Making waves at Wallaroo

FOLLOWING delays, the funding agreement for the Wallaroo aquatic facility has now been signed, officially marking the project's commencement on March 7.

The project is expected to be complete by December 2026 and

finalised by March 2027.

Copper Coast Council secured \$2.12 million in federal funding for the project in 2024.

However, the total project value exceeds \$5m. Council is contributing \$3,053,826, with the federal grant providing \$2,120,837, bringing the total investment to \$5,174,663.

The aquatic facility will feature

a jetty, access equipment, a shark barrier, shade and shelter, electrical works, pontoons and other features.

Wallaroo Swimming and Aquatic Committee community leader Ian Shields celebrated this milestone by hosting a gathering of supporters at the site on Sunday, March 9, with around 50 people showing their support.

Mr Shields said it was a thrill

and a privilege to address WSAC supporters.

"Sharing the news that council and SA Government's Department of Infrastructure and Transport have finalised the funding agreement was a moment to remember," he said.

"Standing on the site where the new swimming jetty will be in two years was satisfying for all involved. "Now, we enter the next phase, and the WSAC has a motto for the community — our work is not done until 'we can walk on it, swim from it and jump off the new jetty."

Mr Shields said many residents at the gathering shared their experiences of the previous jetty.

Clarifying council's mozzie control actions

I WRITE to correct inaccuracies in the Yorke Peninsula Country Times article "War on mozzies heats up" (11-2-25) and a subsequent letter to the editor "Background to mozzie war" (25-2-25).

The article stated "Barunga West Council has intensified pest control efforts after frustrated Fisherman Bay and Port Broughton residents reported this summer's insect problem as the worst they have ever experienced."

This suggests council only acted in response to complaints. However, residents had already reported mosquito concerns to council in December and early January, and council was already in the process of taking proactive steps before the complaints were lodged and the issue gained media attention.

On January 9, council formally requested SA Health's involvement to review its mosquito management practices, weeks before the article was published.

On January 31, council informed the YPCT, in writing, that it had contacted the SA Health Protection Program in January to request an assessment.

SA Health conducted its site visit on February 5, after which council, in consultation with SA Health, implemented additional mosquito control measures in accordance with its established management

Author of the letter, Robyn Lyons, stated

she first raised concerns with council on January 5 and received a response two days later outlining steps she could take as a

While she appears to not have found this response satisfactory, council was already taking proactive measures, including the formal request to SA Health on January 9.

Ms Lyons' letter also incorrectly stated council had not engaged with SA Health for five years, and that it was her contact with the YPCT which led to BWC's subsequent action but council was already actively addressing the issue in the weeks prior to any media involvement.

Despite council providing these details before publication of the February 11 article, the article omitted important information, creating the false impression that council only acted in response to media pressure, following complaints from residents.

This was not the case; council had sought expert input before these reports gained public attention, and additional actions were taken based on SA Health's assessment.

BWC's actions were part of an ongoing commitment to manage mosquito concerns effectively.

Council welcomes scrutiny and transparency but also expects fair and accurate reporting.

A costly misstep

CHRIS Hunter's insightful commentary (YPCT, 18-2-25) rightly underscores the glaring drawbacks of the AUKAS submarine project.

While the strategic rationale for bolstering Australia's defence capabilities is undeniable, the exorbitant cost and questionable returns demand urgent scrutiny.

The projected cost of \$368 billion is merely the starting point — a figure that will inevitably balloon.

Historical precedents of similar capitalintensive defence projects suggest that design changes, cost overruns and technological upgrades will likely double this figure to

Over three decades, the final price tag could easily approach \$1 trillion (one-thousandbillion dollars) a staggering sum for a nation already grappling with fiscal challenges.

What does Australia gain for this astronomical investment? Eight nuclearpowered submarines, with only two or three operational at any given time.

This limited capability raises serious questions about the project's cost-effectiveness and strategic value.

Meanwhile, the comparatively modest \$8bn expenditure on 90 additional F-35 fighter jets has sparked widespread debate about affordability. If \$8bn is contentious, how can \$368bn (or more) be justified with so little public outcry?

If Australia truly needs a submarine fleet, surely there are more affordable and pragmatic alternatives. Upgrading the existing Collinsclass submarines with nuclear propulsion, new weapons systems, et cetera; revisiting offers from France, Germany and Japan; or considering new offers from South Korea or India, could deliver comparable capabilities at a fraction of the cost.

These options warrant serious consideration before Australia commits to a project of such unprecedented scale and risk.

The AUKAS submarine project is not just a defence initiative; it is a generational financial

Australians deserve a transparent, rational debate about whether this is the best use of our

Let us not allow strategic ambition to override fiscal prudence and common sense.

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Moonta steps closer to World Heritage status

THE Australian Cornish Mining sites at Burra and Moonta Mines could achieve World Heritage status by 2028.

Following a visit from World Heritage consultant Barry Gamble, the National Trust of South Australia Moonta branch has been informed of the timeline for the remainder of Moonta's World Heritage nomination process.

The next step in the process is to prepare a preliminary assessment report.

State Minister for Environment Susan Close said the report would be independently assessed after submission.

"Regional Council of Goyder and Copper Coast Council are due to present that report to the World Heritage Centre by September 15, 2025," she said.

"The preliminary assessment report would then need to be independently assessed by the International Council on Monuments and Sites, and the International Union for Conservation of Nature."

Mr Gamble flew from the United Kingdom to visit Moonta Mines, where he spoke with NTSA Moonta branch members about the process, on March 4.

He was accompanied by NTSA president Millie Nicholls.

"You've already had your first milestone towards World Heritage listing, and that was your tentative listing," Mr Gamble said.

"So already, the state and federal governments have committed to backing you for going on the World Heritage List."

Mr Gamble said Australia was currently completing a preliminary assessment report for another site, with the Burra and Moonta Mines Cornish Mining sites next in line.

"You've been given, by Australia, an incredible leg up the ladder here to go through this preliminary assessment," he

Mr Gamble outlined the timeline for the next few years after the preliminary report is submitted. "We will put in our submission in September, wait a year, receive our report back in October next year, wait a year, and then we can nominate (for World Heritage recognition)," he said.

"No other site in Australia can interrupt our ranking, unless politically you are held back."

NTSA Moonta branch chair Graham Hancock said there was a lot to do before the report could be submitted, particularly in collaboration with the council.

"A lot of our sites are not clearly identified — we do not know who is supposed to spend what money on what site, and that is not going to be settled until we have a joint committee (with council)," Mr Hancock said.

He also emphasised that the bid was not just about the mining sites in Moonta Mines.

"When we are being recognised, we also have Moonta and the township — the things we do in the town will reflect on us."

During the gathering, Mr Gamble was presented with gifts from the NTSA Moonta branch.

Moonta historian Robyn Knight presented a copy of her book, The Captains of Copper, along with a paper she wrote on Oswald Pryor — a cartoonist, mine captain, journalist, engineer, historian and musician who coined the term "Australia's Little Cornwall."

Her paper was presented at the Cornish History Seminar during the 2023 Kernewek Lowender.

Mr Gamble was also presented with a copy of Ian Archibald's calendar, created in collaboration with the NTSA Moonta branch, which features blended photographs of modern sites alongside historical images of the location.

Mr Archibald's grandson took similar photos at the Burra mining sites, which were presented to Mr Gamble on a USB.

Local John Andrew also presented Mr Gamble with a book he created, Moonta's Lesser Known Lines of Lode, which highlights mines not included in the heritage area.

Funding for mining sites

THE Australian Government has recently invested more than \$125,000 to help preserve and protect the Burra Cornish Mining site.

This site is paired with the Moonta Mining sites to form the Burra and Moonta Cornish Mining Sites World Heritage bid.

Federal Minister for Environment Tanya Plibersek and Tourism Minister Don Farrell visited the Burra site to announce the funding last week. "The campaign to protect Australian Cornish Mining sites, including Burra and Moonta, has been years in the making and a labour of love for a dedicated and hardworking group of volunteers who have put in countless hours of their time," Ms Plibersek said.

"The community is proud to protect the mines, and this funding from the federal government will help us do exactly that for generations to come."

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Traffic flowing on Augusta Highway duplication

TRAFFIC is now moving on dual lanes in both directions along 29 kilometres of the Augusta Highway between Port Wakefield and Lochiel, marking the completion of major works on the duplication project.

Motorists can now travel towards Lochiel on the two new northbound lanes, while the existing lanes facilitate southbound-only traffic towards Port Wakefield.

The new lanes are open, but final works along the highway and at intersections will require temporary speed limits.

Northbound traffic will be limited to 60km/h for the first week, increasing to 80km/h the following week, while the southbound carriageway will remain at 80km/h.

Signage will guide motorists through the changes, including new right-hand turns onto the highway. The speed limit is expected to return to 110km/h by late March.

The \$185 million Augusta Highway Duplication Project was jointly funded, with the federal government contributing \$148 million and the state government providing \$37 million.

"On Sunday, so many people loved the thought that their grandchildren will have the opportunity to experience what they did for so many decades previously," he said.

"This project is for the next generations, and that is truly important."

Kadina residents Rolley and Pauline Woods said their great-grandchildren had not been able to enjoy the Wallaroo jetty as they once did.

"We had four kids, and they used to do a lot of swimming here and jump off the (old) jetty," Mr Woods said.

Mrs Woods said she hoped to be around when the new jetty was finished.

"All our grandkids did it, and now we have great-grandkids and they can't," she said.

Mr Shields also acknowledged council's commitment to the project, thanking Mayor Roslyn Talbot, chief executive Dylan Strong and all council staff involved.

Progress on the Wallaroo aquatic facility was delayed in October due to the federal government not yet providing grant documentation to council.

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SOS call out from SOS Yorkes

SOS Yorkes is just one step away from becoming a tax-exempt charity, but chair Ann Clothier says the lack of volunteers is turning this small task into a major challenge.

Currently, the group is not registered as an official charity, meaning it misses out on tax exemptions and other financial concessions.

Volunteers have until the end of March to submit the application, but completing it has taken time away from their vital community work.

Ms Clothier said the group had very limited funds left, which could disappear quickly.

Gaining charity certification would strengthen SOS Yorkes' resilience, but more volunteers were also essential, she said.

In recent months, the group has lost several key members who had helped promote services and coordinate events. This comes despite strong community backing after SOS Yorkes was on the brink of collapse last June.

Ms Clothier said the group had initiatives ready to address mental

health gaps but, without volunteers, many could not be enacted.

According to Lifeline, 8.6 Australians die every day by suicide.

The Barossa/Yorke/Mid North region has a notably higher rate of suicide than the state and national averages. The region records 14.4 suicides per 100,000 people, compared with 12.7 in SA and 12.6 nationally.

Ms Clothier said services with long wait times were available for those in northern Yorke Peninsula, but there were very few options south of Maitland.

She warned that, without early

mental health intervention, people could end up at crisis point.

SOS Yorkes works to prevent mental health issues from escalating, with initiatives such as its booked-out Mental Health First Aid courses in Minlaton and Maitland.

One workshop was grant-funded,

but the second was paid for directly from the group's bank account.

"There's just a real gap — in order to make change, we need to be the change," Ms Clothier said.

A life-changing ride

THIS Sunday, the Black Dog Ride One Dayer Home in October, raising over \$500,000 for will set off from Kadina to start a national conversation about depression and suicide.

The ride begins at 8am on March 16 at the OTR/BP car park, travelling through Paskeville, Lochiel, Balaklava, Auburn, Farrell Flat and Jamestown.

Kadina Black Dog Ride coordinator Simon Gerlach said mental health affects everyone.

"We all know someone who has been touched by mental health challenges," Mr Gerlach said. "This is our chance to stand together, start conversations, and show our community

that support is always available. "Whether you're riding, cheering us on,

or donating, your contribution matters.

"Let's make this a day to remember and take another step toward much-needed change."

Funds raised will support vital community-based mental health initiatives, including the Royal Flying Doctor Service, Men's Shed, and other regional programs.

In 2024, close to 6000 riders took part in the One Dayer, alongside the Long Ride mental health charities.

Black Dog Ride ambassador and World Supersport Champion Tom Edwards encouraged Kadina locals to support the event.

"Every Black Dog Ride is more than just a ride — it sparks conversations about mental health and lets people know they're not alone," Mr Edwards said.

'The camaraderie in the biking community is incredible, and these events show how much we can achieve together.

"I lost someone I loved to mental health struggles, and I think about him every day.

"Supporting the Black Dog Ride is my way of honouring him and ensuring more people get the help they need.

"Whether you're riding, donating, or just cheering us on, you're helping break down barriers and save lives.

Every day, 8.6 Australians die by suicide; 75 per cent of them are men.

A 54-YEAR-OLD Paskeville man has been airlifted to Adelaide after being struck by a car on Railway Terrace North, in Paskeville.

The man sustained serious, but non-life-threatening, injuries when after a 47-year-old Kadina woman collided with him just before 4.30pm on Monday, March

The woman was not physically injured in the crash; she was arrested and charged with driving in a manner dangerous to the public.

Investigations are continuing, and the woman will appear in the Kadina Magistrates Court on April 28.

Third man charged over Yorketown home invasion

A third man has been charged over a violent home invasion in Yorketown, where firearms and over \$1 million in collectable coins were stolen.

Police allege three armed men broke into the home of 74-year-old Francis "Dig" Taheny on February 24, assaulted him and stole guns, cash and his Toyota sedan before fleeing.

Later that morning, Broken Hill Highway Patrol stopped a white Hyundai van on the Barrier Highway

The front passenger fled, but police arrested the 49-year-old driver, Scott Buhagiar.

A search allegedly uncovered 14 firearms, including a loaded semi-automatic shotgun, collectable coins and cash.

Buhagiar appeared in Broken Hill Local Court, facing 19 charges, including possessing a loaded firearm in public and knowingly dealing with proceeds of

A second white van was stopped near Cobar, NSW, at 3pm, where police allegedly found more stolen items.

The driver, Matthew Ryan, 35, was charged with driving while disqualified, dealing with proceeds of crime, and receiving stolen property. After further investigations, police arrested the third

suspect, Mark Paul Hunt, 50, at Sturt Park, Broken Hill, on Saturday, March 1.

He was charged with possessing a loaded firearm in public, dealing with proceeds of crime, and receiving stolen property.

Hunt was refused bail in Parramatta Bail Court the next day and is due to appear in Broken Hill Local Court next month.

All three men remain in custody.

Pedestrian Slowing down at the mines

COPPER Coast Council has proposed a speed limit reduction in the Moonta Mines area due to expected traffic increases.

A notice of motion brought forward by Councillor Brent Walker was carried at the March 3 council meeting.

The motion highlighted the importance of improved road safety for residents and visitors to Moonta Mines, particularly with the prospective World Heritage recognition for Australian Cornish Mining Sites at Burra and Moonta.

It also requested the Department of Infrastructure and Transport review current speed limits on both sealed and unsealed roads within and around the Moonta Mines National Heritage area.

The council recommended a uniform speed limit of 50 kilometres per hour for all roads

This would include roads from Blanche Terrace to the Verran Terrace/Derrington Terrace intersection, which serve as the eastern and western gateways to the heritage area, as outlined in the Australian

Cornish Mining Sites Moonta Conservation Management Plan.

Cr Walker said he believed an increase in road traffic was imminent due to the World Heritage bid and that a consistent speed limit was essential for the area's future.

"As we are seeking World Heritage (recognition) in that area, it would make sense to have a consistent speed limit all the way through," he said.

"I think, particularly for peo-

ple coming from overseas, it will be beneficial.

"All the roads from Blanche Terrace by the school up to the old East Moonta church on the left-hand side, going well past the sweet shop, should be included."

"I think it is a necessity - more importantly, when you've got key turn-offs, such as to Hughes Enginehouse, you could currently be doing 80km/h.

"If someone who isn't famil-

iar with the area is travelling at 80km/h and suddenly puts the brakes on, it could cause an

Cr Cathy Vluggen said there were many reasons to support the motion.

"It will make everything much safer for all concerned for motorists and pedestrians alike," she said.

SA sends help to QLD

THE largest single storm and flood deployment from South Australia since Cyclone Yasi has been sent to south east Queensland to support the response to ex-Cyclone

More than 50 staff and volunteers from the SES, CFS and MFS have been deployed to help respond to flash flooding, heavy rainfall and destructive winds.

Emergency Services Minister Emily Bourke said, when the request comes through, South Australians step up to help.

Youth Crime

NEW knife laws passed by the State Government have expanded police search powers, banned the sale of knives to minors and put storage restrictions on certain knives offered

Police can now conduct wand searches at declared shopping centres, public transport hubs, on public transport and at any time at all licensed premises.

From 2023 to 2024, the state had 1028 youth offenders per 100,000 people aged between 10 and 17 years, compared to the national average of 1764 youth offenders

The program has attracted two local school students - seasoned electric guitar player Jade and poetry buff Jada, who is giving music production a go for the first time.

Jada said it her mum encouraged her to sign up but she was very happy to be a part of the group and take on a new task each week.

"In year 2 and year 3 I did recorder, and I did try to teach myself piano, but I never actually properly learned," Jada said.

"But I'm good at English and poetry — I really like poetry — because it's fun and I like the challenge of it."

The pair are combining their talents to create a song about their evolving journey through life with music.

Jade said they started the songwriting process by building a playlist of music they liked to find tunes and melodies that suited their style.

"We're going to tell our story through the song," she said.

"When we were younger our parents used to sing to us a lot, and then we would hear songs in school.

"But now Jada listens to a lot of music and I play in the school band, so we are developing what our relationship is with it."

Local artist and SYP Sounds mentor Bowie Williams said he got involved because he saw how much young people on YP would benefit from mentorship.

"There's a fair few cover bands around - my dad used to play in cover bands — but if you wanted to go to an original gig, it's in Adelaide," he said.

"A lot of people on the peninsula probably don't know there's this original scene in South Australia, so we need to teach kids to write songs so they can get out there and just play.

"I think I would have gotten into playing in bands a lot earlier if I knew it was a possibility."

Today, Mr Williams travels to Adelaide most weekends to play gigs with his band BIRD ISLAND, which has also featured on Triple J Unearthed.

He hoped for more local venues will support bands with original songs, giving young YP musicians an accessible start to their music journevs.

"We've got a fair few pubs around, but I think a lot of venues might be too scared to try to put local bands on because, out in the country, cover bands are usually the go-to," he said.

Performance opportunity

SYP Sounds participants will have the chance to perform during Youth Week celebrations at the Yorketown RSL and Sports Club on April 5.

SYP youth worker and SYP Sounds mentor Carlee Fowles said the 2025 Youth Week event is set to be bigger and better, with a revamped event

"We received a whopping \$27,000 from Rural Health Innovation Fund for this project — without which, we wouldn't be able to provide this opportunity for our young people," she said.



"This funding, and any funding we apply for, is critical to the SYP community - we rely on grants for all the initiatives we champion."

SYP Sounds participants may choose to perform at the event, but Ms Fowles said, regardless, the program had been a success, providing a safe and social space for young people to connect.

"Watching the look of pride on a young person's face, when something they have created comes to life that's the highlight," she said.

"We have received valuable feedback from young people and families about how much it means to them to have a safe space to go."

Borda standing for Nationals in Grey

THE National Party has named Whyalla deputy mayor Peter Borda as its candidate for Grey in the upcoming federal election.

The announcement was made last Thursday, March 6, with Mr Borda telling to the YP Country Times that health and medical services, drought assistance and industry were his key



campaign issues.

He said two of his six children had significant medical issues, and the lack of services was a major concern for many residents, particularly families like his

'The reason I'm running is to bring some attention and bring that issue to the table in Canberra of a decentralisation of health services," he said.

"I would talk to GPs and say 'Look, what are the barriers? Why aren't you calling the region your home? What would it take to want to put your roots down and create a life?'

Mr Borda said he would work with the community to find local solutions while advocating as a strong regional voice.

"Listening to farmers, I don't think they get enough attention," he said.

The drought is having a significant impact, and the changing global marketplace — particularly challenges from the EU on how Australian wool is rated — is a major issue, he said.

The Nationals candidate also welcomed recent developments at the Whyalla Steelworks.

"It's fantastic to see bipartisan support for the investment and injection of not only finances but confidence, reassurance and stability into our community," he

Mr Borda, who also has a background in real estate and wellness coaching, said community spirit was one of Grey's biggest strengths.

Whenever I look at a challenge or opportunity in the region, I do so as a family man raising children right here, right now — and that's what guides every decision I make," he said.

Turton steps up for One Nation

BRANDON Turton, of Port Pirie, has been announced as One Nation's candidate for the seat of Grey in the upcoming federal election.

Mr Turton said his campaign would focus on the cost of living.

He said One Nation had several policies addressing the issue, with the biggest being energy cost reduction, particularly electricity.

The party's plan is to cut electricity prices by 20 per cent, along with a policy to reduce fuel excise to 26 cents per litre.

"The plan is to fire up the coal fired plants again, because the reliable energy side of things is causing a lot more cost than what was originally spoken to us when they were first introduced."

The One Nation candidate also said his party would introduce tax relief measures, including income splitting and joint tax return filing for couples with dependent children.

Mr Turton works as a project manager at the Port Pirie Smelter and has a background in structural engineering.

"The manufacturing industry is pretty much the lifeblood of Port Pirie, and so from that I have an understanding of the primary producers in the area," he said.

Regional plan to help YP's growth

THE Yorke Peninsula and Mid North Regional Plan draft is now open for public consultation, with Plan SA hosting community sessions across the region.

YP residents had their chance to engage with planners on March 5, with around 15 people attending the first session and 10 at the second.

The State Planning Commission released the plan on February 12, seeking feedback from the community, councils and industry on how to prepare for sustainable growth.

It considers the region's evolving population, environment and economy, with a focus on job opportunities in tourism, agriculture, mining and retirement migration.

A key driver of the plan is valuing Aboriginal culture and the natural environment, alongside managing future infra-structure and housing needs.

This is one of six new country regional plans for SA and sets out a long-term vision for 2051 and beyond.

The plan aims to increase housing in the right locations and strengthen the economy with a smarter, cleaner future.

include building a climate-resilient, sustainable environment, improved regional connectivity, and coordination of land use and infrastructure planning.

Housing and long-term infrastructure are identified as major challenges, particularly in areas experiencing growth, such as the Copper Coast.

Eight key initiatives and projects are highlighted in the plan, including the Rex Minerals Hillside Project near Ardrossan, and the Burra and Moonta Mines Cornish Mining Sites World Heritage Bid.

The plan estimates the region's population, which was 78,166 in 2021, will grow by 17,676 people to 95,842 by 2051; the 55-74 age group is expected to grow the most,

while the 75-plus age range will have the biggest proportional increase.

Senior strategic planner Dean Fisher said work on the plan began in late 2022, involving multiple government departments.

"We're at the exhibition stage now — it has taken a while," Mr Fisher said.

"What I've found is that the issues are the same across the board for most regional places.

"Even if they've got growth like, say, the Copper Coast, they do not have the resources and you can see it in health — there's not enough infrastructure provided."

Consultation is open, with community input encouraged before the final plan is adopted.

Regions unite to tac

FAMILIES, employers and representatives from 23 council areas gathered in Port Broughton last week to launch a project advocating for fairer access to childcare across the vast federal electorate of Grey.

The Regional Childcare Desert Advocacy Project was launched on Tuesday, March 4, hosted by Barunga West Council, one of the participating councils alongside Copper Coast, Yorke Peninsula and Wakefield Regional councils.

Grey, the fourth-largest federal electorate by area, covers 92.4 per cent of South Australia.

A 2022 Mitchell Institute study found it had the worst childcare accessibility in the country, with six children competing for every available place.

The project calls on state and federal governments to collaborate on funding models and solutions to increase regional childcare places. It also advocates for revised regulations for Family Day Care to make it a more viable option for providers.

BWC interim chief executive Paul Simpson said regional communities needed fairer access to childcare to enable them to strengthen and grow.

"We are here tonight to ask the state and federal governments to do better," he said.

"We ask this for ourselves, for our children and for our families. "We ask this for our employers and our economy, because we all deserve a fair chance to participate in, to grow and to strengthen our communities.

"We also ask this for our children and our children's children, who we all hope will have the choice — a genuine choice — to remain in, or return to, the part of SA they grew up in, and be able to live, work and raise a family here."

Lower Eyre Peninsula council mayor and project spokesperson Jo-Anne Quigley said the project had received phenomenal support from communities within Grey and be-

"We have been working in the background with two very important national campaigns, the Minderoo Foundation's Thrive by Five campaign and advocacy group The Parenthood's

campaign," she said.

"They too have been very supportive and may well play a larger role in our actions going forward."

CAMPAIGN

SA Senator Karen Grogan said the Federal Government's Building Early Education Fund would build childcare and early learning centres where they were needed, not based on electorates.

She said guidelines for the fund were being developed, so she was keen to get input from RCDAP about how the fund should be structured.

In a statement, Copper Coast Council chief executive Dylan Strong said the Copper Coast was fortunate to have existing childcare services, but demand continued to outstrip supply.

"Council works closely with local providers such as the Kadina Child Care Centre to understand their needs, and is regularly advocating for project funding and increased services," he said

"With ongoing population growth

in the region over the next decade, it is important council does all it can to expand the childcare offering on the Copper Coast.

But council cannot do this alone, which is why it is supportive of the Regional Childcare Desert Advocacy Project's lobbying efforts."

Yorke Peninsula Council mayor Darren Braund said the council understood the impact that limited childcare had on families, workforce participation, and regional growth.

In a statement, he said YPC would help other communities tackle the childcare issue by drawing on its experience in securing the Minlaton Family Centre, which opened in mid-

"Having successfully addressed its own long-running childcare shortage, taking the region from just 14 places to over 120, council is in a unique position to share insights and strategies," Mayor Braund said.

Reality shatters country town dream

PAIGE Aldenhoven and her partner Daniel Rogers moved to Port Broughton seven years ago to fulfil their dream of living and working in a seaside country town and bringing up a family.

While sharing her story at the launch of the Regional Childcare Desert Advocacy Project last week, Paige said that dream had hit the hard reality of a complete lack of childcare in the town.

She secured three days a week with the local Family Day Care Service when she became pregnant with their first child.

But the service shut down at the end of Paige's maternity leave and she was forced to resign from her HR job at Barunga Village in Port Broughton.

She later secured a job in HR and childcare for her son, Reggie, in Port

For the past four years, Paige and Reggie have had to make a round trip of 160 kilometres a day to and from Port Pirie, up to four days a week.

"It's been tiring — it's been a tough slog" she said.

"It hasn't been the dream of living and working in Port Broughton that I originally had, but unfortunately, without care services in the town, we had no other option."

Paige said before she secured her job and childcare in Port Pirie, she and Daniel considered leaving Port Broughton so they could both work and access childcare.

She said discussion about the childcare issue tended to focus on economic aspects.

"But I think it's important we also highlight the emotional and mental toll this has on mums and dads every single day," she said.

"Let's be real, it's hard.

"Without childcare, there are countless mums and dads in regions like ours making that difficult decision on what's best for their family.

"Either one parent stays at home and families manage during this

cost-of-living crisis, giving up a career and superannuation growth.

"Or, worse, we put our sleep-deprived parents on the road with our little ones for (up to) two and a half hours every day to return to work for a little bit of extra money to support the family.

"It's a bloody tough decision and it's largely because we don't have local childcare services.

'This is a beautiful little community with so much potential but we need to take action.

"I've lived here for seven years and I've been involved in discussions, forums, meetings, surveys but I just haven't seen the progress quick enough that's needed to see this region thrive."

Candidates' plans

FEDERAL election candidates for Grey, Tom Venning (Liberal Party) and Anita Kuss (Independent), outlined their plans to address the childcare crisis in the electorate at the Regional Childcare Desert Advocacy Project launch.

Mr Venning said South Australia had a large land mass and widely dispersed population, with hundreds of towns with populations between 200 and 2000, which was a challenge for the provision

'They (small towns) have a community but they don't have childcare and this is because the commercial model of childcare does not work and it has not been set up to cater for these smaller towns," he said.

Mr Venning advocated for more flexible regulations for Family Day Care providers and an expansion of the Rural Care scheme.

He said there were only 70 Rural Care sites in SA, with 13 in Grey, including one at Bute.

But the State Government had capped their numbers so there would not be any more," he said.

"We need a capital works budget in regional Australia and to do this we need to change the

government," Mr Venning said.

"We need to invest in hotspots prioritised by locations which have the greatest need.

"That's here in Port Broughton, Crystal Brook, Wilmington, Cummins, Kadina and Tumby Bay."

Ms Kuss said she had lived experience of the impact of lack of childcare when her children were young and she lived in Wudinna and Crystal Brook. "My children spent a lot of their early years driv-

ing around with me in the car, in between meetings or at work, playing under the desk," she said. "It wasn't good for me, it wasn't good for the kids,

for my marriage or my productivity at work. "The fact that, more than 20 years later, we're still

here without a resolution I think is just really, really disappointing," Ms Kuss said.

"And I think it points to the inertia that can happen when, as a safe seat, we get taken for granted and when funding and policy decisions are made without the community voice by people who don't

"You all know what's needed in your own communities.

"What we do need is a government who's prepared to listen, trust that you have a solution, and empower you to just get on with it."

CYS welcomes new SAASTA students with a Deadly Funny performance

CENTRAL Yorke School's South Australian Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy students had a big welcome to a new year of SAASTA with visits from Port Adelaide Football Club and two Deadly Funny comedians stopping off at Yorke

This year is one of Central Yorke's largest SAASTA cohorts, based at Maitland, with First Nations students from schools all around YP joining the award-winning academy.

Narungga and Ngarrindjeri man and Deadly Funny comedian Kevin Kropinyeri visited Central Yorke Academy to facilitate a comedy workshop with his colleague Sean Choolburra, with hopes to inspire more First Nations youth to be ambitious in their lives with no fear or shame.

"What we're looking at doing is planting positive seeds, and when the time is right — under the right circumstances — those seeds will germinate," Mr Kropinyeri said.

"Those seeds about overcoming fear and shame are so important because they are seeing successful

Aboriginal men and women out there. 'They are gonna be like 'if Uncle

Kev and Uncle Sean can do it, then so can I'.

"When we get to share our stories, it's a real heartfelt story of resilience, overcoming adversity, forgiveness and not getting bitter."

Graduates from the 2024 SAASTA Central Yorke Academy have highly commended the program, with many crediting the academy for their completion of year 12.

However, growing up in the 1980s, there was not the same support for Mr Kropinyeri's generation in regional South Australia, as an Aboriginal person.

He said there used to be very few opportunities for him and his mob, and this is why he is now using his platform to show both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students they have what it takes to make it.

"It wasn't until I found my healing, and then I was able to turn my life around and reach my full potential,"

"I only started comedy at age 30, and now I'm 52, so I'm able to impart positive messages to youth and community.

"And to be able to travel the world

making people laugh — I really have to pinch myself sometimes with some of the goals we have reached."

During the workshop Mr Kropinyeri and Mr Choolburra encouraged students to step out of their comfort zones by trying out stand-up comedy on the stage in front of their peers.

Central Yorke Academy clearly has a lot of bravery and comedic talent because each student who took the stage managed to have the crowd roaring with laughter.

One of the major lessons Mr Kropinyeri tried to communicate with the students was it was ok to fail, and that failing is where you actually learn.

"How do you become a good mechanics teacher? Through experiences," he said.

"In comedy you don't know nothing from your good gigs, it's the bad gigs where the joke doesn't work and you have to think what do I have to do to make it better.

"You've gotta build that, it takes years to build that going through the good and the bad, the ups and the downs.

"It's all helped me fine tune me to be a better father, a better man and a better comedian."

After the performance, students

moved on to a session with the Port behaviour to their peers. Adelaide Football Club and Flinders University to help prepare for the prestigious Power Cup at Adelaide Oval later in the year.

The Power Cup started as a small football competition between SAASTA Academies with just over 100 students competing; it has now grown to about 800 students.

For students to be eligible to play in the Power Cup, they must have at least 80 per cent attendance at school, complete all their work in the classroom and role model positive

The PAFC officers said they were extremely impressed with past students from the Central Yorke Academy, and that it had a very good reputation at the Power Cup, on and off the field.

One noteworthy mention was a road safety video, around being safe in a car, that Central Yorke students made during last year's program.

The PAFC team said this video was a great example of creativity; it is now used to show new students when visiting other academies.

Paying the price for period poverty

PURCHASING a packet of period products this month could provide dignity to those in need for the rest of the year.

As part of its twice-yearly drive, Share the Dignity is calling for period product donations this March.

The products will be given to people who menstruate and are experiencing or at risk of domestic violence, homelessness or poverty.

YP regional coordinator Sandra Johnstone ensures donations made locally are distributed to local charities: St Vincent de Paul Society, Kadina; Anglicare Wallaroo; and Uniting Country SA Kadina.

"It's all about ladies helping ladies; all those who menstruate are very aware of the costs involved," she said.

"It's a monthly thing. It's not a one-off fix like giving someone a fur coat to keep them warm for a few winters.

Ms Johnstone said people were often forced to use toilet paper or socks in place of period products, because they could not afford them.

In fact, 64 per cent of people who menstruate have had difficulty purchasing period products due to cost, according to the 2024 Bloody Big Survey.

"If you can help just one person get through one period that would be fabulous; if you could help them get through 12 it'd be even better," Ms Johnstone

"We often don't have enough to meet demand."

Donations can be made at Woolworths Kadina, and Star Pharmacy Maitland and Minlaton during March.

"The pink donation boxes at Woolies are at the front of the store, so you see them when you go through the checkout," Ms Johnstone said.



Polgreen Park upgrades draw more visitors

MOONTA'S newly upgraded Polgreen Park is thriving, with a lick of paint, fresh grass and even a lion on guard drawing more visitors to the play space.

Moonta Lions Club and Moonta and District Progress Association, with support from Copper Coast Council through grant funding and workers, have nearly completed stage 1 of the park's upgrades.

Improvements include a repainted shelter shed, featuring a new mural by Moonta artist Steve Hudson, a refurbished playground, larger lawn areas, more seating and fencing around the basketball courts to prevent balls rolling onto the road.

A lion statue, donated by the former Garden Shop and soon to be revamped by Moonta artist Julie Chesire, now guards the front of the park.

"A lot of visitors love the lion statue; the kids will hop on it for a photo," Moonta Lions Club member and upgrades committee secretary Rob Matthews said.

"When you drive past now, there's always someone at the park before, it wasn't like that."

Stage 1 will soon be completed with the installation of a new slide, following works that began mid last year. Stage 2 will include sensory gardens.

"We also hope to add a BMX track in the future, and our longterm goal is to put in a playground for disabled people," Mr Matthews said.



Cleaning up the coast

VOLUNTEERS across the region did their part to clean up Yorke Peninsula, including its coasts, earlier this month.

On Clean Up Australia Day (March 2), five YP groups registered with Clean Up Australia Day took to Wallaroo, Minlaton, Warooka, Port Vincent and North Beach to tidy up their towns.

North Beach Progress Association member John Kennett said his group collected 160 kilograms of waste.

"Most of the rubbish we picked up seemed to be along Hopgood Road, which starts from the Alford to Wallaroo road and comes right round behind the sandhills and up behind North Beach," he said.

"People use it to access the beach, especially up the northern end.

"They throw cigarette packets and fast-food rubbish; there's also building materials that blow off the back of utes.

"You'd be surprised what you find.
"The good part was some families brought their children and their children got in and helped as well, which is pleasing."

Mr Kennett said he wasn't sure if littering was more prominent during peak season as the group only did the clean-up annually.

"I guess there's more people around and maybe that is the case," he said.

"Luckily we do this straight after the holiday period which tidies everything up for a while." But Mr Kennett said he saw littering as a big concern for both North Beach and the whole region.

"We're on a farm, we've got a salt swamp area and we found fridges and things like that were dumped there the other day," he said.

"We also have some back roads that join our property and people tend to go down those back roads, because they can't be seen, and tip off a lot of rubbish."

"I think people find the cost of paying for disposing of rubbish an issue."

Mr Kennett said the group didn't find many cans and bottles, which he believed was thanks to the 10 cent refund incentive not to throw them away.

Port Vincent Tidy Towns secretary Eric Smith also organised a CUAD event on his town's beaches.

"(Littering is) a difficult situation to remedy; it's probably up to our council to do a bit more as far as putting out rubbish receptacles," he said.

"We also get a lot of people walking dogs in the holidays and some of the people are pretty slack in picking up their dog poo, so that's another area that's a bugbear."

However, the citizens of the town are proactive in keeping Port Vincent clean.

"We organise a monthly clean up through our Tidy Towns organisation, so we use Clean Up Australia Day as recruitment.

"Because we do it on a regular basis there's never all that much rubbish to pick up."

The hub provides a wide range of services, including Service SA agency (transfers, car and trailer registration, and driver's licence renewals, where a photo is not required) and Services Australia agency (Centrelink and Medicare).

The Community Resilience Program (responding to local needs) is based at the hub, which also acts as a tourist information outlet; helps with digital devices (phones, computers, et cetera); provides printing and office services (faxing, binding, scanning, emailing), and support for grant applications, social media and community events.

Moonta Area School student Brock Penna is targeting a future in Olympic recurve archery.

The 14-year-old year 9 student first developed an interest in the sport after receiving a bow for Christmas six years ago. Now, he is South Australia's top-ranked under 18 archer and sits second nationally in his age group.

'My goal is to earn a place in an Olympic squad and stand on the podium with a medal," Penna said.

Recurve archery, the Olympic discipline for able-bodied competitors, involves shooting 72 arrows at a 70 metre target to achieve the highest aggregate score.

Over Easter, Penna will compete at the Australian Youth National Championships in Canberra.

"I need to be ranked in the top three nationally to qualify for the World Youth Archery Championships in Winnipeg, Canada, from August 17 to 24," he said.

A member of Adelaide Archery Club, Penna began his training with Yorke Peninsula Field Archers in Kadina and is coached by Graham Winston at Archery GW.

He has also competed at the Senior Nationals in 2024 and is part of the Archery Australia National Recurve Program, which supports athletes aiming for international

The Australian Institute of Sport and Archery Australia have identified him as an emerging elite athlete.

Upcoming competitions include the Lord Mayor team event at Oakbank on March 30.

With archery receiving less media attention than football or netball, Penna is self-funding his journey.

His recurve bow setup costs around \$5000, and he is running a raffle to help cover expenses, with tickets available at various outlets.

Copper **Coast Cup** to cease

The Copper Coast Cup will not be included in AusCycling's 2025 Super Series, following ongoing difficulties in securing suitable racecourses in the Copper Coast

Cycling SA (now AusCycling) first brought a cycling event to a regional area in 2012, choosing the Copper Coast.

Since then, Copper Coast Council and local community have supported the event for 12 years, hosting road races and criteriums through Kadina, Wallaroo and Moonta.

Initially named Hell of the North, the event was rebranded as the Copper Coast Cup in 2016.

Participation steadily grew. from 90 of South Australia's best riders in 2013 to a peak 579 entrants in 2022.

However, due to ongoing challenges, AusCycling has now ceased races in the Copper Coast. Notice of the decision was

tabled at the Copper Coast Council's monthly meeting on March 5.

According to council documents, issues included resident complaints about detours and temporary road closures.

Also cited were safety concerns for volunteers managing road closures, and difficulty securing a suitable race route, avoiding unsealed roads, major town entrances and conflicts with harvest season and school holidays.

Weather disruptions also impacted the event, with strong winds forcing the cancellation of all but three races last year.

AusCycling state operations manager Jake Thomas informed the council of the decision in a letter dated January 8.

With the support of Loxton Waikerie Council, we expect to host a two-day race weekend at Loxton in 2025, following on from the Masters and Juniors Road National Championships we hosted there in September," Mr Thomas said.

"With this in mind, and given our difficulties over the past few years in getting an appropriate course for racing in the CCC area, we will not be planning to host the Copper Coast Cup as part of the 2025 Super Series this year."

Mr Thomas also noted that the Copper Coast BMX Club had secured the SA State BMX Championships, to be held September 12 to 14.

"It would be a great outcome for us if some or all of the funding allocated to the Copper Coast Cup could be reallocated to the BMX State Championships in 2025," he said.

The Copper Coast Council is now exploring alternative events to replace the Copper Coast Cup and has lodged an expression of interest with Tourism SA to participate in the 2026 Santos Tour Down Under.

"Schools and sporting clubs are the lifeblood of rural communities, and events like this bring them together."







South Australian racing legend Dani Hill collected a cups double at the Yorke Peninsula Harness Racing Club's Port Pirie meeting on Sunday, March 2.

Hill drove the trotter Regal Attire to win the Wombat Hotel Kadina Trotters Cup (race 3) for Two Wells trainer Ryan Hryhorec, then partnered Bellezza Nera for David Harding in the Ardrossan Hotel Kadina Pacing Cup (race 4).

The Kadina harness racing community had a winner on the night but had to wait until the final event.

Clarenden Vintage, trained by Leah Holman, and driven by Todd Mumford, produced a strong run to take out the Blue Swimmers Blue Pace (1609 metres, race 7).

A \$10 chance, Clarenden Vintage sprinted strongly to win by 3m from Backpaddockjack with Antiguas Be Be, 3m away finishing third.

Clarenden Vintage is owned and was bred by Claire Goble, who formerly trained the gelding. However, she had a hip replacement after a fall last month and dispersed her team with Holman taking up the opportunity to add him to her stable.

Mumford had the 6-year-old in the running line early and allowed him to work into the race before dashing to victory.

The YPHRC program started South Australia's run of county cups with Victor Harbor, Gawler and Kapunda conducting meetings leading into a feature night at Port Pirie on Saturday, April 12.

Hill has driven 2348 winners during her career and has been a dominant reinswoman in the state.

She has had injuries, including losing the sight in an eye, which threatened to curtail her career but has bounced back each time.

go to Victor Harbor for its pacing cup. The decision by Mick Boots to send trotter Regal Attire to South Australia has

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HOT FISHING TIPS

Welcome to the column with all the hot tips for fishing around Yorke Peninsula; contact Greg by email at greg@ gregjamesfishing.com.au.

Wallaroo: I grabbed the surf rod early Friday morning and managed a quick fish off the rocks at Point Riley for salmon trout, all weighing around the 500g mark. No gar or squid, and trout should be running right along the shallow rocky coastline at this time of year. Boat crews enjoyed good weather for squid, garfish and a few blue crabs. The jetty had some night-time squid and sprat tommy ruff (Australian herring).

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Plenty of jetty traffic over the past week for squid, gar and blueys. Boat fishers ran out for a few King George whiting from Cape Elizabeth and Steamer Channel, and garfish from West Light.

Port Victoria: KG whiting are in small numbers off the Moorara wreck and Wardang Island, along with blue crabs and a few squid. Small snapper are everywhere but must be returned to the water. The Port Vic jetty has blueys and squid.

Point Turton: Good catches of KG whiting came from Corny Point and Point Souttar grounds on the past week's outgoing tides. Garfish are off The Pines and Port Rickaby. The jetties here and Port Rickaby have been quiet.

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: In improved weather, crews launched for tuna, red nannygai, sweep and Samson fish from the island groups and the deep water bommies (underwater reefs) out from Sturt Bay. Closer to shore there were a few whiting, flathead and big squid. Shore-based fishing produced mullet and salmon trout from Richards and Hillocky Beaches. A few snook came from the Marion Bay jetty.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Blue crabs, squid, a few garfish and some tommies came from both jetties over the weekend. Boat crews reported KG whiting in the deepwater ravines from Troubridge Island and Tapley Shoals to the Orontes Bank. Squid, flathead and gar were caught from Rocky Gully and Coobowie.

Ardrossan: Blue swimmer crabs have again been the main targets for rakers and boat crews as autumn moves in and the migratory run of salmon hits full swing. Soapie mulloway are in the night-time shallows from Pine Point to Ardrossan, Mosquito Point and on to Port Wakefield, but respect the Marine Park sanctuary zones where they apply. Jetty-based fishing has a few blueys and the odd squid.
