### New stage for childcare project

YORKE Peninsula Council is seeking a builder and operator for its planned Southern Yorke Peninsula Community Childcare Centre.

Council has called for tenders for the construction of the facility at 11 North Terrace, Minlaton. In a separate process, YPC will seek expres-

In a separate process, YPC will seek expressions of interest from service providers wishing to operate the childcare centre, projected to be

open for enrolment in early 2024.

The project will include the construction of a new 730 square metre centre, carpark, external service yard, landscaping, septic soakage area, stormwater management as well as the demolition of the old tennis courts and clubrooms.

Council received \$2.25 million from the federal government's Black Summer Bushfire Recovery program for the project.

With an expected requirement of about 20 full-time equivalent employees, it is anticipated

the childcare centre will have the capacity for 80 long-day care places for children aged 0 to 5.

The SYP Childcare Feasibility Group has been driving the need for a centre for several years, with two community surveys revealing more than 220 local children were unable to access formal care.

A spokesperson for the group said with the cost of living rising and workforce shortages, child care services were needed more than ever.

"We are thrilled the project is progressing and are excited to see the next stages actioned," the spokesperson said.

"We are working hard to ensure this service is established for the benefit of the whole community.

"To have an outcome like this within two years is a great result and we thank council for its proactive approach."

Swanbury Penglase, Lucid Consulting, PT Design and Rider Levett Bucknall were announced in June as having been appointed to various roles in the project such as the architecture, engineering services and cost management.

### **Building on childcare**

IT'S a big week in child care on the peninsula.

Yorke Peninsula Council's \$2.25 million Southern Yorke Peninsula Community Childcare Centre has reached another milestone — heading out for tender for construction and operators.

It is remarkable how much has been achieved in just two years.

The SYP Childcare Feasibility Group consulted the community twice to gauge what the need was.

Those results were astounding and have been backed up by national statistics in recent months.

Of the 175 families who completed the survey, only 32 per cent were able to access formal childcare options on SYP.

About half stated they relied solely on friends and family to provide child care and 18 per cent stated they had no access to any form of child care.

Copper Coast and Barunga West Councils are not without their childcare problems as well, and we're seeing more

consultation happening in these areas too. The appointment of contractors will be

decided by the new council, but the centre could be open by the start of 2024. YPC is also calling for operators for the

Every time we've done an article about childcare waiting lists, some of the feedback we receive is that it's not an issue with numbers at the centre, but a lack of

Like many industries, it can be difficult to attract qualified individuals to roles.

Recent projections show the childcare sector needs an additional 40,000 staff across the country by 2023 to meet demand.

Improvements to conditions are a key component of attracting and retaining staff, the United Workers Union has said.

They deserve to be compensated accordingly, with more funding from federal and state governments so increases do not impact those already struggling with the cost of living.

### Welcomed sight as sign is scrapped

WAKEFIELD Regional Council has passed a motion to demolish and remove the old and dilapidated "welcome to the Yorke Peninsula" roadside sign and information bay in Port Wakefield.

Port Wakefield residents, Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis and neighbouring councils have queried the information bay's future given its current condition and location.

The sign was built by the now defunct Southern Yorke Peninsula Tourism Board more than 30 years ago and discussions between nearby councils about potential removal were last had in 2016.

"We're keen to look at partnership opportunities with the SA Tourism Commission and councils to the north and west of Port Wakefield to develop that sense of arrival and departure at the old Tucker Time site, which is being redeveloped as part of the highway duplication project and may provide the perfect opportunity for tourism information," Wakefield Regional Council CEO Andrew MacDonald said.

"It would be great to collaborate with other councils to promote and highlight the best parts of our regions - as well as our own, including the town of Port Wakefield itself.

"Port Wakefield has an incredibly rich history and its tourism potential is enormous, both in terms of drawing travellers off the highway to spend some time exploring this town of state heritage significance, for day trippers from Adelaide and for those venturing further afield."

It is estimated the cost of demolishing the sign and removing the materials will cost about \$3000.

According to the Department for Infrastructure and Transport, 8000 vehicles travel through Port Wakefield per day, growing to 16,000 during peak holiday periods.

"The state and federal government's investment in the Port Wakefield overpass and lane duplication project, and Wakefield Regional Council's decision to remove the existing YP tourism information board as part of their town's masterplan, I feel presents a great opportunity for a new reinvigorated, purposebuilt tourism information gateway and precinct to the Barunga, Copper Coast and Yorke Peninsula (Council) regions," Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said.

"In recent weeks I have therefore sought letters of support from the Regional Development Board, the three district councils and Yorke Peninsula Tourism so we can collec-

tively approach the SA Tourism Commission for funding.

"A new tourism site in the town would present the YP with a prime

opportunity to promote and encourage those travellers who choose to stop, to detour and visit our region, providing a much-needed boost to

### State opposition calls for jetty support

THE state opposition has called for the release of a strategic plan to tackle issues with the state's regional jetties.

A draft SA Jetties Strategic Plan was developed by the former Liberal government following community and stakeholder consultation.

South Australian jetties are owned by the state government with approximately half leased to local councils for upkeep.

All of Yorke Peninsula Council's leased jetties have agreements in place until at least 2048 while the Port Hughes jetty in the Copper Coast

Council won't expire until 2099.

Shadow Minister for Local Government and Regional Population Growth Sam Telfer said the current government had made no progress apart from an upgrade to a metropolitan boat ramp.

"Jetties are a crucial part of our regional tourism offering bringing in visitor dollars but, more than that, our jetties are an important connection to history and community identity across the state," he said.

"That's why the former Liberal government injected \$40 million into jetty upgrades and other marine infrastructure to secure these iconic structures to be enjoyed by both

regional communities and tourists.

"Regional councils and communities cannot afford the huge expenditure which will be necessary to maintain these jetties for the long-term, so we need the Malinauskas Labor government to lead the process so we don't lose valuable and historical pieces of community infrastructure."

Ardrossan resident and keen fisherman Bruce Westley said the town's jetty was so important, he didn't know where they'd be without it.

"On long weekends and basically every weekend during summer, the jetty is absolutely packed, and these are people who bring a bit of money into the town and support local busi-

"I guess the fear is if they don't catch anything here, they aren't going to keep coming."

Mr Westley said there were probably a few areas on the jetty which needed upgrading and support.

"They've (YPC) replaced a few pylons and if you look over the side there are a few places where there are parts of the jetty which are submerged and floating down there," he

"That said, I find it quite safe and I don't have a problem with going up the jetty at all."


Yorke Peninsula Council CEO Andrew Cameron said they had 12

leases for state-owned jetties which required various levels of repair and maintenance council couldn't afford.

"Council has therefore worked with successive state governments in an attempt to have this important work prioritised for these state jetties, which are vital assets for our coastal communities," he said.

"Council appreciates the continued push for action on our jetties at a state level and looks forward to the release of the SA Jetties Strategic Plan, hopefully in the near future.

"Council will continue working to improve the region's jetties for the benefit of residents, visitors and the wider community."

### Early education workers to walk off the job

EARLY education workers are walking off the job tomorrow (Wednesday, September 7), in a nationwide strike on a day usually set aside to celebrate Early Childhood Educators Day.

Current and former educators have revealed they are leaving the sector at record levels because of excessive workloads, burnout and low pay.

In contrast, projections show the sector needs 40,000 additional staff by 2023 to meet growing demand for early learning services.

Community Kids Kadina Early Education Centre manager Jodi Panozzo said they supported the action but wouldn't be closing the centre.

"We have too many families who rely on us — we understand that's the impact the union wants but don't feel it's the best outcome for our families and community," she said.

"Families have too much pressure to work at the moment with staff shortages in many sectors, we don't want to add to that pressure.

'We have sent out an email to our families asking for their support by emailing our MP."

Kadina Child Care Centre is also staying open for the sake of its families but fully backed the strike action and also encouraged people to email their local member.

Director Caren Hammerstein and assistant director Vicky Taylor said early childhood educators deserved better.

"We're lucky here to be able to fulfil our staffing positions but right across the country people are leaving the sector in droves," they said.

"We don't just babysit children as some people allude to - every child has observations written, goals, enhancing learning experiences and we also document everything and follow the standards for the sector.

"Early educators are qualified professionals and deserve adequate pay which reflects that, their roles and their responsibilities.

"Our sector is in crisis and we need to consider how we attract anyone new if there are no benefits.

"With a new centre on the horizon we need to be able to attract more employees.

"Early education and care shape every child's future and lay the foundation for development and learning — it is important work — our staff are passionate, hardworking people and the industry and pay should

### **Educators are at breaking point**

UNITED Workers Union early education director Helen Gibbons said the message from early educators across the country was clear — they are at breaking point.

"There is no early childhood sector without early educators and they simply can't afford to stay and hold it together anymore," she said.

"The pandemic has exacerbated an existing problem, with job vacancies close to doubling compared with pre-Covid lev-

"High workload because of increased understaffing is pushing more and more educators out of the sector.

"Services are already reporting having

to cap new enrolments.

"Without urgent action, this crisis will spiral out of control and children and families will miss out, losing access to crucial early learning services."

Ms Gibbons said the only way to fix the crisis was to fix educators' wages and conditions.

"The federal government is currently considering a workforce strategy for early education," she said.

"This is the opportunity for the government to provide a real solution for the sector by delivering a workforce strategy that provides targeted funding to improve

### **United Workers Union early** education report found:

- 70 per cent of educators surveyed said they 'always' or 'often' worry about their financial situation
- 81 per cent of centre directors say they have had difficulties attracting and recruiting staff
- 92 per cent of educators stated 'under-the-roof' ratios compromise the safety and wellbeing of children
- 65 per cent of educators report their services are already understaffed, and providers are reporting having to cap new enrolments because they can't find enough staff
- 82 per cent of current educators say in the past month they 'always' or 'often' felt rushed when performing key caring and/or educational tasks
- More than 75 per cent of educators strongly agree turnover negatively impacts how children learn and develop as well as their emotional wellbeing more broadly
- Almost half of educators surveyed would not recommend ECEC as a career

### Isolation rules easing across the country

MANDATORY mask wearing on domestic flights and sevenday isolation will be scrapped as Covid-19 restrictions ease across the country.

Following a cabinet meeting last week, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said the requirements would be ditched from this Friday, September 9.

Mandatory isolation will be reduced from seven days to five for people with no symptoms, allowing people to return to work sooner with precautions.

However, the seven-day period will remain for workers in high-risk settings including aged and disability care.

Premier Peter Malinauskas said the rules would be reassessed on September 30.

"There are a range of options available to us, we could go down in the number of (isolation) days, they could be abolished altogether, it really depends on the circumstances," he said.

"We are graduating to a new phase of the pandemic, vaccination levels continue to go up ... as that continues to go up it provides more options to the national cabinet in making these decisions."

Mr Malinauskas said he would assess the current restrictions around mask wearing on public transport in coming days.

"The days of mask mandates are numbered, I certainly fit in the category of again wanting people to make decisions and using their own wit and capacity rather than the state telling them

what to do," he said.

Rural Doctors Association of Australia president Dr Megan Belot said it was encouraging to see the government continuing to strive to get the nation 'back to normal', but that further monitoring was required.

"Unfortunately, it will often fall to employers and their management staff now to take responsibility for this and send anyone home who returns to work prematurely, in an effort to prevent other staff and customers being exposed," Dr Belot said.

"We still have many thousands of Covid cases in the community and the last thing we need is for this to get further out of hand.

"It is possible with this recent change we will see another uplift in cases, particularly in the short A NEW campaign encouraging more people over 30 to get their fourth dose is being rolled out to remind the public fully updated vaccination is the best protection against Covid-19.

A new eligibility checker has also come online to clarify any confusion people may have over their fourth dose.

While tens of thousands of newly eligible South Australians have stepped up to get their updated vaccination, there are calls for even more to roll up their sleeves — and stay out of hospital

Fourth dose reminder rolling out

More than 350,000 Covid fourth doses have been administered to people over 30 this year, with 75 per cent of eligible people over 65 now fully protected.

"The community's interest and support in establishing a childcare facility has been fantastic and council will provide updates as this project moves along.


The shortage of childcare services on southern Yorke Peninsula has long been an issue raised by the community.

### **Wakefield Regional Council** consult on community plans

WAKEFIELD Regional Council is seeking public comment on six community and recreational projects across the region.

The projects — Port Wakefield master plan stage one concept, Ralli Park and Hamley Bridge sporting precinct draft master plans, Blyth sporting precinct, Balaklava Apex Park and Balaklava Railway Corridor draft master plan concepts were identified as priorities in the Wakefield 2030 Community Plan and Annual Community Plan.

"These plans have all had initial stakeholder engagement and we're excited about sharing the opportunities with the broader community," CEO Andrew MacDonald said.

"The Port Wakefield concepts start to bring to life the master plan for the town.

"Port Wakefield has so much to offer and the plans aim to develop features that will benefit the community and lure tourists off the highway to enjoy the town's hidden gems.

"The sporting precinct plans acknowledge the significant role sports play in the Wakefield

region but also seek to enhance facilities for more passive recreation and create spaces the whole community can enjoy."

Mr MacDonald said all feedback would be collated over the coming months and council would consider plans early in 2023, including funding

"While there is a \$1 million budget for Port Wakefield in 2022-23, we would need to seek further grants for future stages of that project and the new council would need to determine the appropriate level of investment in the other projects. These plans are about ensuring we can be spade ready," he said.

"Clearly, a small council like Wakefield cannot fully fund such ambitious plans and it may be necessary for the key stakeholder groups to support financially and help us leverage state and federal funding commitments."

### Two lives lost in fatal crashes

TWO people died in separate into a tree. traffic accidents last week.

Emergency services were called to the Augusta Highway near Snowtown where a Mitsubishi sedan and a truck had crashed just after 12.30pm last Thursday, September 1.

The driver and sole occupant of the Mitsubishi, a 79-year-old local woman, died at the scene.

The truck driver, a 49-year-old man from Munno Para West, received minor injuries and was taken to Snowtown Hospital.

The highway was closed to all traffic between Snowtown and Lochiel for several hours while Major Crash Investigators examined the scene.

A 46-year-old Risdon Park man died after his Toyota station wagon left the Augusta Highway near Lochiel at about 11.30am on Sunday, September 4.

Emergency services were called to the highway at the intersection of Diagonal Road after reports a Toyota station wagon had left the road and crashed

The man, who was the driver and sole occupant of the vehicle, died at the scene.

The Augusta Highway was closed while Major Crash Investigators attended the scene to determine the cause of the

The fatalities take the number of lives lost this year on South Australian roads to 51, compared with 66 at the same time last year.

#### Two drivers caught under the influence

Two people have been caught driving under the influence on Yorke Peninsula.

Copper Coast police stopped a 57-year-old local man for a random driver test at about 10.20pm on Friday, September 2.

He returned a positive blood alcohol test reading of 0.171 and was reported for exceeding the prescribed concentration of alcohol. As a result, he was issued with an immediate 12-month loss of licence and had his car impounded for 28 days.



Police also stopped a 24-yearold man from Balaklava for a random breath test in Paskeville at about 10pm on Saturday, September 3.

He recorded a positive result to drugs and was found to be driving unlicensed and contrary to a driver direction notice which related to drug-driving.

The man may face further penalties once his forensic sample has been analysed.

This is set to redefine child safety responses to ensure legal frameworks are in place which reflect community values and expectations.


Targeted consultation with Aboriginal people and organisations will ensure the legislation helps to implement the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Child Placement Principle.

"This review gives us the opportunity to amplify the voices of those at the centre (of the issue), with one in three South Australian children notified to the child protection system before they are 18," she said.

"We are committed to ensuring South Australian children have the best chance of being raised in an environment they deserve.

The access ramp was scheduled for completion earlier this year but supply chain setbacks forced a delay until late last month.

Council CEO Maree Wauchope said enjoying the water this summer would now be easier.

"The ramp was approved with prams and strollers in mind, as it leads to a shelter which is popular for young families," Ms Wauchope said.

"This improvement to beach access seeks to increase the accessibility, inclusivity and attraction of the popular Port Broughton foreshore and maximise use of the beach. "On a hot day you want to be in

the water, not just looking at it." Ms Wauchope said the material used for the access ramp was a sustainable composite made from recycled and reclaimed plastics, manufactured in Australia.

"The material looks like wood, but it is low maintenance and durable, and designed to withstand high tide conditions," Ms Wauchope said.

"This will provide a long-term and final solution for beach accessibility at Port Broughton."

### Raise the Age petition sends clear message

AUSTRALIANS are calling for the minimum age of criminal responsibility to be lifted to at least 14 years old with the help of nation-wide petition #RaiseTheAge.

The petition is asking politicians to invest in communityled solutions which help children learn from their mistakes, grow and thrive.

The South Australian Government recently accepted a #RaiseTheAge petition signed by 11,923 South Australians just weeks after the Commonwealth Government received a petition signed by more than 200,000 people.

Co-chair of Change the Record and Narungga woman Cheryl Axleby said the petition delivered a clear message from hundreds of thousands of Australians who want to see children looked after in our communities, homes and schools — not sent to prison.

"We thank the Attorney-General and Minister for Indigenous Australians for accepting our petition and for their commitment to Raise The Age," she said.

"We are calling on every state and territory government to heed the medical, legal and

child development experts who have been crystal clear: no child under the age of 14 years old should be arrested, hauled before a court or convicted of a criminal offence."

SACOSS CEO Womersley said the signatures showed South Australians believed more could be done for children across society.

"Rather than detaining young children who might be experiencing challenging times, we need to ensure they and their families can access the necessary support and guidance they need," Mr Womersley said.

"Criminalising young children results in further lifelong trauma and exposes them to learning negative patterns of behaviour, rather than finding pathways that enable them to be happy members of their families and communities.

"Criminalising and institutionalising children only makes them and the broader community less safe, and our society less compassionate.

"Let's have the courage to do the right thing by children and properly invest in early intervention and age-appropriate support services while raising the age of criminal responsibility to at least 14 years."

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# Raising the roof at Richmans

A new stage of work is underway at the Moonta Mines site as part of the National Heritage project being undertaken by the National Trust. Conservation works have commenced on the former Richmans Enginehouse, a wellknown landmark and important part of the Moonta Mines story.

Enginehouses were literally the heart of Cornish mining operations. Within these structures the famous steam-powered beam engines performed a range of tasks including lifting ore, crushing it, or pumping water from the mine. The distinctive style of these buildings can be found around the world wherever Cornish

miners set up their operations. Those in Moonta follow the classic design The works now underway at Richmans will repair and replace the mortars in the stone work, both inside and outside the building, replace the roof and seal the window openings to exclude birds and animals.

Richmans, along with the Hughes Enginehouse, where works have already occurred, provide the two 'book-ends' to the Elder's Line of Lode experience which will be opened to visitors next year.

This is the first time in 30 years that major conservation works have been undertaken on the Moonta Cornish engine houses. With the centenary of the closing of the Moonta Mines approaching in 2023, these works will ensure that the engine houses and the stories about them continue to be preserved and shared. This work has been

made possible with support from the Australian Government.

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### Off-leash proposal for pooches

COPPER Coast Greyhound Owners Group is requesting exclusive use of a Copper Coast dog park.

The group has written to Copper Coast Council, asking for access to a park for a short period of time, maybe once a month, for one or two hours in the afternoon.

Council director development services Muller Mentz said the request was discussed at an informal council gathering in July and then presented at council's August

"The group consists of six dog owners and there is an expectancy the numbers will grow," Mr Mentz said.

"During the discussions, it appeared the proposal was well received by most members pre-

In preparation of the report, contact was made with Dog and Cat Management Board regulatory compliance policy officer Lisa Michalanney.

Greyhounds are subject to strict restrictions in public locations, and must be on-leash at all times, including in a fenced dog park.

"However, under Section 80A of the (Dog and Cat Management) Act, the Board can exempt councils from this requirement, subject to appropriate conditions," Michalanney said.

"Prior to an application being lodged to the Board for exemption from the requirements of the Act, a Notification of Intent to Conduct Greyhound Off-leash Events has to be submitted to the Greyhound Adoption Program SA, which will assist in the planning of any event, management of any risks and stipulating any requirements they may have for any exemption issued by the Board."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said greyhounds and their owners had to abide by specific rules.

"The understanding is the conditions imposed on councils can be quite onerous," she said.

### Group advocating for Greyhounds

COPPER Coast Greyhound Owners Group member Kirsty Woolcock said the creation of the group led to discussions about a specific off-leash time at a local dog park.

"There are some private spaces you can hire but these are long distances from us on the Copper Coast, so we approached council," she said.

"We just want to be able to meet with other owners and their hounds to have a run around.

"There are very strict rules which apply to our dog ownership and we want to be able to enjoy our greyhounds and also adhere to the laws we are bound by.

"We are seeking to have the exclusive use of one of the council's dog parks for just one hour a month.

"Despite how quick these dogs are, they're not marathon runners, they're sprinters.

"We don't need a long time – we have all agreed we are flexible about when this occurs, but have put forward Sunday afternoon as a starting point.

"Greyhound owners on the Copper Coast are happy a committee has been put together to research this matter, it's about gathering more information to make an educated decision for a suitable and safe outcome.'

"One of the conditions of the Board will be that an authorised officer of council be in attendance at any public unleashed event in a

supervisory role to ensure compliance with the terms and conditions as stipulated by the board.

"Council will form a committee

of elected members, council staff and interested greyhound owners to assess what options are available moving forward."

### Have your say on park management

YORKE Peninsula residents are encouraged to have their say on the future management of 12 conservation parks across the region, including Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park.

Department The Environment and Water and the Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park Co-management Board has developed the draft management plan to guide the future direction of parks in the region.

All of the parks are located on central and lower Yorke Peninsula and include Minlacowie, Warrenben and Troubridge Island Conservation Parks

National parks and wildlife service regional manager for the Yorke and Mid North Craig Nixon said Narungga traditional owners, kev stakeholders, technical experts and park managers provided input and guidance on the objectives and strategies outlined in the plan.

### **Central and lower Yorke Peninsula** parks included in draft plan:

Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park Bird Islands Conservation Park Carribie Conservation Park Minlacowie Conservation Pa Ramsay Conservation Park Warrenben Conservation Park Goose Island Conservation Park

Leven Beach Conservation Park Point Davenport Conservation Park Thidna Conservation Park Althorpe Islands Conservation Park Troubridge Island Conservation Park

"This plan builds on the previous management plans and amendments, and incorporates the traditional knowledge, culture, and spirituality of Narungga people, particularly for Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park," he said.

"The parks will be managed to improve the integrity of important ecological communities, to strengthen Narungga culture and heritage and protect important sites, to minimise impacts to the natural ecological processes that support life in the parks, and to enable people to experience the natural, cultural, and heritage aspects of the parks."

Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park co-management board chairperson Doug Milera said it's just as important now as it has been in the past to safeguard, preserve and protect Narungga country.

"This, our traditional place, is sacred and contains our connection and belonging across the land and

"Just as important is preserving the way of life, culture, and history of my people, and allowing for developmental opportunities and economic prosperity for future gen-

"The co-management board is proud to present this draft plan to direct the management of Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park and the 11 conservation parks across Narungga country.

"As co-managers for Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park we continue to care for land and sea in partnership with the Department for Environment and Water.

"We welcome visitors to share these parks with us, to continue to enjoy them, and to look after them together."

# PET PROBLEMS

### Cost of living taking a toll on our furry friends

THE RSPCA has recorded an increase in pets being dumped this year as shelters report they are drowning in animals amid the cost of living crisis.

RSPCA South Australia chief executive Tim Vasudeva acknowledged tough economic times often meant people struggled to provide for their pets properly.

"It is a bit of a tough economic environment," Mr Vasudeva said.

"I think all the rescue groups and welfare groups are similar at the moment, being full of surrendered and stray pets.

"Owning a pet doesn't have to be expensive.

"One of the good things about adopting from the RSPCA or the Animal Welfare League or a good rescue group is they'll come to you health checked, desexed, vaccinated, microchipped ... so all of that work is done."

Seaside Veterinary Surgery, Wallaroo, vet Dr Amanda

Bunney said she was not aware of any instances of pet dumping on Yorke Peninsula yet, but said plenty of people would be concerned about the current cost of

"We are still very busy, with lots of pets still having all their routine preventative health care," Dr Bunney said.

"A lot of our clients have pet insurance; while not cheap, it does help when you suddenly need to spend a large amount on your pet.

"A lot also make use of VetPay and some clients also prepay funds onto their account so when they next come in, they have already paid for their visit, or at least covered part of it already."

Dr Bunney said it was difficult for people when their financial circumstances changed throughout their pet's life.

"They may be in a good financial position when they get the pet, and then something changes and they don't have the funds they had before," she

"Rentals not allowing pets, and the lack of rentals on YP, would be a contributing factor

"I hope South Australia will follow Victoria's lead and pass legislation that allows pets in all

Dr Bunney said people needed to be honest with themselves about what they could afford when planning to get a pet.

"Unfortunately, we do see people spending thousands on a puppy and then not have any funds to pay for vaccinations and desexing — planning is really important," she said.

"Matching the right breed or temperament to the family and household is also essential.

"Brachycephalic breeds are known to have many congenital health issues, but people keep buying them because they are cute, then may not have the funds to, or not want to, fix these issues.

"Animals should never be given as a surprise gift, they are a huge commitment, and should only be taken on with full knowledge and planning."

### **Snakes start slithering**

doors as warmer spring days bring snakes out of their winter sleep.

Department for Environment and Water principal ecologist Dr Karl Hillyard said the increase in sunshine brings snakes out of brumation, looking for food and mates.

"Eastern brown snakes in particular are found everywhere, but each region has its local specialty," Dr Hillyard

"The Adelaide Hills has the red-bellied black snake, the River Murray, Kangaroo Island and South East have the tiger snake, while Eyre and Yorke

Peninsulas, especially near the coast, are known places for death adders.

"Just because you've never seen a snake on your property doesn't mean they aren't there, so you should always be careful about putting your hands or feet into spots you can't see."

Dr Hillyard said snakes were generally shy and would not attack unless provoked.

If you see a snake, you should keep well away and don't try to catch or kill it yourself, Dr Hillyard advised.

"This is when most bites happen," he said.

"If you see a snake inside, watch where it goes, keep children and pets away, then call a licensed snake catcher to remove it.

"If the snake is outside and heading towards bushland or a field, leave it alone.

"Most snakes are not aggres-

sive and won't chase you." If a person is bitten, immediately call 000.

Wrap a pressure bandage tightly over the area of the bite, then use a second bandage and splints to immobilise the limb.

Keep the person calm and still until you can get medical help.

### **Upskilling regional clinicians** for National Stroke Week

A NEW educational video for regional clinicians to better identify the symptoms of stroke was launched at Wallaroo Hospital for National Stroke Week (August 8-14) on Friday, August

Stroke is one of the biggest killers in Australia and a leading cause of adult disability.

Regional patients are particularly vulnerable due to the time involved in accessing a brain scan and expert treatment which may only be available at a larger hospital or in the city.

Neurologist and rural clinical lead for stroke within South Australia's Rural Support Service Dr Craig Kurunawai said the video was created to support and upskill regional clinicians on the standard Recognition of Stroke In the Emergency Room (ROSIER) triage tool when assessing suspected stroke patients.

"The ROSIER stroke assessment tool is regularly used by regional clinicians and SA Ambulance (Service) officers in hospital emergency and inpatient settings when a patient is suspected of an acute stroke," Dr Kurunawai said.

"Thanks to funding from The Hospital Research Foundation Group, we have been able to work with, metropolitan neurologists, stroke nurse educators and SA Ambulance Service to develop a professional educational video on the ROSIER tool to help relevant clinicians identify the signs quicker and seek advice and consultation from the SA Telestroke Service."

Dr Kurunawai said the video would now be distributed across South Australia's six regional Local Health Networks as part of their emergency teams' training and professional development.

Executive director of The Hospital Research Foundation Group's stroke division Olivia Nassaris said upskilling emergency teams to quickly identify stroke would save lives.

"Getting to hospital fast and receiving treatment is vital when faced with a potential stroke, so better equipping our emergency workers will speed up this process," Ms Nassaris said.

A stroke occurs when a blood vessel in the brain is blocked or



"I started the run at 5.30am Thursday morning (August 25) and straight off the bat was into some pretty challenging terrain and some sticky clay which was building up and adding extra weight into my shoes within the first five kilometres," he

"As the days went by, each day presented different challenges and it was constantly a battle mentally and physically for me trying to keep moving and not let the trail defeat me."

Mr Delderfield said the closest he came to giving up was on the second

"I was having some issues with my feet and I couldn't figure out what it was; I couldn't run any more, I could only take a few strides before I had to walk and even when I was walking it was more of a slow limp," he said.

"Extreme willpower, stubbornness and competitiveness (got me through

"Raising money for the Black Dog Institute, I knew so many people had already supported me and donated money to the cause, I felt like I would be a huge disappointment, not only to them but to myself as well to pull out that early in the run."

Despite the challenges, Mr Delderfield said there were lots of things to enjoy about the trip.

'The scenery was absolutely amazing with constantly mind-blowing views," he said.

"The support from family and friends on the trail was above and beyond anything I expected.

"Dad was the main support crew and he was there from the very start to the very finish and he really got me through; without him there it wouldn't have been possible."

Mr Delderfield has so far raised more than \$3500 for the Black Dog Institute, and is hoping to reach at least \$5000 by the end of October.

"Getting a donated car was great because it meant we didn't have to go out and find one, especially with how the second-hand car market is at the moment.

"It (the car) runs pretty well, we're pretty confident we'll make it but time will tell when we get on the rally."

The duo is hosting a fundraiser event at the Troubridge Hotel, with pig and lamb on a spit, games and other fundraising opportunities, from 11.30am on Saturday, October 1.

"Every single turn we took, there was even more beautiful views than the last, it well and truly exceeded expectations," he said.

"Innes National Park was just mind blowing, how beautiful it was down there but to be honest the entire course threw up beautiful views; sunrises and sunsets every day were fantastic.

"The track was in magnificent condition and I have to tip my hat to the Yorke Peninsula Council for having it as such."

Mr Kaesler said there were still a number of daily challenges for participants. "We thought it was going to be an interesting and challenging event, and it was," he said.

'We were pretty lucky with the weather, except for one cold front which came through during the event but, apart from that, it was

"The fatigue of sleep deprivation hit people and for some runners on one hour of sleep each day, it's hard to get back out there and go.

"Some of the cliffs were precarious in places because they were crossing through there at night but they all managed to follow the GPS signals and the course well enough to take their time.

"As much as the course was isolated in places, we got to rendezvous with the runners loosely every 10 kilometres or so, and everyone had crews looking out for them."

Mr Kaesler said he expected next year's event to be bigger and better.

"It was pretty well received across the peninsula, especially considering we kept it pretty low key this year just to get it off the ground, but certainly we'll be here again this time next year and we'll be expecting a close to sell out field," he said.

"We want to put hundreds and hundreds of thousands of dollars back into Yorke Peninsula communities and that's why we bring these events to the country so everyone can benefit."

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

"We really wanted to give the students the tools to help respond and protect them from trauma in response to the bushfires in Edithburgh and Yorketown.


"In addition to the training, each family who had someone participate now has a basic first aid kit in their home.













"Additionally, we know crop competition is very complementary to herbicide efficacy and often improves the capture of weed seed through harvest weed seed control tactics.

"Greater crop competition can often be achieved without great additional expense, using optimal seeding rates, sowing early, narrowing row spacing

and addressing soil constraints."

The research found there had also been an almost doubling of cropped area sown to break crops for weed control benefits.

"Herbicide resistance thrives in simple and predictable farming systems."

Harvest weed seed control tactics were included in the grower survey for the first time in 2021, showing growers were adopting a variety of tools to collect and destroy weed seed at

Several farms use more than one tactic to destroy seed from weeds which have escaped other control tactics.

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# Wild radish seed targeted for destruction

GROWERS are being encouraged to keep wild radish, and its seeds, on their weed management planning ahead of har-

GRDC manager — weeds Dr Jason Emms said before harvest is the ideal time to stop seed-set of wild radishes, control latespring germinations, undertake crop-topping with registered herbicides and plan for harvest weed seed control.

"Growers in the region have told us they are concerned about wild radish developing resistance to routinely used herbicides," Dr Emms said.

"To help prevent this, growers need to deploy a mix of tactics throughout the year to prevent seed set and to minimise the chances of herbicide resistance developing."

If left unchecked, immature green plants presenting in high densities can interfere with harvest, and mature seed can return to the seed bank, creating an ongoing problem.

GRDC has invested in multiple projects during the past 25 years to identify solutions to control wild radish.

This research has been compiled into the Wild Radish Fact Sheet which details measures growers can take to control the

Weed expert and fact sheet author John Stuchbery said now is the time growers should check for wild radish that survived herbicide applications, and late-germinating plants.

"It is important to stop these seeding and topping up the seed bank," Mr Stuchbery said.

"Growers can apply a followup in-crop herbicide with a different mode of action if the window for herbicide has not

Mr Stuchbery said now is the right time to plan for crop topping or desiccating prior to harvest, and for harvest weed seed

Seed generated from one year of wild radish can leave enough seed dormant to fuel eight more years of weed infes-

Harvest weed seed control systems such as seed destructors can intercept and pulverise up to 95 per cent of wild radish

Growers who use harvest weed seed control systems including seed impact mills, chaff carts and chaff decks can reduce the wild radish seed bank over time, giving themselves the upper hand.

There are also herbicides registered that can be applied preharvest that are effective against wild radish.

Long-term planning, with a focus on reducing the weed seed bank is key to successful control of wild radish.

# Mouse baiting double the dose packs a more effective punch

mouse populations can be reduced significantly by doubling the amount of zinc phosphide in grain baits.

The in-field study, led by the CSIRO, confirms findings from earlier laboratory studies which demonstrated a lower sensitivity of mice to ZnP than previously reported.

The studies were done in response to concerns from farmers, who suspected mouse baits were not as effective as they needed to be to control mice in broadscale agriculture, particularly when mouse numbers were high.

CSIRO researcher Steve Henry said the first study, published in Pest Management Science, found bait consisting of grains coated with 25g ZnP/kg grain did not always provide a lethal dose to mice,

and mice which didn't die from an initial feed of this bait became bait averse.

"We followed up with a second study, now published in Integrative Zoology, that reassessed the sensitivity of mice to ZnP," he said.

"The results showed mice were significantly less sensitive to ZnP than previously report-

"These results highlighted the importance of every bait grain needing to be a lethal dose as there is no guarantee mice will find and consume more than one baited grain, and consumption of a sublethal dose leads to aversion.

"The final study conducted near Parkes, NSW, took the findings of our laboratory tests into the field and confirmed that 50g ZnP/kg grain bait is required to consistently reduce

"The findings confirmed the 50g ZnP/kg grain bait was able to achieve more than an 80 per cent reduction in mouse populations more than 90 per cent of the time."

GRDC pests manager Dr Leigh Nelson said the three studies provided a solid body of evidence for the superior efficacy of the 50 g ZnP/kg grain bait, which would give growers a more effective tool to manage mice and protect their crops.

"The use of 50g ZnP/kg grain baits should reduce the need for repeat baiting which is costly," Dr Nelson said.

"Any savings on the bottom line from mouse damage would be welcomed by farmers.

"I would still encourage farmers to implement a suite of best practice management tactics to protect crops from mice.

# Building approvals up for a month, down for a quarter

THE latest building approval numbers from the Australian Bureau of Statistics revealed an increase during July.

"Building approvals data for July continues to reflect the magnitude of Australia's existing pipeline of home building work, rather than the decline in housing demand evident in other leading indicators," HIA economist Tom Devitt said.

"Building approvals for new houses in July increased by one per cent compared with the previous month.

"This leaves approvals 23 per cent lower in the three months to July 2022 compared with the same time last year.

"Despite this decline, house approvals in the three months to July 2022 were 12 per cent higher than the same time in 2019."

Mr Devitt said the strong volume of house approvals reflected the significant volume of new homes sold but not yet approved.

"The strong volume of approvals in July 2022 hides the impact rising interest rates are already having on more timely data," he said.

"New home sales across Australia declined by 13.1 per cent in July, following even earlier reports from the industry of a slowing in the number of groups visiting display sites.


'This will see weaker sales volumes in the second half of 2022.

"Approvals of multi units fell sharply in July, to see approvals in the three months to July 16.8 per cent lower than in the same period in 2021.

"Despite this decline they remain comparable with volumes of approvals prior to the pandemic.

"Given the large volume of work under construction and approved but not commenced, there will be a significant lag between the increase in the cash rate and an adverse impact on new home construction.


'The long lead times in this current cycle will hide the impact of rate rises and risk the RBA over shooting with unnecessary rate increases.

### **HOT FISHING TIPS**

with Greg James www.gregjamesfishing.com.au

Fish of the Month — Flathead are from the Platycephalidae family and its preferred habitats are rock and sandy ocean beds, sandy flats and beaches. They are notable for having large eyes on top of a flattened head, giving excellent binocular vision to attack overhead prey, somewhat similar to flounder. dusky, sand and tiger, and are dusky brown coloured and/or striped with colours of sand. Best baits are bloodworms, cockles, plastics.

**Port Broughton:** A cold south-easterly wind blew on Saturday, but a few hardy souls were on the jetty trying for yellowfin whiting and blue swimmer crabs. Boat crews fished for squid, King George whiting, flathead and

Wallaroo: Reports were mixed, with boaties catching squid, tommy ruff (Australian herring) and KG whiting, but many returned empty handed as well. Jettybased anglers caught tommies and squid.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Crews found early season bluevs in Moonta Bay along with tommies, garfish and a few squid. Port Hughes jetty has a mix of fish with salmon trout just west of the blue line midweek, plus garfish, squid and even a couple of

yellowfin whiting.

Point Turton: Sea breezes from the southeast have already started along this part of coast, making for good shore-based activities at Hardwicke Bay, Point Souttar and on to Corny Point. Salmon trout and mullet were the main reports, while boat crews caught

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Shore-based fishers enjoyed reasonable catches of mullet and salmon trout from local beaches including Gym, the Dust Bowl and Richards over the weekend. Boat crews fishing out from Marion Bay caught some big squid, flathead and snook.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Steady catches of squid and garfish were made off Wattle Point, Sultana Passage and Klein Point. Blue swimmer crabs were caught from Stansbury, Port Vincent and Coobowie in water of about 4m. The jetties have squid and tommies.

Ardrossan: Lean reports came from the grounds off Ardrossan last week with a few squid only as crews fished far and wide towards Price Creek and Port Julia, Souid and tommies can occasionally be caught from the
