLANNED upgrades to the Port Vincent Fisherman's Jetty have been deferred.

Civil Tech, appointed through a competitive tender process, is now expected to begin on-site works in early 2026. In May, works were expected to start in June.

Yorke Peninsula Council chief executive Andrew Cameron said the delay is due to circumstances beyond council's control.

Design work is ongoing to prepare for construction. Mr Cameron said council remains in regular contact with Civil Tech and committed to delivering the project as soon as possible.

"The Fisherman's Jetty is a valued asset for Port Vincent and the wider Yorke Peninsula," Mr Cameron said.

The rejuvenated jetty will have a flat deck, replacing the sloped original, and will improve safety and accessibility.

The project is jointly funded by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport through the SA Jetties Renewal Program, contributing \$513,195 — or 40 per cent — of the total cost.

Wallaroo stormwater consultation

COPPER Coast Council is seeking community feedback on stormwater issues in Wallaroo.

Council, with funding from the Stormwater Management Authority, is preparing a stormwater management plan for the town, which it says will provide a better understanding of issues and their extent in the area.

\$2.67m project to house staff

THE custom-designed units would help Barunga Village to attract new staff from within Australia and overseas, Ms Carroll said.

The units would provide temporary accommodation for employees in roles such as residential care providers, nurses, supervisors and managers, hospitality staff and others.

She said many potential employees were deterred from applying for roles with Barunga Village because of the lack of rental accommodation.

Barunga Village is working with Stuart Michael Fitton Architects and Reimagine Architects of New Zealand to design and deliver the project.

"This project is part of a broader commitment to supporting our workforce and delivering high-quality care to the people we serve," Ms Carroll said.

"It reflects our focus on long-term planning and our belief that investing in people and the infrastructure they need delivers real benefits to the whole community."

The ACCAP grant is part of the Australian

Government's investment in aged care infrastructure, aimed at improving access to care and supporting the delivery of services in regional and remote areas.

The staff accommodation project is part of Barunga Village's masterplan to increase its capacity, including a proposed major expansion of the residential care facility, Barunga Homes.

"The demand for increased residential aged care is just undeniable," Ms Carroll said.

"In the next five years, there's going to be another 200,000 people of 85 years plus in Australia and obviously some of those will need to go into residential aged care."

Meanwhile, consultation has begun with residents of retirement village, Barunga by the Sea, about a proposal to build more retirement homes on an adjacent block of land, and a public consultation will be held in early November.

Barunga Village acquired the 42-bed standalone aged care home The Willochra Home, at Crystal Brook, in Iune.

Pollies pedal through NYP

PROMINENT current and former politicians pedalled through northern Yorke Peninsula last week to raise money to help defence veterans transition to civilian life.

More than 30 participants in Pollie Pedal, one of Australia's longest-running charity cycling events, rode through regional SA from Adelaide between September 21 and 28.

Starting in North Adelaide, they cycled to Clare, then travelled through Blyth, Lochiel and Kadina to Wallaroo, where the group stayed overnight.

The peloton then pedalled to Port Pirie via Kadina, Alford and Port Broughton, then to Burra and the Barossa Valley before returning to Adelaide.

Member for Grey Tom Venning took part in the ride between Roseworthy and Auburn, joining Shadow Minister of Defence and Pollie Pedal chair Angus Taylor, among others.

Mr Taylor said money raised by the ride would go to the Wandering Warriors, which supports veterans of Australia's Special Operations Command and their families.

"Pollie Pedal is about community, ser-

vice, and giving back to those who have given so much for our country," he said.

"Each year, the ride brings together people from all walks of life in a spirit of mateship and support."

Pollie Pedal founder and patron, former prime minister, the Hon Tony Abbott AC, said it was humbling to see the ride still going strong.

Tania Stock named Liberal candidate for Narungga

YORKE Peninsula Council elected member Tania Stock has been chosen as the Liberal candidate for the seat of Narungga ahead of March's state

Mrs Stock, of Sandilands, was preselected at a Kadina meeting of Liberal Party members on September 24, ahead of Wakefield Regional Council elected member Tom Michael, of Barunga Gap.

Mr Michael was the Liberal candidate for Narungga at the 2022 state election, announced just five weeks before polling day.

In contrast, Mrs Stock has around five months to campaign, and brings experience from previous bids for upper house seats at both federal and state elections.

Mrs Stock said she has lived and farmed on Yorke Peninsula for 22 years, been a YPC elected member for 12 years, and served on the YP Health Advisory Council, with roads and health high on her priority list.

"We've got a strong agricultural industry and freight and commodities need to be moved around our electorate," Mrs Stock said.

"As configurations of trucks get bigger, we need to make sure that those roads are safe and fit for purpose, not only for freight transport but every road user and our tourist traffic.

"In terms of road policy ... I would certainly be looking to see funding ring-fenced for the regions to make sure there's adequate funding to support our road network."

Mrs Stock said she wanted to see better local GP and specialist accessibility and stronger hospitals, rather than people having to travel to Adelaide.

"The Liberal Party's already indicated that they want to scrap Labor's GP payroll tax," she said.

"Doing that will help protect country practices from higher costs, support bulk billing, and help recruit and retain more doctors."

Mrs Stock said she believes affordable energy is the biggest challenge

facing both the state and country.

"That's been a real inhibitor for heavy industries and small business, and it's also crippling households with their exorbitant power bills," she said.

"The Liberal Party has a plan to ensure we secure the Torrens Island gas plant (which AGL is set to convert into a low-carbon energy hub) for baseload power.

"We've experienced power outages here on Yorke Peninsula and how costly

that is for business, so we need to make sure that we have reliable power."

Asked about climate change and energy source preferences, Mrs Stock said the best way forward was "a balance of energy sources that are affordable and reliable".

On housing solutions, she said the Liberals' policy is to scrap stamp duty for first home buyers on existing homes up to \$1 million.

On other hot topics, Mrs Stock said

she would generally "take a conservative view" on reproductive rights and said the Voice to Parliament referendum result should be accepted as "the voice of the people" on First Nations rights.

Mrs Stock said she does not believe the federal Liberal Party's historic election loss earlier this year will be repeated in South Australia, saying Labor is driving debt to record levels, had to bail out the Whyalla steelworks, and that South Australians were struggling with the high cost of living and energy bills.

Mrs Stock will go up against independent incumbent Fraser Ellis, a former Liberal who has held the seat since 2018, at the state election.

No other candidates for Narungga have yet been announced.

Narungga covers the entire Yorke Peninsula, as well as Red Hill, Blyth and Port Wakefield.

Shark death causes

SHARKS washed up on South Australian beaches in recent months, including two on Yorke Peninsula, died because of the algal bloom.

Necropsy reports from the Department of Environment and Water showed death signs consistent with exposure to high levels of Karenia for three dead great whites. The causes of death for six others could not be identified.

On Yorke Peninsula, a 2.7 metre male shark washed up at Port Moorowie on April 18 and a 3.5m female shark at Port Broughton on June 27 both showed the Karenia exposure symptoms.

But for a 3.2m male shark at Ardrossan on May 2, a 3m male at Port Wakefield on May 13, a 3.2 male at Sultana Point on May 16 and a 4.2m female at Stansbury on May 30, no cause of death was identified.

Two other sharks washed up at Port Willunga on April 18 and Henley Beach on May 5.

Algae revelations

THE federal government was not formally advised about the impact of South Australia's algal bloom until the end of May, a Senate inquiry hearing in Canberra has heard.

Federal environment department officials were grilled over the speed of their response to the bloom at the hearing on Wednesday, September 24.

One official said federal environment minister Murray Watt was first formally briefed about the bloom on July 11 — two months after he assumed the position.

Meanwhile, a state government spokesperson told the ABC that state and federal government agencies had been working together since the bloom was first detected in March, when it was expected to dissipate with cooler ocean temperatures.

Former environment minister Tanya Plibersek was also warned by scientists about potential algal blooms in October 2023.

The Senate inquiry committee is expected to hand down its report about the bloom on October 28.

Travel voucher bookings

ALMOST 3000 bookings to a total value of \$1.5 million have been made since the Coast is Calling vouchers were distributed on Tuesday, September 23, according to the state government.

More than 4800 nights have been booked in coastal accommodation, including 1400 thanks to the vouchers, tourism minister Zoe Bettison said on Saturday, September 27.

Voucher winners must book by Friday, October 24, for travel until November 30. Those who may not be able to redeem their voucher within the booking period can share their code for someone else to use.

Wallaroo Shores estate land sold

ASPEN Group has purchased the estate land portion of Wallaroo Shores for \$14.1 million, with the 13.45-hectare development to be renamed Aspen Wallaroo.

Aspen and Copper Coast Council have agreed to a concept masterplan that includes more than 300 housing sites, as well as a commercial and retail precinct, Aspen chief executive John Carter said.

Mr Carter said Aspen would seek formal development approval after the transaction settles and expects civil works to begin next year.

Copper Coast Council, in partnership with Wallaroo Shores resort developer Monopoly Property group, listed the estate land for sale in October last year.

"Council is most optimistic about the future of this land and the importance of its development to Wallaroo and the broader region," a council spokesperson said.

"A mixed-use development stands to provide significant new housing and lifestyle living, and complement the Wallaroo town centre and council's long-term plans for the redevelopment of the foreshore."

Gates open for field days

THOUSANDS of people began pouring through the gates at the Yorke Peninsula Field Days site near Paskeville this morning.

The biennial event, running from Tuesday, September 30, to Thursday, October 2, features more than 500 exhibitors along with a range of free activities, events and displays for all ages.

The YP Field Days is not only one of the region's largest events but also Australia's oldest field days, dating back to trials held near Bute in 1895.

This year's event is expected to inject between \$5 million and \$8 million into the local economy through spending on accommodation, food, fuel, exhibitor site fees and other services. Attendance could reach up to 30,000 visitors over the three days.

Copper Coast Council chief executive Dylan Strong said the field days were nationally significant and a huge drawcard for the area.

"The YP Field Days showcase the innovation and strength of our farming community, and deliver a major boost to local tourism and hospitality, with places like Wallaroo Holiday Park fully booked," he said.

"In a period when uncontrollable events like the algal bloom or drought affect our industries and communities, it is fantastic to see the community buzzing with excitement and the associated uptick in the local economy."

YPFD president Greg Stevens said, in addition to sales by exhibitors and spending with local providers of food, accommodation and other goods and

services, the event was a unique opportunity for local sporting clubs and other community groups to raise money.

Among those groups is Paskeville Sporting Bodies, representing the local football, netball, basketball, tennis and bowling clubs

PSB operates three canteens at the field days and offers evening meals and caravan and camping sites for four nights this week at its community centre in the Paskeville township.

"The money goes towards things such as town maintenance, sporting facility upgrades and reduced sporting club fees and memberships," PSB president Marty Daniel said.

"Between 1500 and 2000 hours of volunteer work goes into this from our awesome community members, and it's great to see such a tangible effect on not just the Paskeville community, but the YP community, from this event."

Other local groups involved at the field days include the Lions Clubs of Wallaroo and Kadina, Clinton Centre Uniting Church, Stansbury Community Centre, Moonta Football Club, and the Wallaroo Football and Netball Clubs. Making their field days debut this year are the Port Hughes Bowling Club and Futures Church Copper Coast.

The field days were officially opened this afternoon by Member for Grey Tom Venning, who highlighted his commitment to supporting regional industries and reducing the cost of doing business in regional Australia.

"Everyone on the planet needs a farmer," he said.

"You need a farmer every day, three times a day, for breakfast lunch and dinner."

Four arrested, stolen Audi recovered

30-year-old Yorke Peninsula man has been bailed to appear in court in October after being arrested during an investigation into a stolen car in Adelaide's southern sub-

AFTER the busiest winter in three years, the South Australian SES is encouraging residents to protect their property against expected spring storms.

"This winter saw SES volunteers attend over 2800 requests for assistance across the state," SES Acting Chief Officer Kristy Phelps

"This is an almost 40 per cent increase compared to last year with fallen trees and severe weather impacts accounting for most of our work.

"However, spring often delivers severe and unpredictable storms and damaging winds, and last year we received almost 1700 calls from the public for assistance, so the risks still remain high."

Ms Phelps encouraged everyone to take some simple steps to prepare their homes and protect their families.

"When the weather is good, take the opportunity to get outside and trim trees and branches that could fall onto your home, and clean your gutters, downpipes and drains,"

"Have a look at your roof and if needed, get a specialist in to repair any roof damage such as broken or missing tiles that could cause water to get inside your house.

"Spring is also a good time to check your home insurance policy is up to date and will cover any new home additions or purchases you may have made over the past 12 months."

Ms Phelps also encouraged South Australians to download the Alert SA app and a weather app to their mobile phones, so they could be across any impending local weather issues.

"If you are aware of an impending storm or strong winds, secure loose items around your backyard such as trampolines and outdoor


furniture, trim trees and branches that could fall onto your home, don't park your vehicles under trees, and consider your pets," she said.

AMID discussions about the impact of short-stay accommodation on long-term rental availability, a Copper Coast renter has shared how his family came close to leaving the region after eight years.

Leon and Felicity Schulz, with children Ari and Olive, recently moved from a government employee rental into a private rental, but not without difficulty.

"It was a bit scary because there were so few properties available — we applied for five because there were only five in the whole of Copper Coast," Mr Schulz said.

"We were in the mindset that we were going to have to move into an Airbnb, put all of our stuff in storage and put our pets into a cattery while we continued to look for a longer-term rental.

"The alternative was to move to Adelaide, which was a real possibility, but we really wanted

our kids to remain in their schools — they're doing well and we didn't want to upset that."

A state parliamentary inquiry recently found the short-stay sector has contributed to the rental crisis.

Mr Schulz said, while his family had used and recognised the convenience of holiday rentals, he related to the inquiry's findings.

"Across the road from our last rental was an Airbnb and it was vacant for most of the year," he said.

"It was a little bit heartbreaking — knowing we had to move out of our place and there was another place just across the road which would've been perfect."

The inquiry recommended tax incentives or one-off grants to encourage owners to transition vacant properties to the longterm rental market.

"You drive through the (Wallaroo) marina and you look around at the amount of houses that don't have any lights on," Mr Schulz said.

"I suspect it's the way that tax

Housing organisations speak out

ABOUT 6000 South Australians are homeless each night, while the state's public housing waitlist sits at around 16,000, Anti-Poverty Network SA said in its submission to the short-stay accommodation inquiry.

Uniting Communities said nearly 84,000 dwellings were unoccupied in SA on the 2021 census night, arguing the impact of all vacant properties — not just short-stay accommodation

The Schulz family has lived on the Copper Coast for nearly a decade but hasn't been able to buy a home due to relying on a single income.

"For my parents' generation that (single income) was pretty much the norm and they were able to afford to buy properties, but my generation you need two," Mr Schulz said.

Fight for power outage justice

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis has urged the state government to reconsider its response to Yorke Peninsula's prolonged power and telecommunications outage on 14 March.

Mr Ellis wrote to Premier Peter Malinauskas following the Optus outage on September 18 which blocked emergency calls and has been linked to three deaths - noting the government's stronger stance in that case.

He reminded the premier that during the March blackout, extended power loss also shut down phone towers, leaving residents unable to make emergency calls.

"According to Telstra, we saw a cumulative loss of mains power to 66 network sites over approximately 20 hours, which — like the Optus situation — left my constituents in potentially life-threatening peril," Mr Ellis wrote.

"Disappointingly, we barely received an acknowledgement from government."

He called on the government to revisit its response to the March outage, saying a more robust reaction would be consistent with its response to the Optus incident.

In March, Energy Minister Tom Koutsantonis told parliament that neither ElectraNet nor SA Power Networks were required to compensate Yorke Peninsula customers for the outage.

A Regional Development Australia Yorke and Mid North survey found YP businesses reported more than \$1.06 million in losses and expenses due to outages in the 12 months to March 2025.

Last month, Mr Ellis introduced a private member's bill to improve compensation for households and businesses affected by extended outages.

Plan ahead for summer outages

SA Power Networks is urging South Australians to prepare for potential power outages this summer.

The call follows a 20-plus-hours outage on Yorke Peninsula in March, caused by dust and salt build-up on insulators during prolonged dry weather, according to ElectraNet.

SAPN external affairs manager Cecilia Schutz said extreme weather and fire safety measures can disrupt supply.

"From September to May, strong winds, lightning and heatwaves can affect the network. When combined with high bushfire risk, we must be especially vigilant in operating the network safely," she said.

'We don't want customers caught off guard when these conditions arise."

Ms Schutz encouraged residents to prepare a power outage plan — including what to do if water pumps, garage doors or mobile phones lose mains power — by visiting poweroutageplan.com.au

People are also urged to sign up for outage alerts at pamp.apps.sapowernetworks.com.au, monitor fire danger conditions, and share plans with family, friends, neighbours and colleagues.

The advice follows Australia's first National Climate Risk Assessment, which found the country's energy infrastructure is increasingly vulnerable to climate change.

A PEFORMING arts program for First Nations young people on Guuranda is in the works.

Wayaga Performing Arts (wayaga meaning shooting star) is the vision of Nharangga, Kaurna and Ngadjuri woman Nikki Ashby-Sansbury, who has over 35 years' experience in cultural dance theatre and contemporary dance.

Ms Ashby-Sansbury said Wayaga, to be based at Port Victoria, would give participants the opportunity to explore their creative talents, celebrate their culture and discover career pathways in the arts.

"I'm thinking of performing arts, but there's also going to be other branches to come out of that - such as arts administration, event coordination, stage management, sound engineering, production design," she said.

"It's important because when I was a young aspiring artist, I didn't have these kinds of pathways available to me.

"I knew I wanted to pursue a career in the arts, but there were no real openings for that to

develop into more of a training unless I was to go over to Sydney and train at NAISDA or Redfern.

"It was a lot, being young and being away from home."

Since moving to Yorke Peninsula, where her father grew up in Point Pearce, Ms Ashby-Sansbury has been eager to offer her skills, work alongside Elders and young leaders, and give back "on Country and for community".

She said while growing up she was mentored by her Uncle Stephen Goldsmith and Aunty Lillian Sansbury, who were a "wealth of knowledge" about language, song and dance.

"It gives you another sense of self and belonging and feeling strong when you are going out in the world, because you do know where you belong and you do know that you're connected to something bigger culturally," Ms Ashby-Sansbury said.

"Arts for me has provided so much more than just the training itself, it's social development, identity, being a leader, being able to speak in public."

Ms Ashby-Sansbury said she hoped to launch Wayaga in the January school holidays, dependent on funding.

Roads and health on the agenda for Narungga

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis has released a document titled Narungga Needs, outlining a series of regional priorities as the March 2026 state election approaches.

This included food, water, blankets, hygiene items, cleaning products and pet food, from the Largs Bay community.


"We do a drive every year and we were looking for somewhere else (to donate to)," Largs Bay RSL president Paul Whelan said.

Freemasons help Wallaroo trishaws to ride further

WALLAROO Community Development Association's Cycling Without Age project has bought a second electric trishaw and trailer to expand its popular community program, thanks to a \$34,682 donation from Freemasons South Australia and Northern

The donation was formally presented at Star of the Sea Home for the Aged in Wallaroo on September 22, with support from members of the Duke of Edinburgh Lodge, based in Moonta, who had requested the funding.

Cycling Without Age provides free trishaw rides for older residents, people living with disability, and families on respite.

The experience offers fresh air, gentle exercise and social connection, while trained volunteer "pilots" pedal the threewheeled cycles through local streets and foreshore paths.

Over the past two years the number of participants has doubled, and in the past 12 months the volunteer base has grown from six to 13 accredited riders.

The new Extreme Hub trishaw is designed to carry a 240kg load, addressing restrictions of the existing machine, which is limited to 190kg.

The upgrade will allow two passengers to ride to-

gether comfortably and safely, whether that be friends, carers or family members.

"Together, the two trishaws will increase the capacity of the program, enabling more outings and the ability to support community events across the Copper Coast," organiser Leona Clarke said.

"The rides are more than just transport," Ms Clarke said.

"They create a space for storytelling, companionship and wellbeing, particularly for people who may otherwise be

socially isolated."

Freemasons SA & and NT representative Bill Merrill said the donation was an example of that organisation's commitment to strengthening regional communities.

"Cycling Without Age captures the values of connection and inclusion," he said.

"By helping provide a second trishaw, we are ensuring that more people in Wallaroo can enjoy the health and lifestyle benefits of cycling, regardless of age or ability."

With support from the Copper Coast Council, the group's first trishaw will be based at Wallaroo Holiday Park. It will be available for Apex Retreat guests — families experiencing cancer — as well as people with disability, tourists and community cele-

"As well as showcasing students" talents, events such as the Golden Ticket also demonstrate the strong sense of community that makes our school so special.



Wayne strikes gold up north

Tiddy Widdy Beach resident Wayne Barrie has returned from a successful trip to Brisbane, bringing home six medals from the recent Oceania Athletics Championships.

Held from September 6 to 10, the championships saw Barrie compete in the 70-74 age group, where he claimed two gold, three silver and one bronze medal.

While he enjoys the thrill of competition, Barrie says it is the interactions he values most.

"I do it for the people you meet, you make some great lifelong friends from all over at these

The event attracted competitors from countries from across the Oceania region, excluding Hawaii and Asia, with 22 nations and more than 700 athletes taking

Barrie competed for Team Australia, representing his country on the international stage.

He held his own across a range of events, placing in the top three in six.

Barrie claimed gold in the 70-74 pole vault, clearing 1.80 metres to take first place. He also won the 80-metre hurdles, finishing in 18.7 seconds.

His strong form continued in the high jump and long jump,

where he secured individual silver medals.

Barrie also added another silver medal in the 4 x 100m relay, competing as part of a composite team featuring athletes from three different countries — Sunia Ravitava (Fiji), David Lobb and Paul Allsworth (both from the Cook Islands) and Barrie (Australia).

A bronze medal in the 300m hurdles rounded out his successful week in Brisbane.

Barrie now turns his focus to the Australian Masters Games in Canberra, October 18-25, before preparing for an even bigger stage - the 2026 World Masters Athletics Championships in South Korea.

Moss, who also spent time in defence, added his name to the goal-kickers' list.

Harris - who finished run-

ner-up in Prince Alfred College's best and fairest award this season and combined his school football with defensive duties for the Woodville-West Torrens Eagles U18s - described the chance to play on Adelaide Oval as "a surreal experience, despite the weather".

Franz, who played his junior football alongside Harris at the Kadina Bloodhounds before relocating to Adelaide, spent the 2025 season with Sacred Heart College's First XVIII and Glenelg's U18s.

Moss is the younger brother of James Moss, one of the region's most gifted sportspeople, known for his cricket with Stansbury and football with the CMS Crows.

Like his brother, Charlie has played for both Central District and Willaston in the Barossa, Light and Gawler Football League, as well as turning out in the tri-colours for the CMS Crows.

Following the Futures match and performances throughout the 2025 season, Tony Bamford and the SANFL Pathways team will select an academy squad.

This group will receive specialist training in the lead-up to the 2026 AFL National Championships -

A look back at past premiers

In the final article of Peter Argent's All the Fives retrospective — highlighting Yorke Peninsula's A grade football premiers over the past five decades — this week's spotlight is on 2015, when Paskeville claimed backto-back titles.

YPFL 2015 — Paskeville

Paskeville secured back-to-back premierships in 2015, following their win over the CMS Crows the previous year.



Port Adelaide's AFLW finals hopes are hanging by a thread after a dramatic loss to St Kilda at Moorabbin Oval on Sunday, September 28.

The Power looked in control early, kicking four unanswered goals in the first quarter to lead by 24 points at the first break. But what followed was one of the most extraordinary turnarounds in AFLW history.

Trailing by 27 points at the final change, St Kilda stormed home, kicking five goals to none in the last quarter to seal an 11point win, 8.5 (53) to 6.6 (42).

Key forward Jesse Wardlaw led the comeback, kicking three final-quarter goals to turn the match on its head.

Edithburgh's Shineah Goody was among Port Adelaide's best. The midfielder was a standout defensively, finishing with 12 disposals (10 kicks), 12 tackles (a game high), four clearances, and 282 metres gained.

Goody played 73 per cent of the match, showing her twoway impact in a fast-paced, high-pressure contest.

Port Adelaide will host the Western Bulldogs at Alberton Oval this Saturday evening in a must-win clash to keep their AFLW finals hopes alive.

Adelaide and Sydney delivered an AFLW classic at Unley Oval with the Crows narrowly holding on for a two-point win, 6.5 (41) to 6.3 (39), also on

The sides had previously met in a 2023 semifinal, but this was their first-ever home-and-away clash

Scores were level at quarter time before the Swans edged ahead by five points at the main break.

The lead then swung Adelaide's way after Anne Hatchard slotted a classy set shot after the three-quarter time siren, giving the Crows a six-point buffer heading into the final term.

Early in the last quarter, Eloise "EJ" Jones added a behind, followed by a rushed Sydney point. Then, with eight minutes remaining, Chloe Molloy brought the Swans back within a goal.

What followed was five min-

utes of scoreless, high-pressure football, as Adelaide held firm to secure the win in front of a lively home crowd.

Ebony Marinoff, celebrating her 100th AFLW match, was instrumental alongside Niamh Kelly, with both named among Adelaide's best in the pulsating finish.

Port Vincent's Chelsea Biddell was steady in defence, contributing nine disposals (five kicks, four handballs), one mark, one tackle and a clearance.

She played 92 per cent game time and logged 182 metres gained, providing a consistent presence across half-back.

The Crows head to Princes Park in Melbourne this Sunday afternoon to face Richmond, which sits at the bottom of the ladder. Adelaide will be aiming for its sixth win of the season and a chance to further solidify its top-four position.

AFL Grand Final

Before a packed house of 100,022 at the MCG, the Brisbane Lions stormed home in the second half to claim their fifth AFL premiership this century, and a back-to-back title, defeating Geelong by 47 points, 18.14 (122) to 11.9 (75).

With the scores level at halftime — for the first time in an AFL/VFL Grand Final since 1909 — the match was finely balanced. But Brisbane's third-quarter surge turned the tide.

In a strategic coaching move, Chris Fagan brought South Australian country product and co-captain Lachie Neale onto the ground early in the third term.

Neale's presence helped shift the momentum in Brisbane's fa-

The Lions hit the front 18 minutes and 17 seconds into the quarter after a behind from Kai Lohmann, before piling on three crucial goals — two from Charlie Cameron and one from Neale to take a 19-point lead at the final break.

Brisbane dominated the final quarter, adding nine goals to put the result beyond doubt.

While the Lions conceded a few late, they had already put their stamp on the 2025 decider.

It was a commanding and composed performance from a club now firmly etched in modern AFL history.





Take care with spring spraying

SPRING is peak spraying time on many farms, and producers are being urged to take extra care to prevent herbicide drift.

PIRSA is reminding growers to follow best practice for spray application.

This includes monitoring weather conditions, adjusting equipment settings, selecting the right chemicals, and using spray technology designed to reduce drift.

Growers are also encouraged to stay up to date with regulatory requirements and always follow label instructions.

PIRSA Biosecurity rural chemical operations manager Michael McManus said inspectors would be visiting regions during the season to conduct chemical use surveillance and on-farm compliance checks.

Penalties for failing to follow mandatory label instructions can be as high as \$35,000 after a successful prosecution.

"We remind all farmers to think twice before spraying — your diligence protects

He said even small amounts of drift could damage sensitive crops such as grapevines at bud burst and pose health risks to nearby

Chemicals should never be applied in unsuitable conditions, particularly during hazardous inversions that often occur at night.

"Poor application, such as spraying in the wrong weather conditions, can harm crops, native vegetation and communities, and cause significant financial losses for farmers.

"During this busy spraying season in South Australia, it's more important than ever to plan carefully, use the right techniques and monitor weather closely," he said.

Innovation delivering wins for Australian agriculture

A NEW report has found that for every dollar invested by Australia's rural research and development corporations, almost \$8 is returned to primary producers over 10 years.

The inaugural Collective Research and Innovation Outcomes 2024 report, prepared by the Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics and Sciences, examined the contributions of all 15 RDCs across research, development, extension, adoption and commercialisation.

Council of Rural RDCs chair Troy Setter said the report focused on government priority areas including climate and sustainability, biosecurity, trade, First Nations engagement, workforce and digital innovation.

Tackling climate and sustainability

Since 2022, there have been 320 projects worth \$384 million, many targeting emissions reduction.

Focus areas include reducing

methane from livestock, cutting fertiliser-related nitrous oxide emissions, improving energy efficiency, and developing renewable energy and natural capital initiatives

The Grains Research and Development Corporation has \$150 million in co-investments with research partners, including a new \$38M project to help growers monitor, manage and report on-farm greenhouse gas emissions.

The RDCs are also supporting recycling and re-use initiatives to reduce waste and strengthen circular economy practices.

World-first weather system

One highlight is the Weather and Networked Data system, developed by the Cotton RDC and GRDC in partnership with Goanna Ag.

The network of more than 100 automatic weather stations across Oueensland and New South Wales provides real-time data to growers and spray operators

about hazardous temperature inversions.

"Before WAND, there was no way to distinguish a hazardous inversion from a non-hazardous inversion," Mr Setter said.

Biosecurity innovation

The report emphasises the crucial role of biosecurity in protecting Australia's \$75.6 billion agricultural, fisheries and forestry exports.

About 70 per cent of production is exported each year.

Farmers currently spend \$3.8B annually on vertebrate pest control and lose \$1.5B to weeds.

RDCs are investing in advanced surveillance, diagnostics and forecasting systems to manage these threats and maintain Australia's clean reputation in global mar-

The GRDC's \$26.7M investment in the National Grains Diagnostic and Surveillance Initiative will expand diagnostic capacity, employ more biosecurity specialists and modernise pest de-

Digital innovation in meat processing

The Australian Meat Processor Corporation, and Meat and Livestock Australia are leading the LEAP4Beef program, which is developing the world's first fully automated beef boning system.

A pre-production demonstration of a striploin cutting module will be held in 2025 at JBS Australia's Brooklyn facility in Victoria.

The program builds on earlier success in lamb automation and aims to deliver large-scale, high-throughput precision processing.

Training for the wool industry

Australian Wool Innovation has delivered a shearer and wool handler training program, estimated to have generated a benefit-cost ratio of \$6.05.

For every \$1 invested, the return was more than \$6, with net benefits of \$14.7M.



AFL's biggest day

IT IS one of my favourite days of each year, AFL Grand Final Day, and it did not disappoint in 2025.

Geelong Cats and Brisbane Lions contested the AFL's biggest prize, the 2025 Toyota AFL Premiership Cup, at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, on Saturday, September 27.

The game was exciting. With scores level at halftime, it appeared the season — which had plenty of twists and turns — was going to have a fitting end.

Heading into the match, Geelong was viewed as heavy favourite, having defeated Brisbane just three previously ago to the tune of 38 points.

(Ashcroft was drafted under the AFL's father-son rule. His father, Marcus Ashcroft, played for Brisbane from 1989 to 2003.)

The MCG was packed, with 100,022 people filling the biggest stadium in Australia for Australian football's biggest day of the season.

While the match delivered on-field drama, the biggest moment of the day may have happened before the first hounce

As part of the AFL's annual pre-game



entertainment, American rapper Snoop Dogg took to the stage to warm up the crowd.

Despite recent media controversy, Snoop Dogg impressed many fans with an energetic 15-minute set, bringing along three Australian music stars - Jessica Mauboy, Baker Boy and guitarist Tash Sultana – to join him on stage.

The Lions partied on well into the night and early morning, as did Snoop Dogg, as it turns out.

He flew to Sydney after his grand final show, to DJ another show in the early hours of the morning, making his Australia trip well worth it.







Wallaroo: Some minor repairs have been happening at the jetty but access for a fish or stroll is good. A relatively small grain ship docked for a couple of days last week as fishers picked up snook and the odd squid. The arrival of the school holidays saw an increase in boat ramp traffic as crews launched for King George whiting, squid and red mullet.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Slightly improved on-water weather conditions arrived late in the week with around midday on Sunday proving to be extra special as winds became variable and the tides were good. Boat crews ran out for whiting, squid and small garfish, while the jetty-based fishers tried long and hard for gar and squid.

Port Victoria/Balgowan: The deep water drops off Wardang Island and Balgowan continue to provide KG whiting to 38cm, red mullet, flathead and small snapper — which cannot be kept as the ban remains in place.

The Port Vic jetty has the odd squid and

Point Turton/Corny Point: Boat crews fishing on the drift inside Hardwicke Bay (north) picked up a couple of whiting during the week as early morning high tides saw small schools of fish feeding across the sandy bottom. KG whiting are also out from Point Souttar and Corny Point. The jetty has a few salmon trout at dusk and small squid

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Holiday visitor traffic is steady although perhaps not as much as previous years as fishers in big boats cruise out to the deep, cleaner waters for red nannygai, kingfish, Samson fish and sweep. Flathead and the odd, large KG whiting are around the unaffected inshore waters at Marion Bay, although not in large schools. Shore-based fishing has salmon (2kg) coming from the Dust Bowl and Richards Beach. Jetty-based fishing has been hit and miss, but there was an unconfirmed report of tommy ruffs (Australian herring) at Stenhouse Bay over the weekend.

Mitch takes to the MCG

Mitchell Harris, from Kadina, was one of six South Australians selected in Team Boak for the 2025 AFL National Under 17 Futures boys' showcase on the morning of the AFL grand final - the biggest day on the Australian football calendar.

At the iconic Melbourne Cricket Ground, Harris helped his side to a spirited 13-point win, lifting the Kevin Sheehan Cup after a fast-paced and entertaining contest.

Team Boak edged out Team Docherty with a late surge, kicking three of the final four goals to finish 14.5 (89) to 11.10 (76).

The final margin was the largest lead of the match, reflecting how tightly contested the game was throughout.

After the match, Harris described the experience as one he would always remember.

"It was an unreal experience," he told the YP Country Times. "It was a pretty special day to be involved in and a day I won't forget in a hurry."

The game marked Harris's first time on the MCG during a major event.

"This was my first trip to the MCG on a game day — I'd only

been once before, to the museum, when I was very young."

Harris arrived in Melbourne on Friday morning and trained with the team at Essendon's Hangar facility. There, they took part in a captain's run and team meetings ahead of the match.

Harris said a highlight of the trip was an evening session with Travis Boak where the former Port Adelaide captain shared his drafting journey and offered insights into professional football.

"It was a bit of an audience with him," Harris recalled.

"He spoke about how he was drafted and his journey since then."

Reflecting on his individual performance, Harris said it took him a little while to settle into the game.

"I felt I was quiet in the first (quarter), but in the second half I found a bit of the ball," he said.

Holding the Sheehan Cup post-match was a proud moment.

"The win - and holding the Sheehan Cup — was a cherry on top," he said, adding that the group returned to the stands to watch the AFL Grand Final later that afternoon.

The Futures match showcased many of the most promising U17 players in the country.

All participants were born in 2008 and will be eligible for selection in the 2026 Telstra AFL Draft.

Harris, currently in year 11 at Prince Alfred College, has spent 2025 playing both First XVIII football for his school and U18s for Woodville-West Torrens.
